Meanwhile, hospitals in the capital are still struggling to deal with the excessive number of dengue patients and also those who are coming to take the dengue tests even if they are not runing a fever. "Our pathology departments are

struggling to provide free dengue tests due to the large number of patients," said Uttam Kumar Barua, director of Shaheed Suhrawardy Medical College and Hospital.

Some 268 patients were being treated in the hospital and the number of patients is increasing every day, he said.

A Rohingya girl named Monowara gave him a paper flower as a present. During the meeting, Hamida Khatun said they did not want to be a burden on Bangladesh and that they
