



10th death anniversary of

Shah Abdul Karim

Ten years ago, on this day, Baul Shah Abdul Karim passed away. His compositions, lyrics and philosophy, play a valuable role in our culture.

Shah Abdul Karim always referred to his compositions as *Baul Gaan*. He explored the roots of Baul philosophy through his music, much like Hason Raja, Radharaman Dutta, Ukil Munshi, Durbin Shah and many others.

Born in 1916 in Derai,

an upazila of Sunamganj in Sylhet, Bangladesh, Shah Abdul Karim was raised in a musical family. Growing up in poverty, he did not attend school, and started expressing his emotions musically from a very young age.

He gained the

knowledge of music and spirituality under the tutelage of Baul Shah Ibrahim Mastan Baksh. In 1957, Shah Abdul Karim started living in Ujan Dhol, a village near his home, with his wife, who greatly inspired his music. The atmosphere and the people of the village also played a key role in his life. Shah Abdul Karim's compositions showcase deep thoughts of spirituality. Some of his notable songs include Murshid Dhono He Kemone Chinibo Tomare, Nao Banailo Banailo Re Kon Mestori, Ashi Bole Gelo Bondhu and Mon Mojale Ore Bawla Gaan, among many others.

He also wrote Gono Sangeet (songs of the masses), through which he expressed his feelings about the sufferings of mankind in a capitalist society. He has written and composed over 1,600 songs, which were compiled into six books. These books are Aftab Sangeet (1948), Gono Sangeet (1957), Kalnir Dheu (1981), Dholmela (1990), Bhatir Chithi (1998) and Kalnir Kooley (2001).

Before his death, Shah Abdul Karim was honoured with the title of Baul Samrat.

BBFA to be held for the first time

During a press conference held recently, it was announced that the Bharat Bangladesh Film Awards (BBFA) will take place for the first time. The occasion is scheduled to be held in Dhaka at International Convention City Bashundhara (ICCB), on October 21.

Film Federation of India (FFI) will organise the award ceremony. Superstars Alamgir and Kabori, along with renowned

media personalities, Imdadul Haq Milon, Khorshed Alam Khosru, Bappy Chowdhury, Symon Sadik, Firdausal Hasan (FFI President) and Tapan Roy (FFI Executive Committee Member), spoke at the press conference.

Bangla films released between June 2018 to June 2019 in Bangladesh and India, will compete for the awards. A total of 24 awards will be handed out, in three different categories – Popular, Technical and Regional.

tegories – Popular, Technical and Regiona The awards will cover Best Film, Best Producer, Best Actor (Male) and Best Actor (Feale), Best Co-Actor (Male) and Best Co-Actor (Female), Best Singer (Male and Female), Best Music, Popular Film of the Year, Life Time Achievement, Best Story,

The jury board from Bangladesh will include Alamgir, Kabori, Imdadul Haq Milon, Khorshed Alam Khosru and Hasibur Reza, while the other half will comprise of Goutam Ghosh, Bratya Basu, Gautam Bhattacharya, Anjol Bose and Tanushree Chakraborty.

Karam Utshab concludes in Sylhet

The indigenous communities of the tea gardens in Sylhet celebrated their largest traditional festival, Karam Utshab, with a call for the enactment of a law to protect their tradition, culture, language and environment. The festival began on Thursday and concluded on Tuesday, at Khan Tea Garden under the Jayantapur

upazila of Sylhet.

People from different districts attended the festival and performed their rituals. On the opening night, the community people, led by the chief, prayed under the 'Holy Karam' tree. They brought out a colourful procession, accompanied by dance, songs and traditional instruments. They paraded

A discussion meeting, organised by Sujit Baraik, a resident of Khan Tea Garden, was also held on Monday night, where indigenous priest, Angat Baraik, led the festival. He said that young girls observed a fast from dawn to dusk, on the first day of the festival. During the afternoon of the fourth day, the youths went out from the village in a colourful procession to collect branches of the Karam tree from their vicinity. The girls took the branches back to their village, while the boys joined them to sing and dance.

At sunset, an altar was built, where they planted the branches of the Karam tree.
Young men and women danced around

planted according to their ritual. Later, a *puja* began, where the priest recited verses explaining the significance of the festival. The event ended on Tuesday morning, through the immersion of branches of the

Karam tree in the local canal.

AFM Zakaria, Head of the Anthropology
Department in Shahjalal University of
Science and Technology, attended the
programme as the chief guest. He said that
Karam Utshab is one of the major festivals
celebrated by the tea gardens' indigenous
families. It is a way for them to express
their affinity towards nature. However,
the unique culture is on the verge of

DUFS's Short Film Festival on Cultural Diversity and Peace concludes

With an aim to embrace diversity for a peaceful future, the Dhaka University Film Society (DUFS), in association with ActionAid, hosted their first international short film festival recently. The festival was organised at the Teacher Student Center (TSC). The theme of the event was cultural diversity and peace. The film festival featured screenings of 50 short films from 16 countries around the world. The films were chosen out of 116 entries. All of the films were screened in the TSC auditorium.

The first day of the festival included a panel discussion session and film screenings. The topic of the panel discussion was "Film as a medium of spreading cultural diversity and peace". Filmmaker Zahirul Hasan, Professor Mesbah Kamal from University of Dhaka, and Faria Chaudhuri, Deputy Director Programme, ActionAid Bangladesh, attended the panel discussion. The 1959 film *Hiroshima Mon Amour*, directed by Alain Resnais, was also

The second day featured short film screenings as well as the award-giving and closing ceremonies. It also featured the

screening of Satyajit Ray's Aguntuk.
The honourable guests on the second day
were Asaduzzaman Noor, MP, AAMS Arefin
Siddique, Moderator of Dhaka University

Film Society (DUFS), actor Mamunur Rashid, Farah Kabir, Country Director of ActionAid Bangladesh and Aman Ashraf Faiz, Managing

Director of GTV. Among the 50 short films screened at the festival, 20 were chosen for award nominations. The award categories included Best National Film, Best International Film, Best Cinematography, Best Story and Best Editing. A Flying Child, directed by Fazle Rabbi, won the Best National Film award. The Best International Film award was given to A Country in Moving Pictures, directed by Arjanmar Rebeta (Philippines). Antaraal, directed by Joy Chowdhury (Bangladesh), won the Best Cinematography award. The Best Story award went to Landless Song of Earth, directed by Pradip Ghosh (Bangladesh), and The Best Editing award went to The Third Identity, directed by Farid Ahmed (Bangladesh).

The call for entry for the short films began on July 4 and concluded on August 25. Short films from Philippines, Turkey, Kosovo, India, Lebanon and the UK among others, were submitted.

The festival ended with the screenings of two short films, that were productions of the seventh film workshop by DUFS. The films

were Jatragolpo and Sara Dupur.
The festival concluded on September 9.
