India scraps special status for Kashmir

Pakistan condemns move as 'illegal'; phone, internet blocked in the region; thousands of troops deployed to avert possible backlash

The Indian government yesterday stripped Kashmir of the special autonomy it has had for seven decades, prompting a furious response from nuclear-armed rival Pakistan and raising fears of further violence in the Muslim-majority Himalayan region.

India's Prime Minister Narendra Modi's Hindu-nationalist party BJP rushed through a presidential decree to scrap from the constitution the Indian-ruled part of the disputed territory's special status.

It also moved a bill proposing the Indian-administered part of Kashmir be divided into two regions directly ruled by

New Delhi.

Ahead of the announcements, tens of thousands of extra Indian troops were deployed in the territory, and a security lockdown was imposed overnight Sunday with all telecommunications there cut.

Home Minister Amit Shah, a close ally of Modi, told parliament the president had issued a decree abolishing Article 370 of the constitution, which gives special autonomy to the Himalayan region.

The decree said the measure came into force "at once".

Myanmar army's 'business empire' fuels atrocities

Says UN's Rohingya probe, urges tougher sanctions on army businesses

Tougher sanctions are needed against Myanmar's wealthy nd powerful infiltary as its web of economic interest has generated a fortune that helps fund atrocities, UN investigators said yesterday.

They urged the international community to sever links with the armed forces' dizzying economic holdings -- that they said dwarf those of any other civilian company in Myanmar.

Cutting ties will "impair (the army's) ability to carry out military operations without oversight and thus reduce violations of human rights", said Marzuki Darusman, chair of the fact-finding mission, ahead of the launch of the report in Jakarta.

The team last year called for Myanmar's senior generals to be prosecuted for genocide after a 2017 crackdown forced some 740,000 Rohingya Muslims into Bangladesh. In addition to extensive local partnerships, at least 15 foreign firms have joint ventures with the military, according to the UN report, while 44 others have some form of commercial ties.

DENGUE DEATHS SO FAR Most were infected for second time

Died due to shock syndrome, says IEDCR HELEMUL ALAM

Most of the people who officially died of dengue suffered shock syndrome and at least half of them were second-time infected, said Institute of Epidemiology, Disease Control and Research (IEDCR).

"Shock syndrome is a dangerous complication of dengue infection and is associated with high mortality. Severe dengue occurs as a result of secondary infection with a different virus serotype. Increased vascular permeability, together with myocardial dysfunction and dehydration, contribute to the development of shock, with resultant multiorgan failure," read a journal in the US National Library of Medicine.

IEDCR Director Prof Meerjady Sabrina Flora said they believe that of the 18 deaths they confirmed and 32 others they are probing, 70 percent of the victims had been infected the second time.

Flora, who heads the death review committee of the Directorate General of Health Services (DGHS), said most of the deaths were due to shock

HM Nazmul Ahsan, associate professor at the Shaheed Suhrawardy Medical College Hospital, said if a patient ignores the warning signs and seeks medical help late, his or her condition could deteriorate fast resulting in death even.

He said serious abdominal pain, vomiting again and again, unusual drop in body temperature and platelets in blood, infrequent urination, and bleeding from any part of the body are some of the warning signs. "Understanding the warnings is very important, for doctors

Aedes sources need to be wiped out

Say experts on checking dengue outbreak

The source eradication is the key to eliminating Aedes mosquitoes as well as checking Dengue outbreak and for this participation of mass people is necessary alongside the government efforts, experts say.

"Eradicating the sources is the most important thing to do and people from all walks of life has to come forward," Abul Kalam Azad, director general of Directorate General of Health Services, told The Daily

Dengue is an infectious tropical virus transmitted to humans with the bites of female Aedes mosquitoes, which breed in clean and warm water.

There is no known cure or vaccine for dengue, the world's fastest spreading vectorborne viral disease, making prevention
