U-15s determined to defend title

U-15 Championship, where they will look to defend the tittle they earned by beating Pakistan in last edition's final in Nepal.

The boys in red and green will begin their campaign with a match against Bhutan on August 23 after the five-nation championship kicks off on August 21 at the Kalyani Stadium in Nadia district of West Bengal.

Bangladesh underwent four months of preparation for the championship. Initially, 34 players trained under local

Academy in Beraid, Badda before British coach Robert Martin Ryles took over midway through June.

This is the first time that the boys in red and green will play under the supervision of a foreign coach, however, it should be mentioned that local coaches delivered two titles from the regional age-level championship in 2015 and 2017 respectively.

"It was a positive experience in Fortis with excellent facility and environments. We focused hard in developing physical, technical and other aspects of the players who gave everything we asked for in the training. The boys showed resilience and improved their game day by day," Ryles told reporters at the press

coaches at the BFF-Fortis Football conference at the Bangladesh Football Federation house yesterday.

Ryles also informed that they played a number of practice matches against youth sides of the premier league clubs and the older groups of academy players to sharpen their skills.

"Our target is to defend the title which our senior brothers earned last year," said midfielder Rakibul Islam.

The tournament initially began as the SAFF U-16 Championship before it was turned into the SAFF U-15 Championship last year to be a part of the teams' preparation for the AFC U-16 Championship in line with AFC prescription. Pakistan was first to win the inaugural title before Bangladesh (2015 and 2018) and India (2013 and 2017) shared the other four titles.



Abahani feel the blues as Eissa ruled out

Six-time Bangladesh Premier League champions Abahani were dealt a huge blow ahead of their AFC Cup inter-zone semifinal play-off match against April 25 as their new recruit, Alaaeldin Nasr Elmagraby Eissa, is yet to complete a he suspension awarded to him by the AFC during the last edition of the AFC Cup.

Eissa, who then played for TC Sports Club of Maldives, was given the marching order against Bengaluru FC in their last group stage match on February 20, 2018. Therefore, the Egyptian defender is not eligible for the first-leg match against the visiting North Korean side to be held on August 21.

Interestingly, Eissa did not inform his new outfit about the suspension before signing the deal. Abahani came to know about the matter through correspondence with the AFC on Saturday.

"We came to know about it yesterday [Saturday] when the AFC let us know about the ineligibility of Eissa in our home match against April 25 following his two bookings in the last match of last edition's AFC Cup. It is really a bad news for us and we have to find an available option." Abahani manager Satyajit Das Rupu told reporters yesterday. Abahani have struggled with their backline

throughout the season in the absence of defender Tapu Barman. Masih Saighani tapered the cracks but the 32-year-old afghan ended up joining Chennaiyin FC, which left a big void in Eissa.

"[It is a] bad feeling. I want to play this match. I got to know this yesterday [Saturday]. This was two years ago and I forgot," said Eissa.

Now, Abahani will likely face April 25 with a row.

Lampard denied first win by Foxes

Premier win as Chelsea manager after Wilfred Ndidi gave Leicester a 1-1 draw to spoil the Blues legend's homecoming on Sunday.

Thrashed 4-0 at Manchester United last weekend and beaten on penalties by Liverpool in the European Super Cup on Wednesday, Lampard's side took an early lead through Mason Mount's first goal for Chelsea.

But Ndidi atoned for the costly mistake that led to Mount's opener as the Nigeria midfielder headed Leicester's well deserved second half equaliser.

Lampard had been given a thunderous reception in his first game as Chelsea manager at Stamford Bridge. Yet the mood was far gloomier by the final whistle after a spluttering display raised the spectre of a potentially difficult season for the returning hero.

Lampard, Chelsea's all-time record goalscorer, managed to avoid being the first Blues boss to lose his first two league games in charge since Gianluca Vialli 21 years ago. But on this evidence there is a lot of work for the 41-year-

old to do if he is to emulate his 13-year playing spell at Chelsea, which included three Premier League titles and the club's first Champions League crown. Mount, a tenacious 20-year-old attacking midfielder

in Lampard's mold, who impressed while playing for Lampard on loan at second tier Derby last season, opened his Chelsea account in the seventh minute, with a helping hand from Ndidi. But Chelsea couldn't keep up that ferocious pace and

their dip gave Leicester impetus, which was finally rewarded in the 67th minute. When Maddison swung over a corner, Ndidi rose to plant a powerful header past Kepa.

Lampard rued his side making the same mistakes in front of goal that had cost them against Manchester United when a bright start was offset by a drop in intesity and conceding goals from counterattacks.

"It was a really good start, fantastic, and we could've been two or three goals up," he told Sky Sports. "We were quick, bright, energetic, then we allowed Leicester back in the game and in the second half I was not very happy, we offered them too many chances on the counter attack."

Guardiola fumes after VAR denies City Djokovic heaps

against Tottenham on Saturday. Guardiola's side failed to win for the first time in 16 Premier League games dating back to last season as a result of the latest VAR row.

The champions thought they had stolen the points when Gabriel Jesus fired home in stoppage-time, only for the goal to be disallowed for handball after a replay review showed Aymeric Laporte had flicked the ball on with his arm.

It was the second time City have been frustrated by VAR against Tottenham following last season's Champions League quarterfinal.

many doubles faults and goes for every shot, you just have to put your hat down and congratulate him. Medvedev explained why he had

switched tactics.

"I was so tired in the first set and playing Novak, I thought I'm not going to be able to keep the intensity," the world number eight said in a courtside interview with ESPN.

"Then there was one momentum change in the second and I just started playing unbelievable."

Medvedev added that it was par for the course to go for broke on his second serve when trailing in a match.

"Novak was destroying me on the second serve so at one moment, at three-all, love-30, I'm like 'okay, what's the matter."
