Farmgate hardly requires an introduction. Every day, vehicles of various shapes and sizes stop haphazardly to pick up or drop off passengers in the area, while people remain busy walking in all directions or rushing through or shoving each other to go about their destinations.

Amid the commotion, many also find time to buy something from vendors selling anything and everything. From glittering trinkets to handbags, watches, clothes, perfumes, fruits, food and even livestock -- if you crave

it, you will find it in Farmgate.
Every day, hundreds of
vendors set up their stalls to
sell products. The area buzzes
with activity way beyond
the "traditional" nine to
five working hours, and the
madness escalates on the
weekends.

This sprawling market, set up occupying the footpath beside Indira Road, has been thriving for years.

Made of bamboo, wood and plastic sheet, most makeshift shops cover almost the entire width of the footpath along Indira Road -- from near Tejgaon College to TNT field.

In some places, vendors have left a narrow gap in the middle of the sidewalk for customers to shop around.

"I've been commuting through the road for years. The situation has remained the same. Every day, women, children and the elderly are risking their lives and walking on the street amid traffic," Ratna Begum, a job holder, told The Daily Star recently.

Wishing anonymity, a senior official of Dhaka North City Corporation (DNCC) said they had tried to evict illegal shops many times, but to no avail. "They continue to encroach upon footpath and streets, despite our drives in cooperation with law

enforcers," he said. The official said

The official said some people must have encouraged vendors to occupy the sidewalk time and again. "Maybe they are paying for that... you need to inquire about it," he told this correspondent.

Contacted, Jane Alam Munshi, officer-in-charge of Sher-e-Bangla Nagar Police Station, said, "I don't know who they [vendors] pay money to. We are not involved in any such activity."

"I tried my best to keep the footpath free. It's not possible for us to oust them alone. There are political leaders; city corporation, Tejgaon College and market authorities, if I say anything about the issue they might take it otherwise," he said.

When asked how law enforcers were able to keep hawkers off the footpath during the Commonwealth Parliament Conference in 2017, the OC said, "I joined in January this year. My seniors can tell you about this."

Indira Road falls under ward-27 of DNCC.

Contacted, Councillor
Faridur Rahman Khan claimed
that number of hawkers in
the area used to be more than
2,000. "I was able to reduce it to
260 gradually," he said.

Dhaka students join global climate strike

'There is no planet B'

Hundreds of children from different schools and colleges in Dhaka staged a demonstration on Manik Mia Avenue yesterday, urging world leaders to act against climate change.

They also formed a human chain and brought out a

procession there, expressing solidarity with the "Global Climate Strike" in response to the call of Swedish climate activist Greta Thunberg.

As part of the movement, green activists, NGO workers

and students formed human chains at several places in the capital to generate awareness on climate crisis.

Criticising developed nations for their role, green activists called for reducing carbon emissions to limit the global warming to 1.5 degree Celcius. They also sought an

active role of world leaders in this regard.

Save the Children in Bangladesh and Green Saver
Association jointly organised the event, engaging children
and youth platforms including Girl Guides and Rover
Scout Bangladesh.

Students at the event declared "climate emergency" in Bangladesh.

On August 20, 2018, Swedish climate activist Greta Thunberg, then in ninth grade, decided not to attend school until the 2018 Sweden general election on September 9 after heat waves and wildfires in Sweden. Holding a placard that read, "School strike for climate", she staged a protest outside the Swedish parliament.

The school strike for climate, also known as Fridays

for Future (FFF), is now an international movement of school students who take time off from class to participate in demonstrations to demand action to prevent further global warming and climate change.

The movement is not only spreading among children

around the world but also at policy-making levels in the countries most vulnerable to climate change.

Oli Ahmed demands arrest of JU VC

Liberal Democratic Party (LDP) President Oli Ahmed yesterday demanded immediate arrest of Jahangirnagar University Vice Chancellor Prof Farzana Islam for her alleged involvement in corruption and bribery.

He demanded that those involved with her be also arrested and the others working behind the scene be exposed.

The senior politician made the remarks at a press conference on current affairs, organised by "Jatiya Mukta Mancha", a coalition of political parties, at LDP office in the capital.

"It is unthinkable that the chief of one of the highest academic institutions is involved in bribery," said Oli.

"The government is saying that they will take steps if there are proofs. How many proofs do you need?" he said.

Chevening Scholarship, funded by the Foreign and Commonwealth Office and partner organisations, offers the opportunity to study for a one-year master's degree at any of the UK's leading universities.

The scholarships are awarded to outstanding established or emerging

Since 1983, around 300
Bangladeshis have studied in the UK under the Chevening Scholarship Programme. From around the world, the number is some 50,000. This year, 13 Chevening scholars from Bangladesh were selected to study in the UK.

Palmer can study in world class universities. They can avail various opportunities to network widely. When they finish, they become members of

an alumni network of 50,000 worldwide," said Palmer.
