Man sent to jail over rape

4 rape accused held

A Netrokona court yesterday sent a man to jail on charge of raping a fouryear-old girl in the district's Atpara upazila on Monday.

Mohammad Ali Hossain, officerin-charge of Atpara Police Station, said the victim's father filed a case against the accused -- Mizanur Rahman, 25, resident of the Tenga village -- on Wednesday.

The man was arrested on the same day the case was filed, he added.

According to the case statement, the girl was playing at her yard on Monday afternoon when neighbouring Mizanur took her to his room and raped her.

Hearing the girl scream, locals rushed to the spot and rescued her but Mizanur managed to flee, the statement added.

Later, he was arrested and placed before the court.

Earlier on July 4, the BTRC had slashed Grameenphone's bandwidth by 30 percent and Robi's by 15 percent for non-payment of the dues -- enough to slow down their internet speed and raise the call drop frequency.

But the block on bandwidth was lifted on July 17 considering the inconvenience it was causing to subscribers.

Yesterday, Attorney General Mahbubey Alam met Chief Justice Syed Mahmud Hossain at the CJ's SC office.

Talking to reporters at his office in the afternoon, the AG said the chief justice took the decision in consultation with the president. The chief justice also had discussed the matter with other judges of the Appellate Division of the SC.

Most members of the Supreme Court Bar Association have long been demanding steps for making judiciary free from blemishes and upholding its image and dignity.

The president, who appoints judges, and the chief justice will decide who will conduct further inquiry and what will be the next procedures, he said.

The attorney general said the president and the chief justice have taken the initiative in order to protect the image and dignity of the

"No minister, judge or general people can remain above law. Following this initiative [of the president and chief justice], a message will reach those who are not on the right track," he said.

He declined to disclose the allegation against the three judges, saying the disclosure before the public would not be good for the image of the judiciary.

Replying to a question, the AG said the government has filed a petition with the SC, seeking a review of its judgement over the Supreme Judicial Council. The SJC comprises the chief justice and two senior most judges of the Appellate

Had the SJC been active, the CJ and the two senior most judges of the Appellate Division would have

inquired into the allegation. Later, the CJ and the two judges would send recommendations to the president for necessary action, he

attorney general also said now the CJ was taking such decisions in consultation with the president and all judges of the apex

Meanwhile, Supreme Court Bar Association's Secretary Barrister Mahbub Uddin Khokon yesterday said there were corruption allegations against many other judges as well as SC officials and employees.

"Some Supreme Court officials and employees openly commit corruption. The lawyers are being harassed by them every day. We have already informed this issue to the chief justice," he said at a press conference at the SCBA auditorium.

"Taking initiative against corruption is urgent for protecting the image and dignity of the judiciary and to ensure justice," he

"We welcome the initiative of probing the allegations against the three High Court judges. But we are demanding that who is conducting the inquiry is made clear," added Khokon, also a joint secretary of the

Meanwhile, Advocate Khurshid Alam Khan, a SC lawyer and Editor of Dhaka Law Reports, termed the move to keep the three judges judicial activities from unprecedented.

Tiger poaching increasing

On an average, over 60 seizures and body parts of almost 124 tigers were recorded every year," the report said.

"Vietnam and Bangladesh also reported more than doubling average yearly seizures, and an increase in the number of tigers seized," the report claimed.

Over the last four years, Bangladeshi authorities mostly seized tiger skins. Bangladesh's seizures account for 2.9 percent of the worldwide seizures. India, China, and Indonesia made

most of the seizures -- India 463 or 40.5 percent, China 126 or 11.0 percent, and Indonesia 119 or 10.5 percent. Wildlife experts in Bangladesh

said the situation was dreadful as the

number reflects only a tiny part of

actually poaching incidents. "When tiger population is poor, poaching in such a rate is really

concerning. Usually, only 20 percent poaching incidents are reported," said Monirul H Khan, renowned tiger researcher and a professor at the Jahangirnagar University's Zoology department.

According to WildTeam (formerly Wildlife Trust of Bangladesh), 19 incidents of tiger body parts recovery were recorded in Bangladesh between 2011 and 2019. Three cubs, 19 skins, 294 bones, seven skulls, and 45 teeth were recovered.

Prof Md Anwarul Islam, chief executive of WildTeam and a teacher of Zoology department at Dhaka University, said, "We compiled the data when seizures were made by different agencies. There certainly are unreported incidents. That's why we do not know the real picture."

Md Moyeen Uddin Khan, conservator of forest, Khulna circle,

timeframe, 10 tigers died naturally and one during the Sidr cyclone, he

"There are 49 village tiger response teams, four co-management committees, and 22 community patrolling groups are there in the Sundarbans area for tiger conservation," he said.

Bangladesh has taken several steps for tiger conservation, including Tiger Action Plan 2009-2017, National Tiger Recovery Programme, and an amendment to the Forest Act, 2012.

According to the latest tiger census of the government released in May, the number of Bengal tigers in the Bangladesh part of the Sundarbans increased slightly, to 114 in 2018 from

Distrust holds them back

The Rohingyas' lack of willingness to return was a recurring feature during the interviews, officially called intention surveys. Refugee Relief and Repatriation

Commissioner Mohammad Abul Kalam said that none of the Rohingyas of the 295 families interviewed by the UNHCR and RRRC over the last two days had volunteered to return. "We have interviewed 295 families,

but none has yet shown interest to return to Myanmar," he told reporters yesterday. He added that the authorities

were fully prepared to transport the Rohingyas to the two transit camp, where they would be temporarily sheltered before being handed over to Myanmar.

Myanmar had cleared the names of 3,450 Rohingyas from a list of 22,000 plus Rohingyas sent by Bangladesh. In early August, Bangladesh provided the approved list to the UNHCR in Dhaka and sought its assistance in assessing their willingness to return to Myanmar.

Accordingly, officials of the UN High Commissioner for the Refugees (UNHCR) in Bangladesh and of the RRRC office conducted the assessment of 339 families out of 1,037 cleared by Myanmar.

"The process of assessing voluntariness will continue. We will see if anybody wants to return. The vehicles we have arranged [for their transportation to transit camps will also remain ready," Abul Kalam said.

On Myanmar's efforts, Dhaka University's Prof Imtiaz said a delegation from the country had visited Rohingya camps in July, while the Myanmar's Independent Commission of Inquiry visited the camps this week.

"The purpose of all these initiatives, as well as the repatriation move, are attempts to prove in the UN General Assembly in September that it has been sincere. It has actually been not," Myanmar is under pressure as two

years have passed since the Rohingya

Foreign Minister AK Abdul Momen said it was regrettable that none of the Rohingya interviewed as of yesterday was willing to return.

"Rohingyas lack trust [in Myanmar]. They fear that the safety and security in Rakhine is not enough. Therefore, the Rohingya leaders should be taken to Rakhine to prove that the situation there has improved," Momen said.

We were expecting repatriation to start. We are not losing hope. We'll continue to work on repatriation.'

Asked about the Rohingyas' demand, he said, "We cannot be held hostage to their demands. They have to achieve those after they return to their homeland."

If the Rohingyas stay here longer, they won't be comfortable, he said, adding that the Bangladesh government had already spent around Tk 2,500 crore for them and the donors may not be interested to release more funds in the future.

yesterday, UNHCR said it appreciated the consistent commitment by the government of Bangladesh to ensure that the refugees' decisions would be respected. Sumaia Aktar, 18, from Patuakhali's Mirzaganj upazila, was infected with dengue and admitted to Dumki Upazila Health Complex on August

Family sources said after being diagnosed at the complex, she was referred and admitted to Sher-E-Bangla Medical College Hospital (SBMCH) on August 16 and died there on August 19.

It took around two hours to reach SBMCH from Dumki, they said.

Dr S M Bakir Hossain, director SBMCH said Sumaia was admitted in the hospital with symptoms of diarrhoea and had blood in her

On August 18, she was transferred to the intensive care unit (ICU) after her condition deteriorated. She died despite their best efforts, he said.

Health and Family Welfare official of Dumki Upazila Health Complex Dr Shahin said they referred her to the SBMCH next day as her pressure fell and she was suffering from diarrhoea.

He said they referred only critical patient to SBMCH for better treatment.

Civil Surgeon of Patuakhali district Dr Hedayatul Islam said a trend is being observed that many dengue patients are being referred to district level hospitals from upazila health complexes.

Guardians of the patients in many cases tried to take them to divisional level hospitals for better treatment due to better road communication.

"We are trying to motivate doctors not to refer patients unnecessarily, he said.

Though a critical dengue patient in many cases needs ICU facilities, there are no ICUs or CCUs facilities in upazila level government health complexes across the country. Even many district level government hospitals also do not have the facilities.

Since August 8, hospitals outside Dhaka are receiving more dengue patients than those in the capital due to huge number of people travelling outside Dhaka for Eid.

Experts have termed this particularly alarming given the state of healthcare facilities in rural areas.

DGHS data shows a total of 59,592 patients admitted to different hospitals across the country till yesterday, of which 23,846 are outside Dhaka.

According to the DGHS there are 390 ICU beds in government hospitals across the country.

Assistant Director of the DGHS control room Dr Aysha Akhter said 60 patients are now undergoing treatment in ICUs in Dhaka.

There are 140 government hospitals at the district level and above, with 31,260 beds in total, while 524 hospitals with 20,026 beds in the upazila level and below, said Dr Satyakam Chakraborty, line director of DGHS's hospital services management.

The number of private hospitals and clinics across the country is 5,055 with 90,587 beds, he said.

Anamul Haque, civil surgeon of Faridpur General Hospital said there were eight upazila health complexes in Faridpur.

But only three of the eight upazila health complexes have pathological test facilities. So, most of the dengue patients have been admitted to FMCH for treatment. THREE PEOPLE DIE OF DENGUE

Texas death row inmate executed

A Texas man convicted of raping and strangling a 19-year-old college student was executed by lethal injection Wednesday, the fourth in the state so far this year.

The Texas Department of Criminal Justice confirmed the death of Larry Swearingen at 6:47 pm local time at the state prison in Huntsville. According to US media, the 48-yearold maintained his innocence until

DNA under the victim's fingernails was not their client's. The US Supreme Court denied a stay of execution on Wednesday evening.

Swearingen was convicted in 2000 in the death of Melissa Trotter, a college student with whom he had struck up a casual relationship, according to The Houston Chronicle.

The teenager was seen with in the United States, according to the Swearingen on December 8, 1998, the day she disappeared, and forensic evidence linked her to his car, the paper said. Trotter's body was found by hunters

in the woods weeks later with part of a pair of pantyhose wrapped around her neck and the other half found in his house, the paper said. Additionally, his wife said their

trailer was in disarray when she came home the evening of Trotter's disappearance. defense team Swearingen's emphasized that no biological or

DNA evidence was ever found.
