Trump under fire from American Jews over 'disloyalty' remark

AFP, New York

US President Donald Trump has been hit by a wave of criticism for accusing Jewish Democratic voters of "disloyalty," but his comment also highlighted the unease of some in the community with its traditional party of choice.

Trump, who has positioned himself as a staunch ally of Israel, made the remark on Tuesday night while criticizing Democratic politicians who support a boycott of the Jewish state.

"Where has the Democratic party gone?" Trump said, adding: "I think any Jewish people that vote for a Democrat, I think it shows either a total lack of knowledge or great disloyalty."

Asked about the comments before flying to Kentucky the following day, Trump -- in typical fashion -- doubled down: "You vote for a Democrat, you're being very disloyal to Jewish people and you're being very disloyal to Israel."

FROM PAGE 1 Both the operators have been demanding arbitration against the audit claims as per Bangladesh Arbitration Act 2001. But the BTRC remains non-responsive, saying that it would only follow the Telecommunication Act for its

decision. As per that section 46 of the Telecommunication Act, the telecom regulator can cancel the licence of an operator if it finds the operator's response unsatisfactory.

"This is public money and there is some procedure to realise the amount," said Jahurul, adding that they were only following the Act and relevant regulations.

Contacted M Hafizuddin Khan, a former comptroller and auditor general, said there was no scope of arbitration on a "government audit".

"I think this issue will be settled in the court as mobile operators still have objections over the audit methods," said Khan, also an adviser to a former caretaker government.

Officials of both GP and Robi told The Daily Star that they would try to convince the authorities to follow the procedure and move for an arbitration.

A senior executive of a mobile operator said they may even consider moving to the international court for a solution.

"The telecom regulator is not following proper laws...They are only trying to use their power to get the money in an unlawful way," said the executive, requesting anonymity.

Study finds reasons for case backlog

Some other causes behind the piles of pending cases include shortage of judges, lack of coordination different government among departments and a section of lawyers' unwillingness to settle cases quickly.

Many chief judicial magistrates and district and session judges were present at yesterday's event. According to the audit, 67 percent

of the nearly 1,500 respondents said they had faith in the judicial system. But only 13 percent of them prefer going to courts while the rest would rather have community leaders solve their disputes.

The report identified the time consuming and costly nature of legal procedures behind people's unwillingness to seek justice at

According to the report, in most

cases, it took two to five years to settle courts and the High Court Division, to visit courts 20 to 25 times.

On average, it took more than Tk 25,000 to settle a case, said the audit report.

The courts have a backlog of 35 lakh cases and the situation could have been much worse if everyone went to the courts with their issues, it observed.

The magistrate courts alone had 14 lakh cases pending in 2016.

the magistrate courts was only three percent and, on an average, at least 1,883 cases remained pending with each judge.

The findings were presented by ATM Morshed Alam, project manager of Justice Reform and Corruption Prevention at the GIZ.

The number of cases pending with chief judicial magistrates' courts increased by 14 percent between 2016 and 2017. At the session judges'
