## It's a proud moment: Shah

Afghanistan batsman Rahmat Shah came agonisingly close to becoming the first player to score a hundred for the side in the longest format of the game when he was dismissed on 98 during the second Test against Ireland in March earlier this year.

That missed opportunity seems to have had a huge impact on the stylish right-hander as he displayed sheer class and determination to finally achieve the feat in his very next Test match, the one against Bangladesh which began yesterday.

The 26-year-old created history by becoming the first Afghan to score a century in Tests. More importantly though, the ton helped his side avert a crisis as Afghanistan were struggling on 48 for two at one point on the first day of the one-off Test at the Zahur Ahmed Chowdhury stadium in Chattogram.

Rahmat took his time at the crease, adjusted to the pace of the pitch and negotiated the good deliveries with tremendous focus and concentration as Afghanistan went on to post 271 for five.

Rahmat and fellow veteran batsman Asghar Afghan paired up to add 120 runs for the fourth wicket against the hosts, who opted for an all-spin bowling approach.

The right-hander eventually reached the feat

with a boundary off a Nayeem Hasan delivery but was ultimately dismissed on 102.

"I dreamt of becoming the first centurion for Afghanistan so naturally I was very upset when I got out on 98 against Ireland. Today, I got the chance and scored a century. It is a proud

moment for me. I was the first person to have a half century [in Tests] for the country and now the full century," a jubilant Rahmat told reporters yesterday.

Rahmat said the feat was made possible through hard work he put in at the four-day practice matches which prepared him for the longer version. Rahmat also opined that his side are in a good position in the ongoing match despite having lost an extra wicket.

"It was my plan to play on the front foot. They were bowling with good line and length and had a good field setup for me. It was not easy for me to score runs that is why I was using the crease and coming on the front foot," he said.

## BD qualify for T20 WC

An unbeaten 37-ball 32 from Sanjida Islam helped Bangladesh register a dominant four-wicket victory over their Irish counterparts in an ICC Women's T20 World Cup qualifier match in Dundee, Scotland yesterday.

With this win, the Tigresses have already qualified for the showcase event of women's cricket for the second time in a row.

Having emerged unbeaten from the group stages, Bangladesh continued their winning run in the qualifying tournament by chasing down Ireland's sub-par total of 85 all out in 20 overs with nine balls to spare. Opener Murshida Khatun scored a 15-ball 13 while Ritu Moni contributed with a 27-ball 15 in the middle. However, it was Sanjida's match winning unbeaten knock, featuring three boundaries, which helped the Tigresses book a spot in the final.

Earlier, after being asked to bat, Bangladesh leg-spinner Fahima Khatun dealt heavy damage by picking up three wickets for 18 runs in four overs. The

Tigresses displayed a disciplined bowling attack on the day as all the other bowlers -- Jahanara Alam, Nahida Akter, skipper Salma Khatun and Ritu Moni -- got a wicket each from their allotted four overs.

Nahida spelled the beginning of the end for Ireland by removing opener Gaby Lewis on a run-a-ball five in the second over of the innings. All-rounder Jahanara soon joined the party, rattling Mary Waldron's stumps in the third over and by the time skipper Salma sent Kim Garth packing in the sixth over, Ireland were left reeling on three for 14. However, Ireland captain Laura Delany's 39-ball 25 and Eimear Richardson's 17-ball 25 in the middle helped the side avert utter humiliation.

Bangladesh, who won the qualifiers for the 2018 T20 World Cup, will now face Thailand -- who beat Papua New Guinea by eight wickets in yesterday's other semifinal -- in the final on September 7. The top two teams from the competition will go through to the T20 World Cup, which is to be held in Australia late next year.

## Tigers' spin ploy yet to bear fruit

It was anticipated that the one-off Test between Bangladesh and Afghanistan would be a battle between the spinners of both sides and that seemed to be what was in store when Tigers' skipper Shakib Al Hasan opted for an all-spin attack.

After the first day Afghanistan, playing just their third Test match, were the happier team courtesy of Rahmat Shah, who became his country's first Test centurion, and Asghar Afghan's unbeaten 88 as the visitors posted 271 for five at stumps yesterday.

With the aim being to outplay the opposition with spin, the home side were desperately hoping for assistance from the pitch at the Zahur Ahmed Chowdhury Stadium (ZACS) in Chattogram, where Shakib gambled on winning the toss and batting first.

But luck did not favour the hosts as Rashid Khan won the toss and expectedly opted to bat. There was then not much of a threat from a Bangladesh spin department that has less variety when compared to Afghanistan's wide range of spinners in leg-spinners like Rashid Khan, Qais Ahmed, chinaman bowler Zahir Khan and off-spinner Mohammad Nabi.

While an all-spin attack may seem unusual, it is now the second consecutive home Test that Bangladesh have opted for the strategy, with the second Test against West Indies last year, which they won by an innings and 184 runs, also being devoid of home pacers.

One could criticise the tactic but the team management recognized the reality of not having any express seamer who could trouble batsmen regardless of pitch and conditions.

But things did not go in Bangladesh's favour as the likes of Shakib, Taijul Islam, Mehedi Hasan Miraz and Nayeem Hasan -- all conventional spinners -- mostly rely on help from the pitch and so tried to bowl in good areas as there was no real help from

the pitch throughout the first day.

However, the first session belonged to the Tigers courtesy of some tight bowling from Taijul, who provided the first breakthrough by dismissing Ihsanullah and then scalped Ibrahim Zadrar courtesy of slight turn. Mahmudullah Riyad picked the third wicket of Hashmatullah Shahidi just before lunch, raising hopes of Bangladesh turning the screw on their less experienced opponents in the second session.

But due to a lack of diversity in the bowling line-up and the absence of substantial purchase from the pitch despite some odd deliveries keeping low, the spinners looked helpless in the second session. Credit must also be given to the two Afghan batters Rahmat and Asghar for their composed, judicious run-scoring.

Both made sure they covered the line of the ball and also took big strides to negate whatever spin was on offer and started to score freely.

Shakib used as many as eight bowlers, which included seven spinners along with Soumya Sarkar's medium pace, but they were all largely ineffective due to an unresponsive pitch.

It was young Nayeem who, because of his height, had some sort of variation in his off spin and had the batsmen in two minds because of his extra bounce. He brought Bangladesh back into the game with two wickets in the 70th over, including centurion Rahmat off a loose shot immediately after the right-hander brought up the landmark.

It will be interesting to see how the pitch behaves in the coming days, but for Bangladesh it is almost proven that even the spinners -- considered the main weapon in Tests -- are handicapped without the help from the pitch.

It seemed to be a simple assignment against the newest Test team, but on the evidence of the first day, it will not be an easy road for the Tigers as they will have to bat last against a varied spin department, having already conceded a competitive total.

### FASTEST TO 100 TEST WICKETS FOR TIGERS

Taijul Islam became the fastest to scalp 100 Test wickets among Bangladesh bowlers. In his 25th Test against Afghanistan, the 27-year old left-arm spinner claimed the wicket of Ihsanullah in the early morning session at the Zahur Ahmed Chowdhury Stadium to achieve the feat. Taijul bettered the records set by Bangladesh skipper Shakib Al Hasan and former left-arm spinner Mohammad Rafique, who reached the mark of 100th Test wickets in their 28th and 33rd match respectively.

### UNDER-17 FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP

## Success leads to 2nd edition

Unilever Bangladesh has organised the second edition of the Clear Men's U-17 Football Championship, which will take place across the country from September 15, following the impressive turnout of school teams which made the inaugural edition such a success last year.

Throughout the course of the competition, a selection panel will select six footballers -- a goalkeeper, defender, midfielder, striker and two wingers -- who will get the opportunity to attend a week-long training camp at Manchester City Club ground. In addition, the six lucky booters will get to watch the current English Premier League champions, Manchester City, in action at their home venue, the Etihad Stadium.

With 272 schools from across the country in participation, the first round of the championship, which will be played on a knockout basis through the Khulna and Rangpur Divisions while it will end through the Mymensingh and Dhaka Divisions on October 18. The 16-team final round will begin on October 22 while the tournament final is set to take place on October 30.

This announcement was made at a city hotel yesterday with some of the footballers who participated in the first edition in attendance. Jogen Larka, a striker of defending champions Sonadighi High School of Rajshahi, was one of the few who came forward to talk about his experiences on the occasion. It should be mentioned that the grade-11 student recently visited Brazil, where he underwent a one-month training programme.

"When we started this championship last year, we didn't know whether we would be successful or could contribute to Bangladesh football but it was a life-changing experience as the tournament turned into an pure entertainment with a lot of spectators watching each of the matches," said

Nafees Anwar, marketing director of the personal care unit of Unilever Bangladesh during the jersey unveiling and press meet yesterday.

Anwar added that fashion house Sailor and Chinese mobile manufacture Tecno are involved with the tournament.

Rezwanul Hue, a representative of Tecno and Bangladesh Football Federation president Kazi Salahuddin were among others present on the occasion.
