Get prepared to make sacrifice for people

PM tells Chhatra League leaders, activists

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday asked the Chhatra League men to build themselves with the mentality to sacrifice for better serving the people.

"Stay above personal demands and gains, hold the mentality of sacrifice, follow the path of ideology and keep up the ideology of Chhatra League to build yourselves for giving something to the people of this country so that the departed soul of the father of the nation can rest in peace," she said.

The PM was addressing a discussion, organised by the BCL at the Gono Bhaban, marking the National Mourning Day.

She said if anyone wants to build himself as a worthy soldier of Bangabandhu's ideology, that person must work as a dedicated activist like him to work for the country and its people.

"The father of the nation had served the country and its people sacrificing everything in his life. We have to take a vow to work for the country and its people."

Hasina said all have to think how much they gave to the country and its people for which Bangabandhu sacrificed his life.

She said nobody can become a true leader without an ideology and principle. "One may become a leader temporarily, but that leadership can't give anything to the country and the nation."

The PM said gaining the love

and trust of the people is the biggest achievement for any political leader. "And Bangabandhu had achieved that for which the people of the country as

well as the world still remember him." She said Bangabandhu's killers not only killed him, but also wanted to make Bangladesh a failed state by erasing the country's history.

Hasina mentioned that conspirators killed Bangabandhu as he liberated Bangladesh and put the war-ravaged country on a strong footing in just three and a half years.

"Had Bangabandhu been alive, the country would have been a developed and prosperous one in just 10 years. It would have been turned into 'Sonar Bangla' free from hunger and poverty. This was his lifelong dream." Highlighting the sacrifice of her

mother Bangamata Fazilatunnesa Mujib, the PM said, "My mother lived a simple life. She did so even after Bangabandhu became the prime minister."

Praising the role of Chhatra League in all previous political movements, she said all the successes of the people came through the sacrifices of BCL men.

BCL President Rezwanul Haque Chowdhury Shovon and General Secretary Golam Rabbani, among others, spoke on the occasion.At the programme, a one-minute silence was observed to show respect to the victims of the August 15 massacre.

Cops using tow trucks to extort money

Transport leaders, workers complain to DMP chief

Transport owners and workers yesterday alleged that policemen were using tow trucks in the capital to extort money from drivers.

They made the allegations during a discussion organised by Dhaka Metropolitan Police on bus services at Rajarbagh Police Lines.

The owners and workers even made a commotion when Dhaka Metropolitan Police Commissioner Asaduzzaman Miah in his speech said police do not use the tow trucks unnecessarily.

The commissioner later said action would be taken against police officials if they used the tow trucks "to show off power and make money".

The commissioner said police would use tow trucks if anyone obstructed the road by haphazardly

parking vehicles. Similar action would be taken for speeding and creating Khondaker Enayet Ullah, general

secretary of Dhaka Road Transport Owners Association, said, "Vehicles owners are exasperated by the nuisance of tow trucks. It would be wrong if you term it misuse, it rather has become a business. This must be stopped."

Enayet also said bus stops designated by police should be rationalised.

Asaduzzaman said the DMP had held meetings with transport owners and workers several times in the last five years to discuss how to bring order on roads and to identify the challenges. But the issues have never been properly addressed as other SEE PAGE 13 COL 2

Almost all Rohingyas have taken shelter in refugee camps in Cox's Bazar and have been living on humanitarian assistances provided by the Bangladesh government and international and national aid groups.

Recently, the youth allegedly circulated a fake indecent photo of the victim to some social media accounts using a messaging app, he said.

On Friday afternoon, the stalker stopped her while she was returning home after her coaching classes and gave her the same proposal, which she rejected again. At this, the youth threatened that he would spread the photo to other

social media users, Ruhul alleged. Coming home, Rupa told her mother about the incident and later went to her room. Returning from work, Ruhul found Rupa's room locked from inside. He knocked the door several times and got no response. At one point, he broke the door and found Rupa lying on the

floor unconscious, he said. She was first rushed to Bhandaria upazila health complex and then to Barishal Sher-e-Bangla Medical College Hospital where she was declared dead, Ruhul said.

After the news spread, students of Rupa's school, their guardians and teachers formed a human chain in Bhandaria town, demanding the immediate arrest of the stalker.

Later in the day, police detained the youth in the same village, Hyatul Islam Khan, superintendent of police in the district, told The Daily Star.

"We will take further action on receiving the allegation in writing," he

said, adding, "We're investigating." He also said the body was sent for

autopsy.

(Bangladesh time), excluded names of about 19.07 lakh applicants. Indian media reported that most of them were Bangla-speaking people.

Talking to Indian news channel Times Now later in the day, Momen said, "Indian Foreign [external affairs | Minister Dr Subrahmanyam Jaishankar told me that this [NRC] is purely an internal issue of India, and Bangladesh doesn't have to worry about it. Under no circumstances, Bangladesh would be affected, he said. We leave it that way."

Asked whether those left out of the list were from Bangladesh, the minister said, "I don't think so."

He said, "There is no reason why Bangladeshis should move to India. Bangladesh is doing much better and therefore it does not look like there is any interest in any Bangladeshi to go to India. In Bangladesh, even the per capita income is higher than the cost of living. There is no possibility of [their] moving to India."

Jaishankar visited Dhaka last month and held a joint press briefing after a meeting with Momen on August 20.

Asked about concerns that some Bangla-speaking million people were at risk of losing Indian

citizenship for failing to be in the border areas of Sylhet which shares draft NRC, Jaishankar had said, "This is an internal matter of India."

On that day, Momen told reporters

that India asked Bangladesh not to worry about the NRC issue. "We said we are already in serious trouble with 1.1 million Rohingyas ... They [Jaishankar] said 'you don't worry at all about it'." One held over murder of Rangpur boy

Members of Rapid Action Battalion yesterday arrested a man in Rangpur for his alleged involvement in the brutal murder of 14-year-old Abdur

The arrestee -- Al-Amin Sardar Babu, 25, of the city's Satgara Mistripara area -- was held at his home, said Motahar Hossain, assistant superintendent of Rab-13.

Abdur Rasid, son of a vegetable vendor in the district, was stabbed by a group of alleged extortionists and then shoved in front of a speeding bus in Rangpur city on Thursday night.

Around 4:20am on Friday, the boy lost his battle for life at Rangpur Medical College Hospital. Shahidar Rahman, the victim's

father, filed a case with the district's Kotwali Police Station on Friday accusing six persons.

He alleged that his son was killed his before elder son Mohan Mia denied to pay Tk 500 as extortion to Mozaffar Hossain, prime accused in the murder case.

According to rights groups, the exercise also made people in Assam -- mostly Hindus and Muslims under suspicion of being illegal immigrants -- spend more than Rs 7,800 crore on hearings, besides claiming the lives of around 60 people.

Four of them were killed in police firing during a pilot project in western Assam's Barpeta in July 2010, a few died in accidents during trips to the NRC service centres for hearings, while the rest allegedly died of shock and anxiety because of the fear of becoming stateless.

State Home Department officials said though the NRC was called "final", the people excluded would have opportunities to be back on the citizens' list if they appeal against their exclusion and establish their citizenship via courts.

The Assam government has already ruled out detention of people who do not figure in the list "in any circumstances" till the time Foreigners Tribunals declare them foreigners.

Each excluded person will have 120 days to file an appeal at any of the existing 100 Foreigners' Tribunals -- 200 more are to be established within a month -- which in turn will have to dispose of the cases within six months. The appellant then has the option of approaching the High Court

and the Supreme Court. Indian government sources said no one would be sent to detention centres until all legal options are exhausted.

Assam's ruling Bharatiya Janata Party, main opposition Congress and All Assam Students Union, which had waged a six-year-long violent agitation against foreigners in Assam between 1979 and 1985 before the Assam Accord was signed envisaging the NRC, expressed unhappiness with the final NRC.

The AASU said it would move the Supreme Court against "all the faults" in the final NRC.

Hundreds of people began thronging these offices soon after the

list was released, with many returning home happy and several others disappointed.

Ramen Deka, the BJP lawmaker from Mangaldoi, said a large number of illegal Muslim immigrants made the cut while many indigenous people were left out. "We are not at all happy. The

Addressing a press conference in Guwahati, Gogoi said the final figure of exclusion did not even come close to the figures officially announced by authorities on various occasions.

Assam Finance Minister and senior BJP leader Himanta Biswa Sarma, deplored that many people who came to India as refugees before 1971 were not included in the final citizenship roll. He demanded that the Supreme

Court allow reverification of at least 20 percent of people included in the list in districts bordering Bangladesh and 10 percent in the rest of Assam. A plea for reverification by Assam and Indian governments was earlier rejected by the top court. "Names of many Indian citizens

who migrated as refugees prior to 1971 have not been included in the NRC because authorities refused to accept refugee certificates. Many names got included because of manipulation of legacy data as alleged by many," he tweeted. The Assam Public Works (APW),
