Are you willing to go to the depths of the earth to get your phone repaired? If not, in Gulistan you only need to descend one floor beneath the wearing sherwani and turban. ground.

For those who regularly visit the area, Gulistan Underground Market is not something new. After all, it also serves as a fourway underpass to cross the busy intersection.

The market was established around two decades ago, repurposing the underpass to a place for all your phone needs. Why did the constructors build such an expansive structure beneath the ground? Did they predict Dhaka would be home to millions more down the line and plan accordingly?

I recently visited the market alongside our photographer, who was eagerly waiting to take pictures of vendors effortlessly taking apart and fixing devices. As soon as we descended

down the stairs, we were presented with lines of shops -- all selling the same products and providing the same services. We couldn't wait to talk to the shopkeepers to know how they run their businesses.

But something was off. Whomever we approached would not talk. A lot of eyes were locked on us, tracking our actions. We didn't get straight answers to our simplest questions. They were clearly weary of us, but why?

We slowly got hints while walking along.

Taking photos was a challenging task. Our photographer was bombarded with questions like "why are you taking pictures?" and "where are you from?" The latter sounding more like a threat.

when the camera was pointed at them, similar to how grooms do with their handkerchief at weddings. But this was no wedding and they were not

Real talk, it's hard enough to get repairs done from reputed shops. Expecting topnotch parts and service from Gulistan, a place known for its "opportunistic activities", is perhaps expecting too much.

At one point of the conversation, Harun abruptly blurted out, "We don't buy or sell any phones here. We only repair and provide parts." But

## Each division to get 100-bed cancer centre

8 projects worth Tk 8,968cr okayed

The government has decided to establish a 100-bed cancer centre in each government medical college hospital in divisional cities at a cost of Tk 2,388.40 crore.

The decision was approved at a meeting of Executive Committee of National Economic Council (Ecnec) yesterday at NEC Conference Room in the capital's Shere-Bangla Nagar. It was chaired by Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina, also Ecnec chairperson.

Planning Minister MA Mannan briefed journalists after the meeting. He said the project will be implemented between October 2019 and September 2022. A 17-storey building each with necessary medical and

surgery machineries and equipment, vehicles and furniture will be added to eight medical college hospitals under the programme at Rajarbagh project. They are -- Kurmitola General Hospital in Dhaka, Mymensingh Medical College Hospital, Rajshahi Medical

Hospital and Sylhet MAG Osmani Medical College across the city. Hospital. Ecnec also approved another project worth Tk 225.49 crore for installing a 400KV double circuit electricity transmission line to import electricity from India's Jharkhand. It would be built from Rahonpur to Monakasha border in Chapainawabganj between July 2019 and December 2021, which will supply 1,496 megawatt

## 102 DNCC footpaths illegally occupied

Eviction to begin Sept 22 STAFF CORRESPONDENT

Dhaka North City Corporation (DNCC) has identified at total of 102 footpaths that are illegally occupied in different areas under its jurisdiction.

Announcing a drive starting from September 22 to free footpaths from illegal possession, DNCC officials presented the list at a meeting organised at DNCC building in Gulshan. The footpaths were

identified by DNCC officials in a recent investigation from five different zones. It showed that there are 39 occupied footpaths in zone-1, 12 in zone-2, seven each in zone-3 and zone-4, and 37 in zone-5. The eviction drive

will start from zone-1 in Uttara. Monitoring cells -consisting of six members including councillors and officer-in-charge of the respective police stations -- have been formed at different wards. The drive will continue till October 30, said sources.

Speaking at the meeting, **DNCC Mayor Atiqul Islam** said those who occupy the streets for business will be evicted.

11-year-old becomes

An 11-year-old girl died of dengue at the Intensive Care Unit of Dhaka Medical College Hospital yesterday.

Tarin, a fifth grader of East Machuakhali Government Primary School in Shariatpur, breathed her last at 2:30pm. She had been suffering from fever since last week of August. Initially, she received treatment after being diagnosed with dengue in Goshaighat Upazila Health Complex,

Tarin's aunt Shahida Akhter told The Daily Star. She was shifted to DMCH on September 12 after her condition deteriorated, Shahida said.

Tarin was the youngest among three siblings, said Shahida.

With her death, the unofficial death toll due to dengue has risen to 149. However, the official death toll stands at

## Railway knocks down 250 structures

Bangladesh Railways demolished 250 illegal structures in the capital's Shahjahanpur Railway Colony yesterday. The drive was carried out from 10am to 3:15pm and

it would continue until all illegal structures are evicted, Nazrul Islam, divisional estate officer of Dhaka, who led the drive, said.

Several other railways officials of Dhaka division were present on the site.

Most of the structures were tin-shed houses built in the last seven-eight years, he said.

"We will carry out a similar drive tomorrow [today] and if necessary, will continue in the next week," he told this newspaper last night. Railway sources said a quarter with vested interest has

been occupying a big part of railway land in the colony for years. They even built houses and shops there and rented those out to others.

## HC clears way for VNSC principal's appointment

The High Court (HC) yesterday cleared the way for newly appointed principal of Vigarunnisa Noon School and College (VNSC), Fouzia Rezwan, to join her post. The court lifted its stay order and without imposing any restriction on

her joining, issued a rule asking the government to explain in four weeks why the appointment of Prof Fouzia should not be declared illegal. The HC bench of justice M Enayetur Rahim and Md Khairul Alam

passed the order and issued the rule after hearing a writ petition filed by Supreme Court lawyer Eunus Ali Akond challenging the legality of the appointment of Prof Fouzia. The petitioner said in the petition that the governing body of VNSC is

the authority to appoint its principal as per relevant regulations, while the government has authority to appoint teachers. But the government illegally appointed Fouzia as principal of the

### JnU students evict encroachers from footpath on campus

Students of Jagannath University (JnU) yesterday evicted at least 30 illegal establishments right outside the campus.

Witnesses said some 300 students took part in demolishing more than 30 makeshift shops from the footpath, and a human haulier stand, from 10:30am to 11:30am.

Later, they staged a demonstration and brought out a procession on the campus shouting slogans against the grabbers.

"Various shops and a human haulier stand had occupied the footpaths and south entrance of the campus illegally for a long time," said marketing department student Mohammad Raisul Islam Nayan. "Despite our repeated warnings, the

grabbers did not pay any heed to remove the establishments, forcing students to demolish those," he added. "The university students removed

our shops and Laguna stand," said Salam Dhali, president of Bahadur Shah Paribahan Malik Samity. "The students do not want it here, so we

will go away," he said. "We have been doing our business for a long time here, but we did not take any permission from anyone for it," Salam added.

Salam did not reply when this correspondent asked how they ran their business for such a long time beside the JnU campus without permission of the concerned authorities.
