Ctg Wasa mulls big hike in water tariff

Says it needs to do so for 'survival'

Just five months into its last tariff hike, Chattogram Water and Sanitation Authority (CWasa) is mulling to increase water tariff yet again by more than 60 percent, in an apparent bid to bridge the gap between production cost and existing price.

The utility service authority wants to raise the tariff for residential connections from Tk 9.92 to Tk 16, while non residential tariff would increase to Tk 45 from Tk 27.56 per unit of 1,000 litres.

A proposal to this end is set to be placed at a CWasa board meeting today.

Water tariff was last raised by five percent in March, before which the tariff for residential

connections was Tk 9.45, while non-residential connections Tk 26.25 per unit. When asked the reason behind the hike, Engr

AKM Fajlullah, managing director of CWasa, told The Daily Star that it was for the sake of the organisation's survival.

He said they needed to coordinate the production cost -- which is now Tk 16 per unit -with the price.

"The government doesn't give us any subsidy, and has asked us to be self-dependent. We have a huge amount of unpaid loans from various international lenders. Considering the situation, we have no option but to increase the tariff," he added.

"The money we are spending must be recouped by raising water tariff. CWasa won't survive unless we do it," he added.

During a visit to CWasa on June 28, Local Government and Rural Development (LGRD) Minister Md Tajul Islam had said the organisation was running at a loss and was dependent on borrowing. He also urged CWasa to generate

DNCC fines four hospitals

Dhaka North City Corporation (DNCC) yesterday fined four hospitals in the capital's Uttara area after Aedes larvae and breeding grounds were found on the premises of the institutions.

A mobile court led by Executive Magistrate Sajid Anwar conducted a drive in Uttara and fined Popular Hospital Tk 2 lakh, Women's Medical College and Hospital on Jasimuddin road Tk 2.50 lakh, Lubna Hospital on Garib Newaz Avenue Tk 30,000, and Japan Kaguchi Hospital in sector-4 Tk 25,000, according to a DNCC press release.

Besides, two mobile courts of DNCC conducted drives in Baridhara and Karwan Bazar areas yesterday.

In Baridhara, the mobile court led by Executive Magistrate Hemayet Hossain fined the owners of 11 buildings a total of Tk 1 lakh as Aedes mosquito larvae and breeding grounds were found there,

MIGRANTS' DEBT COERCION

Bangladesh, US discuss concerns

Bangladesh and the United States have discussed concerns with traffickers exploiting legal recruitment fees to trap migrant workers in debt-based coercion.

US Ambassador-at-Large to Monitor and Combat Trafficking in Persons John Cotton Richmond had the discussion with Bangladesh government officials and partners between August 3-6, said the US Embassy yesterday. US Ambassador to Bangladesh Earl R Miller joined Ambassador Richmond for meetings in Dhaka with government officials from the foreign affairs, law, home, social welfare and expatriates'

welfare and overseas employment ministries. Officials of the two countries also discussed the need to identify internal forced labour and sex trafficking, increase accountability for traffickers, and provide

victims support services. Ambassadors Miller and Richmond applauded the passage of the 2018-2022 National Action Plan and emphasised the importance of prosecution, protection and prevention in combating human trafficking.

Two Japanese nationals held with 30 gold bars

Two Japanese citizens were held with 30 gold bars -- weighing around 12 kilogrammes -- at Hazrat Shahjalal International Airport early yesterday.

The detainees, Takeo Mimura and Shuichi Sato, came to Bangladesh from Malaysia on flight-AK71 of Air Asia, Director General of Customs Intelligence and Investigation Directorate (CIID) Md Shahidul Islam told The Daily Star.

He said customs officials, on a tipoff, intercepted the duo when they were passing through the green channel around 12:30am. When asked, they denied carrying any gold.

The officials, after searching the two, found the gold bars in pockets sewn inside their trousers, said Shahidul. The market price of the seized gold is around Tk 6 crore, the official added.

After filing a case, the two were handed over to airport police, Shahidul said.

ACC files cases against 12 including ex-BIFC chairman

Commission Anti-Corruption (ACC) yesterday filed two separate cases against 12 persons including Maj (retd) MA Mannan, former chairman of Bangladesh Industrial Finance Company Limited (BIFC), for allegedly misappropriating around Tk 43.4 crore from the nonbanking financial institution.

The other accused are: D' Afroz Industries Limited's Sweater managing director Golam Zilani Didar; Click to Design's managing director Nazmul Bashar; BIFC's director Mahmud managing Malik, former managing director Inamur Rahman, former senior vice president Syed Fakre Foysal, former assistant vice president Ahmed Karim Chowdhury, former senior officer Mohammad Nizam Uddin, former officer Saikat Azad, former principal officer Taniza Mazed, former officer Masud-ulReza Chowhdury and former senior

officer Afrida Ahsan. ACC Deputy Director SM Sahidur Rahman filed the cases with its integrated district office in

Dhaka. According to a case statement, BIFC issued a loan sanction letter to D' Afroz Sweater Industries in 2008. The letter enabled D' Afroz Sweater Industries to secure a Tk 45 lakh loan for 12 months.

Later, the then managing authority, misusing its power and through forgery, gave Tk 61.39 crore to D' Afroz Sweater Industries, which has so far paid back Tk 39.47

BIFC issued another loan of about Tk 6.47 crore in 2008 to D' Afroz Sweater Industries, which has not been repaid.
