Abahani thrash Rahmatganj

Holders Abahani notched an emphatic 3-0 win over Arambagh KS in their Bangladesh Premier League

encounter at the Bangabandhu National Stadium yesterday. Sunday Chizoba, Jewel Rana and Faisal

Ahmed Shital scored one goal apiece in the second half to help the Sky Blues raise their points tally to 45 from 18 matches, four behind leaders Bashundhara Kings, who have played one match less than the defending champions. Coming back from a hard-fought 2-1

away win over Team BJMC, Abahani dominated the Old Dhaka outfit from the outset and play was mostly confined in the Arambagh half as the hosts launched intermittent attacks from both flanks but could not breach the goal.

Abahani, however, came close to breaking the deadlock on the halfhour mark when a poor clearance from Arambagh's Zahid Hossain came to Sohel

Rana, who drove a powerful shot from the edge of the box, only to be tipped over by goalkeeper Mazharul Islam Himel.

Arambagh threatened Abahani with a nice move from winger Ariful Islam, who darted into the box from the left to cut it back for Chinedu Mathew, who was however late to connect with goalkeeper Shahidul Alam Sohel to beat in the 38th minute.

Abahani took the lead in the 48th minute, with Sunday converting a penalty after Jewel was fouled by goalkeeper Himel, who however denied a close-range header from the Nigerian in the 56th minute.

Arambagh came close to levelling the margin in the 62nd minute but captain Rocky frustrated with a miscued attempt from the six-yard box while Sunday and Nabib Newaj Jibon squandered two chances.

However, Jewel made amends to double the lead with a placing shot to the far post in the 86th minute while substitute Shital headed home a cross from substitute Imtiaz Sultan Jitu in the stoppage time to wrap up Abahani's 15th victory.

Trophy-king Alves eyeing one more

At 36 years young, Brazil captain Dani Alves could be forgiven if he was thinking of hanging up his boots and admiring his bursting trophy cabinet.

Instead, Alves is preparing to play a key role when Brazil take on Peru in Sunday's Copa America final at Rio de Janeiro's Maracana stadium, and the full-back is showing no signs of letting up.

"I know how old I am, and I know what that means in football, but I've learnt that people want results," said Alves, currently without a club having announced last month he was leaving Paris Saint-Germain.


"I'm focussed on that, I'm not focussing on my age nor what people think of me.

"I'm not here to shut anyone up, I'm simply here to do my job."

As it is, his trophy cabinet already contains one Copa America title and according to some lists, more trophies than years he's been alive.

He's won the Champions League three times, the old UEFA Cup twice, the Club World Cup three times, European Super Cup four times -- and that's just at European continental club level.

Six La Liga crowns with Barcelona, two French Ligue 1 titles with Paris Saint-Germain and one Serie A with Juventus, not to mention eight domestic cups across Spain, France and Italy.



With Brazil he won the 2007 Copa America and two Confederations Cups.

Any suggestions he might be satisfied with what he's won so far were dispelled within 20 minutes of Tuesday's 2-0 semi-final victory over Argentina when he took three Argentina players out of the game in creating the opening for Roberto Firmino to cross for Gabriel Jesus to open the scoring in Belo Horizonte.

Alves's skill was a thing of beauty as he latched onto a dropping ball, chipped it over the head of Marcus Acuna, sent a sliding Leandro Paredes the wrong way and then left Nicolas Tagliafico chasing shadows with a nolook pass to Firmino.

From then on, Brazil were in the

box seat and they secured victory, and a place in the final, with Firmino's tap-in from a Jesus pass after the Manchester City forward's determined charge on the counterattack.

What led up to that goal was another example of Alves's singleminded commitment to the cause.

Whether Brazil win or not on Sunday, Alves is already regarded by many as the most successful player in history.

UEFA places him at the top of its list of major trophies won by a player in Europe with 29, with Messi only joint fourth on 26.

In another list, that takes into account trophies won with national teams as well as domestic Super Cups omitted from UEFA's list, Alves is top with 39 trophies.

"Never in my wildest dreams did I imagine arriving where I have," Alves told Fox Sports in an interview a few months ago.

"I come from poverty, from a reality that many people around the world experience.

"When I left home at 15 my aim wasn't to win many things, but to return home and that my parents be proud of me."

After a career that has taken him from Sevilla to Barcelona, Juventus and PSG, and 114 appearances for the national team, Alves now hopes to be an inspiration to others from a similar background.

"My aim is for this to inspire youngsters, the little dreamers to have a go, to never give up," he told Fox.

Robben retires

Dutch winger Arjen Robben announced on Thursday he is ending his playing career at the age of 35 after a 10-year spell with German giants

Bayern Munich. "It is without a doubt the most

difficult decision I have had to make in my career, my heart says yes, my body says no," Robben told the Telegraaf. His contract at Bayern had expired on

June 30. Robben played 96 international matches for the Netherlands, scoring 37 goals, and starred in the team which

reached the 2010 World Cup final and finished third four years later. He won two Premier League titles under Jose Mourinho at Chelsea in 2005 and 2006, before claiming a La Liga

winner's medal with Real Madrid. But Robben, a Groningen youth product, will be best remembered for his time at Bayern. He helped the Bavarians to eight Bundesliga crowns, five German Cups and the 2013 Champions League title, scoring 144 goals in 309

appearances for the club.

There had been speculation Robben would continue playing, with a possible return to England mooted, but instead he has decided to hang up his boots after a career which was often blighted by injuries. "At the moment I'm fit and healthy

and as a fan of many other sports, I want to keep it that way in the future," Robben added.

At Bayern, he combined with fellow winger Franck Ribery to great effect as the pair earned the nickname 'Robbery'. "Thank you, danke, merci, dankjewel

@arjenrobben," wrote the 36-year-old Ribery, whose Bayern contract also expired last month, on Twitter. "Best @FCBayern counterpart I

could imagine, #Robbery will never be forgotten! What a career my friend, now enjoy your time off the pitch." Robben had already retired from international football after the

Netherlands failed to qualify for the 2018 World Cup. He missed the majority of Bayern's

tight title contest against Borussia Dortmund, but returned late in the season.

Dutch 'love' underdog tag against USA

Netherlands are relishing their underdog status ahead of the women's World Cup final against the United States on Sunday, midfielder Danielle van de Donk has said.

"He's incredible. He could have been a fantastic footballer with his physique, mentality and skill," said the Portuguese, who worked with Nadal's uncle, Miguel Angel when he was on the coaching staff at Barcelona.

"I am happy that he isn't a footballer. In tennis he is what he is."

Nadal overcomes Kyrgios; Kerber knocked out

Rafael Nadal may not end up winning a third Wimbledon singles title but he will take joy from having beaten his 'bete noire' Nick Kyrgios in an engrossing but badtempered grudge match on Thursday.

The 33-year-old Spaniard came through in four sets 6-3, 3-6, 7-6 (7/5), 7-6 (7/3) which saw fiery but talented Australian Kyrgios receive a warning for unsportsmanlike behaviour after a running argument with the umpire while twice serving under-arm.

Nadal's pleasure was evident when he sealed the match against a man he had accused of lacking respect for the sport as he fist-pumped and jumped in the air yelling to his camp seated on Centre Court.

"I was aware of everything," said Nadal, who was winning his 50th match at Wimbledon. "I was just next to him so I don't want to comment on this but potentially he is a Grand Slam winner."

Earlier, his great rival, eight-time champion Roger Federer had no such problems as he eased into the third round, beating British wild card Jay Clarke 6-1, 7-6 (7/3), 6-2 to equal American legend Jimmy Connors's record of 17 appearances in the last 32.

On the women's side, there will be a new name adorning the trophy as defending champion Angelique Kerber went out in three sets to lucky loser Lauren Davis 2-6, 6-2, 6-1. Kerber looked in control after the first set but once she went 3-2 down in the second Davis -- ranked outside the top 250 earlier this year -- gained in confidence.

"Its been a tough journey and a process of learning and growing as a player and person," said Davis.

"The drop in ranking has made this win even more fulfilling."

Buffon returns to Juventus

Ex-Italy goalkeeper Gianluigi Buffon has returned to Juventus on a one-year contract after a season spent at Paris Saint-Germain. The 41-year-old, who will be number

two to Polish 'keeper Wojciech Szczesny, previously spent 17 seasons with the Turin club, winning nine Serie A titles and playing three

"Welcome home, Gigi!" Juve said in a statement. "It was 19 May 2018. That was the day when there were tears in everyone's eyes: when Gigi said goodbye to Juventus, its fans and vice-versa. It was the bidding of a farewell to someone who was more than just a captain, but a legend and a symbol of the club.

"Probably each of us hoped, and in the end, knew that the yarn that united us for so many years was not destined to break. And that was the case."

The veteran goalkeeper joined PSG last summer and played 25 times in all competitions, winning the Ligue 1 title and the curtain raiser Champions Trophy.

Last season's league title was the 10th of Buffon's career, adding to a bulging trophy cabinet that contains just about every honour in football. However the Champions League has eluded him

despite him spending the bulk of his career at Juve, one

of Europe's biggest clubs, and it was hoped that he might break his duck with the Qatari-funded Parisians. However despite winning the league at a canter, the past season was a poor one for both Buffon and a team

with lofty ambitions on the European stage. They missed out on both domestic cup competitions and most importantly were dumped out of the Champions

League by Manchester United in embarrassing style.
