Will hone variations with Vettori: Taijul

Whether home or abroad, Bangladesh are a side that depends on its spin attack to take wickets in Test matches. Experienced campaigner Shakib Al Hasan has led

the Tigers' spin department with the likes of fellow left-arm spinner Taijul Islam and young off-spinner Mehedi Hasan Miraz.

Taijul, just one wicket shy of becoming the quickest Bangladesh bowler to the landmark of hundred Test wickets, has been consistently and silently performing his role.

Shakib holds the current record, having reached the mark in 28 Tests. Taijul is expected to play his 25th Test against Afghanistan in Chattogram next month and the 27-year-old will be hoping to reach the mark and become just the third Bangladesh player to bag 100 wickets.

While he needs just one scalp to reach the mark, Bangladesh will be hoping for a few more from him and the spin department as a whole. Bangladesh spinners have taken 124 wickets in the last 10 Tests, while seamers accounted for just 24.

Shakib (17), Taijul (45) and Mehedi (43) have accounted for 105 of those 124 wickets. At home, the spinners are even more instrumental, having picked 161 wickets in the last 10 home Tests, with the pacers bagging a meagre 15.

Taijul said it was a challenge for the spinners to pick the bulk of the wickets and at home, where pitches offer greater assistance to spinners than overseas conditions.

"Obviously, it is a bigger challenge for spinners when we play at home as there are times when pacers are able to bowl just four or five overs due to the slowness of the pitch, and we [spinners] have to take the responsibility of bowling longer spells. At the same time, I should also mention that Test cricket gives us enough time to adjust and adapt to the pitch and read the mindset of the batsmen," Taijul told The Daily Star yesterday.

SPIN DOMINANCE

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
Taijul, who played in eight of Bangladesh's last 10 Tests, has taken 45 wickets – the highest over that period. Mehedi Hasan Miraz has 43 scalps in nine Tests and Shakib 17 wickets, having played four of the last 10 lests.

Former New Zealand left-arm spinner Daniel Vettori has replaced former Indian spinner Sunil Joshi as Bangladesh's new spin coach and Taijul was looking forward to working on his variations with Vettori.

"Sunil Joshi helped me to work on bowling consistently at a certain area for longer periods which worked well for me. Vettori is a legend; it is very fortunate for the spinners of Bangladesh that we are going to get his input. We will try to learn as much as we can from him. Personally, I would like to work on my variations with Vettori. In Test cricket, the opponents do the homework before facing the bowlers and so, the variations are very important for a spinner," he said.

Taijul has taken 47 wickets in his last 10 Tests for Bangladesh, including four fivewicket hauls, but he informed that things have been difficult for Bangladesh recently in the absence of Shakib.

"Things are tough without Shakib bhai. He has the experience and he is the number one all-rounder in the world. The opposition batsmen play him carefully, which creates chances for bowlers like us. His presence makes our job easy. He will join in the next series, which is good news for Bangladesh."

WI stumble in reply to India's 297

India's bowlers shared the spoils in putting the West Indies on the back foot at 82 for three in reply to their

opponents' first innings total of 297 at tea on the second day of the first Test at the Sir Vivian Richards Stadium in Antigua on Friday.

Pacers Mohammed Shami and Ishant Sharma were the first to strike in removing openers John Campbell and Kraigg Brathwaite before Ravindra Jadeja added to what was already an excellent day for the all-rounder when he claimed the wicket of debutant Shamarh Brooks.

Jadeja had played the key role in extending India's first innings as they were eventually dismissed on the stroke of lunch, the left-hander playing the dominant role as India added another 94 runs from their overnight position of 203 for six.

He was last out for 58, top-edging an attempted pull off home captain Jason Holder to give wicketkeeper Shai Hope his fifth catch of the innings.

Kemar Roach was the best of the West Indies bowlers with figures of four for 66 while fellow fast bowler Shannon Gabriel claimed three for 71.

It was Roach who gave the West Indies an ideal start to the day when he removed Rishabh Pant for 24, the attacking wicketkeeper-batsman offering a straightforward catch to Holder at second slip.

However, any hopes the hosts entertained of quickly polishing off the tourists' innings were frustrated by Sharma, who defied the West Indies for over an hour in contributing 19 to a 60-run eighth-wicket partnership with Jadeja.

Sharma's admirable defiance was eventually ended though by a slower delivery from Gabriel and Shami lasted just one delivery, being caught and bowled by Chase.

U-15s make flying start

Bangladesh made a dominating start to their title defence in the SAFF U-15 Championship with a 5-2 win over Bhutan at the Kalyani Stadium in Nadia,

The defending champions were in a spot of bother as Bhutan twice cancelled Bangladesh's lead during a goal-spree in the first 32 minutes, but the boys in red and green regained the lead just before the break and consolidated with two more goals after the break to take home a comprehensive opening win.

The win lifted Bangladesh to second position, equal on three points but behind leaders India on goal difference. Sri Lanka and Nepal have three points each too, from two matches apiece but they have an inferior goal difference while Bhutan have yet to open their account following consecutive defeats.

Al Amin Rahman gave Bangladesh the lead in the 15th minute with a header from a throw-in but Bhutan equalised two minutes later, taking advantage of Bangladesh goalkeeper Sabbir Gazi's hesitation. Al Mirad restored Bangladesh's lead from a goalmouth melee four minutes later, but a dreadful mistake from the Bangladesh goalkeeper helped the Bhutan boys draw level again.

However, Bangladesh went into the break with a lead as Shuvo Sarker, three minutes after coming off the bench, scored with a volley from in front of goal in the 45th minute.

Mirad scored his second goal with a tapin following an excellent build-up in the 80th minute before substitute Emon Babu put the icing on the cake in the fourth minute of stoppage time with a curling free-kick from the edge of the box.

The Bangladesh team's head coach Mostafa Anwar Parvez expressed his satisfaction over the victory. "A win is always pleasing, and this was an important win in the first match. The heat was oppressive, but the players tried their best. We would have been happier had the scoreline

Australia on brink of retaining Ashes

Hazlewood takes five as England skittled for 67

Hazlewood took five wickets as England were bowled out for just 67 on the second day of the

third Test at Headingley on Friday to leave Australia on the verge of retaining the Ashes.

This was England's lowest Ashes total since 1948 and the fourth time in 18 months they had been dismissed for under a hundred in a Test.

Fast bowler Hazlewood took 5-30 in an England innings wrapped up inside 28 overs.

Ashes-holders Australia, looking to go 2-0 up with two to play in this five-match series -- then strengthened their grip to be 171-6 in their second innings at stumps, a commanding lead of 283 runs.

Marnus Labuschagne was 53 not out.

A miserable day for England also saw captain Joe Root out for a duck on his Yorkshire home before he dropped a routine slip catch when Labuschagne had made 14.

England's woes compounded after tea when rising star Jofra Archer -- who had taken 6-45 in Australia's first-innings 179 -- limped off midway through an

over with cramp, although he did return to the field.

Labuschagne was dropped for a second time, on 42, when wicketkeeper Jonny Bairstow failed to hold a tough low chance diving to his right.

Trent Boult and Tim Southee led New Zealand's charge against Sri Lanka on day two of the rain-hit second Test in Colombo on Friday.

The pacemen claimed two wickets each as Sri Lanka reached 144 for six at lunch when rain came down and no further play was possible.

Skipper Dimuth Karunaratne moved from his overnight 49 to score 65 and provided the only bit of resistance in the morning session, which saw 29.3 overs bowled.

Boult took two early wickets in one over after Sri Lanka resumed the day at 85 for two.

Dhananjaya de Silva on 32 and Dilruwan Perera on five were at the crease.

Southee, like Boult, also delivered a double-wicket maiden as the duo put on a superb display of seam bowling under overcast conditions.

Boult got overnight batsman Angelo Mathews caught behind for two to reach a landmark of 250 Test wickets -- only the third Kiwi bowler to achieve the feat.
