Ex-footballer sets high-jump record

Having left athletics, Umme Hafsa Rumki tried her luck in football and saw a good future after being chosen as a member of senior women's football team. But the girl from Sirajganj again came back to the sport she loved most and broke a 15-year-old highjump record to justify her decision to continue as a high-jumper.

Rumki yesterday cleared 1.68 metres to set a new national record in high-jump of the 15th Trust Bank National Summer Athletics Championships at the Bangabandhu National Stadium. The class-12 student erased the previous record of Sathi Parvin, which had stood since = 2004, by 0.02 metres.

"I am really happy to set a national record. When I left football in 2017, many asked why I left football which could have earned me a lot of money. Those kinds of talk made me sad.

Since then, I promised to produce with football, but BFF did not allow good results in athletics which I love most and today all pains have gone," said Rumki, who is participating representing Bangladesh Jail.

Rumki had made a golden start in athletics when she first won gold medal in high-jump during the 2014 Junior Athletics championships before joining Bangladesh Army next year and won a bronze medal at senior level.

Afterwards, the domestic success of footballers like Krishna Rani Sarker, Israt Jahan Swapna, Maria Manda and Monica Chakma attacked her to enrol into football. As a goalkeeper, Rumki was part of the national under-16 team's tour of China, Japan and South Korea in build-up to the AFC U-16 Women's Championship in Thailand in 2017. She was also part of under-18 team and was selected for the senior team too.

"I wanted to play athletics along

that. So I left football to playing athletics. I don't have any regrets leaving football. I have belief that I can show something in athletics and today I have succeeded to produce a new national record," said Rumki.

Asked whether she could win a medal in the upcoming South Asian Games, Rumki said, "Indian and Sri Lankan high jumpers won gold medals clearing 1.75 metres in their respective national championships.

I am seven centimetres short of that. But I have been improving gradually as I won gold medal in 2018 Summer Athletics with 1.62 metres and then won gold medal in 2018 national championship with 1.65 metres and now 1.68 metres. If I can improve my technique and the federation provides me with necessary support, I can hope for a medal at the SA Games," said

Ronaldo hopes Messi joins him for dinner

"I don't know if it's ever happened in football, the same two guys, in the same stage, all the time. So ... it's not easy. Of course, we have good relationship. We not have dinner together yet, but I hope in the future.

"Of course I miss playing in Spain," he added. "We have that battle. He push me and I push him as well. So it's good to be part of the history of football."

Regardless of Ronaldo's intent, there might be somebody who would warn Messi against going to Ronaldo's house for dinner.

Pliskova, Federer ease into last sixteen

Czech third seed Karolina Pliskova, chasing her first Grand Slam title, advanced to the fourth round of the US Open yesterday by outlasting

Tunisia's Ons Jabeur 6-1, 4-6, 6-4. Pliskova, the 2016 US Open runner-up who could finish the fortnight as world number one, booked a spot in the last 16 against either British 16th seed Johanna Konta or China's 33rd-seeded Zhang Shuai.

After taking the first set in 26 minutes, Pliskova broke to open the second. Jabeur, ranked 62nd, had her right knee retaped and battled back to break Pliskova three times in the second set, the last on a

forehand winner to force a third set. Pliskova broke to start the third set and seized another in the fifth game on an errant Jabeur forehand before advancing on a backhand winner after two hours and

eight minutes.

In the men's section, five-time champion Roger Federer raced into the last 16 with a 6-2, 6-2, 6-1 rout of 58th-ranked Briton Dan Evans in just 80 minutes.

Third seed Federer, a 20-time Grand Slam winner, is looking for a first Flushing Meadows title since 2008. He will meet Belgian 15th seed David Goffin or Pablo Carreno Busta of Spain for a spot in the quarter-finals.

The Swiss great was brimming with confidence from the start, taking advantage of the speedy hardcourts under the open roof at Arthur Ashe Stadium on a warm and

sunny day. Federer, who is seeking his sixth U.S. Open title, rifled 48 winners and 10 aces to see off the overmatched Evans, who is now

0-3 lifetime against the 38-year-old. Federer has had limited court time since his epic defeat to Novak Djokovic at the Wimbledon final in July but appeared to

shake off any remaining rust with the win.

Hasan, Shirin fastest

Mohammad Hasan Mia dethroned Mohammad Ismail to become the fastest man in 100m sprint of Trust Bank 15th National Summer Athletics Championships clocking 10.61 seconds in electronic timer at the Bangabandhu National Stadium yesterday.

In women's 100m sprint, Shirin Akter of Bangladesh Navy retained her title, her national title in a row, after clocking 12.20 seconds while her teammate Shohagi Akter and Sharifa Khatun of Bangladesh Army won silver and bronze medals finishing with 12.47 seconds and 12.48 seconds respectively.

Hasan, who joined Bangladesh Army just a month ago, delivered the first gold for army in seven years since his successor Mohan Mia had won the 100m sprint in 2012 national athletics Championships.

Hasan, a class-10 student of BKSP, had lost to against Ismail of Bangladesh Navy, who had set a national record (hand-timing) in the national meet in February this

Day believes Bangladesh can beat Afghanistan

are a better side, both physically and technically, but his team can get the better of the Afghans if his players have a good day when the two sides meet in the first match of the second round of joint qualifiers for the 2022 World Cup and the 2023 Asian Cup in Dushanbe, Tajikistan on September 10.

Bangladesh, currently ranked 182nd in FIFA, have not beaten Afghanistan, 33 positions higher than them, at senior level in the last four decades. The coach understands the magnitude of the challenge, but recent performances and his own method of work give him confidence. "We've shown over the last 14

months that whoever we've played, we've given them a very good game fitness-wise and with the ball, we've matched them. Yes, Afghanistan are higher in FIFA rankings and it's going to be a very tough game, but it's a challenge that our players are looking forward to," Day said during a press conference at the Bangladesh Football Federation house yesterday.

The 26-member squad, barring the seven Abahani players, have been training in Dhaka for the last one week following a three-week break after the completion of the Bangladesh Premier League. Most of the focus in the last week's training was on regaining fitness and on technical aspects. The team management will start working on tactical aspects, especially regarding the opposition team, once they reach in Dushanbe.

The coach will likely have a look at the Abahani players, who were supposed to return from their AFC Cup engagement in North Korea

in the early hours of today, and announce his final 23-member squad in the evening ahead of tomorrow

morning's departure for Dushanbe. The coach, however, is pretty satisfied with the overall condition of the players -- fitness and performancewise - but he wants more in terms of

"I'm happy with the back four and the midfield, and the forwards are working hard. I would be happy if we could get more goals. The task for [Nabib Newaz] Jibon and Motin [Mia] is to take the league form to the international game," the coach said.

Whenever Bangladesh play against

under-23 teams, they were bigger and stronger than us too. We need to limit free-kicks and set-pieces where they can take advantage. We need to make it hard for them to score or get past you..... It's 11 men and against 11 men and if our 11 men can play better than them, then we can hopefully get

a positive result," Day said. Even though the gameplan for the Afghanistan match has not been chalked out yet, from the coach's assertion it is obvious that the team will play counter-attack based football. "Counter-attacking football has worked pretty well for us in the past, but we want to have more to it.
