er variety of wildlife has

today, in many ways, remind me of my first encounter with America in 1977. An easygoing attitude belies considerable practical ingenuity. There is an informal directness, a propensity for humour coupled with an irreverence borne of a frontier spirit.

One immediately sees it in the language. Australians generously allot nicknames often ending with a "y" or "ie". Thus, a "tinny" is an open aluminium boat, a "mozzie" is a mosquito, a "barbie" is a barbeque, a "blowie" is a blow fly, a "tradie" is a tradesman... you get the idea!

My search took me to many wild places and everywhere I was surprised by the Australian love for the outdoors. It was hot and yet most people had no problem trekking (or, in one case, waiting to see crocodiles) in the heat. I found tents or campers unexpectedly in the middle of nowhere and encountered many hikers, birders, fishermen, boaters and other outdoorsmen, always ready to chit chat.

The creature that impressed me most was the Crocodile. I had no idea of the menace they pose in Australia. One has to be extremely cautious of going into any water body - pond, creek, river, waterfall - because Crocodiles may be lurking. Even a small isolated pond could harbour Crocodiles that had arrived with a flood.

Water Buffalos and Camels were introduced to Australia years ago. Several untamed generations later, both species have gone wild. Roaming Buffalos are extremely dangerous and attack people. The Camels are found

in the desert center of the country. Kangaroos and their younger versions, Wallabies, turned out to be very shy when I saw them. I also saw Tree Kangaroos, Mouse Kangaroos as well as the Platypus which I wrote about in an earlier column.

I learned there are over 500 species of Eucalyptus trees (called gum trees) in Australia. They fit in very well in the environment; thus I found many birds in them. Unfortunately the Eucalyptus (along with Mahogany and Acacia) in Bangladesh are devoid of birds.

Perhaps because of their irreverent attitude, Australians are not hero worshippers. One exception is Ned Kelly, a sort of Robin Hood figure from the 1800s who robbed from the rich and gave to the poor. Curiously, the novel "Ned Kelly and the Gang" by Peter Carey is the only novel I've read without commas. It won him the Booker Prize.

I saw an example of Aussie ingenuity in the East Alligator river which divides Kakadu National Park from Arnhem Land, an area owned by the Aborigines. Instead of a bridge across the river, they have paved a road hugging the bottom. When tides move in, water movement is so ferocious that a bridge would not last long. Instead, the Australians "ford" the river in their cars and the road does not require as much maintenance as a bridge would.

A sweet surprise came at dinner one night. I ordered a dessert called "Sticky Dates" expecting a concoction made from dates - instead I was treated to a delicious dark cake oozing with caramel syrup. It reminded me that one should expect the unexpected in the land that brought us the boomerang!

With expansive fields of "kash phool" dancing in the breeze and beautiful azure sky speckled with cottony clouds turning into a kaleidoscope of pink, orange and gold during sunset -- autumn is here and so is the time to welcome Goddess

Durga! Like elsewhere in the country, Sylhet city is buzzing with activity in preparation for the Sharadiya (autumnal) Durga Utsab. This year's puja will be held on October 4-8.

In autumn, Durga, the goddess of power, visits her father's home on earth.

The festival ends with the celebration of Bijaya Dashami when the goddess leaves earth for heaven.

With the biggest religious festival of Bengali Hindu community just a few days away, artisans, organisers and instrumentalists are passing busy days to welcome the goddess.

In Sylhet division, around 2,600 mandaps (worship pavilions) have been set up, including 66 in the city.

Rajat Kanti Gupta, general secretary of Bangladesh Puja Udjapan Parishad in Sylhet city, said, "The Hindu community in Sylhet has taken adequate preparations for the celebration of Durga Puja. We have also taken security measures in every mandap." Meanwhile, artisans are working extra hours

to meet the demand. Visiting several studios at Lamabazar, Mirjajangal and Dariapara areas in the city this week, this correspondent saw that they were putting finishing touches to idols. Artisans said though idol-making process is lengthy, they have finished almost all works

and are now decorating the idols with colours, clothing and ornaments. There was a sense of joy and pride among them, since the entire process of creating an idol -- from clay to ornamentation -- not just requires

devotion and diligence, it has also been passed down from generation to generation. Ballabh Narayan Mrit Shilpalaya in Dariapara has been making Durga idols for over four generations. Now, brothers Nandalal Paul and Dulal Paul run the business.

Though extremely busy, they made some time for this correspondent, and said usually it costs around Tk 30,000 to one lakh to create a full set of idols. A complete set has Durga, Lakshmi,

Saraswati, Kartik, Ganesh and Ashur along with their carriers -- lion, owl, swan, rat, peacock and

Besides artisans, percussion instrument makers are also busy at work in Chowhatta and Kadamtali areas. Makers of these instruments -dhol, dhak (big drum), mridanga (a two-faced drum played with hands), khol, dholok, dugi, khamok, naal, tabla and khonjori -- an integral part of the puja, are busy trying to meet their orders.

Kirtan (devotional songs) performers or kirtaniyas, who perform at different temples during the puja, are thronging the workshops to repair their old and damaged instruments.

With makers working, kirtaniyas testing their instruments and singing a song or two -- the ambience is not only vibrant, but also lifting mood of passers-by.

To make sure that the festival is held peacefully with due religious fervour, law enforcers have the festival."



BNP'S DIVISIONAL GATHERING IN RAJSHAHI Uncertainty looms over

tomorrow's rally ANWAR ALI, Rajshahi

Despite adequate preparations, uncertainty looms large over BNP's divisional rally in Rajshahi -- to be held tomorrow -- as the authorities have denied their request for the venue.

BNP leaders yesterday alleged that their arrangements are further being affected since law enforcers are arresting their leaders and activists ahead of the rally.

Police officials acknowledged arresting "some BNP men" from different districts, but following "prior warrants". BNP leaders also alleged that transport owners have threatened to hold

a strike on the day of the rally. The party leaders, however, vowed to hold the rally tomorrow. The

decision was taken at a meeting at BNP office in the city on Thursday, chaired by city unit President Mosaddek Hossain Bulbul. "The authorities cannot keep us away from exercising our political rights," Ruhul Kuddus Talukder, BNP divisional organising secretary, told this correspondent yesterday. "Our senior leaders are trying to get

permission for a venue by contacting top leaders of the ruling party." He said the rally is important for them as they want to establish democratic practices in the country as well as free their chairperson Khaleda Zia.

Early this month, local leaders sought permission from Rajshahi Deputy Commissioner Hamidul Islam for using the field of Haji Muhammad Mohsin Government High School. Known as Madrasa Maidan, the field is widely used for holding political gatherings.

They also sought security clearance from Rajshahi Metropolitan Police.

On Thursday, Hamidul denied BNP's request while RMP is yet to respond,
