Defeated, but not conquered

Bangladesh rose above their usual standards and displayed uncharacteristic valour their 2022 World Cup Qualifier match against Qatar before going down 2-0 to the Asian champions

at the Bangabandhu National Stadium yesterday. The scoreline may suggest a meek surrender but the actual story on a wet pitch was a different one as the men in red and green gave their much

superior opponents a run for their money and a draw would not have been an outlandish result, given the competitiveness showed by the hosts. The five changes to the starting eleven that was held to a disappointing draw by India in

their last match was evidence enough of how eager Qatar were to correct course but they faced stiff resistance from Bangladesh, who formed two defensive lines to thwart Qatar's attack on the rain-soaked pitch.

The game was expected to be played in Bangladesh's half and that is how it panned out, but unexpectedly Bangladesh showed courage and wherewithal to attack on the break from the very beginning, causing hairy moments for a team ranked 125 places above them.

Nabib Newaj Jibon was presented a nice ball on the left flank in the fourth minute and the lone striker entered Qatar's danger area before cutting it back for Mohammad Ibrahim, but the left winger could not hold the ball. Four minutes later, Jibon once again darted into the deep to put a low cross for Ibrahim but defender Boualem Khokukhi cleared it for a corner.

Qatar coach Felix Suarez had earlier expressed concerns over Bangladesh's Raihan Hasan unleashing the long throw-in, and he wreaked havoc in the Qatar defence in the first half with seven such throw-ins, but the hosts could not capitalise.

Qatar striker Almoes Ali Abdullah, who struck a treble against Afghanistan, was given hardly any space. The prolific striker twice drove off target in the first half while defender Abdelkarim Hasan saw his shot sail over the far post in the 22nd minute.

In the 25th minute, Qatar almost struck their own post when Salam Al Hajri's diagonal back pass to goalkeeper Saad Al Sheed was desperately parried away for a corner.

The scare survived, Qatar launched an attack through the right flank with Abdel Aziz whipping a cross inside the Bangladesh box and Yousuf Abdurisag making space and finding the back of the net with a curving shot in the 28th minute. Not disheartened, Bangladesh then created two good chances, but to no avail. Yeasin's flick off Raihan's long throw-in was saved at the cost of a corner, before Jibon and Sohel Rana saw their successive attempts following a Jamal Bhuiyan corner thwarted by two goalline saves.

After resumption, the boys in red and green were more impressive than their Qatar counterparts, who were struggling on the slippery surface and Bangladesh created a couple more chances. Yeasin saw his header go straight to the goalkeeper in the 71st minute while Jamal's powerful left-footer, with the goalkeeper not in the right position, was headed clear by defender Bassam Husham.

Substitute Mahbubur Rahman Sufil saw his placing shot tipped over the crosspiece in the 75th minute, two minutes before Biplu Ahmed narrowly missed the target from inside the box off an Ibrahim cutback.

With only a minute of the three-minute added time left, Bangladesh conceded the second goal as the unmarked Karim Boudiaf sealed the win from a goal-mouth melee.

That did not prevent the hosts walking off with heads held high as the home crowd applauded a worthy and memorable effort.

The seventh version of the Bangladesh Premier League (BPL), the premium T20

Deviating from the core nature of the franchise-based tournament, the Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) has decided to arrange the tourney on its own steam after failing to resolve conflicts with the former franchises. The BCB are also set to run the tournament in the name of the Father of the Nation Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman to commemorate the his 100th birth anniversary. Those were not the end of the changes; plenty of new innovations are in the offing. The BPL governing council (GC) was exuberant about the enrolment of around 400 foreign cricketers. BCB director Mahbub Anam, flanked by GC chairman Sheikh Sohel and BCB media committee chairman Ialal Yunus, disclosed some unique initiatives for the upcoming tournament while talking to reporters at Mirpur yesterday, after a meeting with the representatives of four interested sponsors. They however informed that they were yet to fix a date for the draft, which they said would be determined in the next GC meeting. The GC also said that the tournament may be deferred by seven to 10 days from the earlier announced kickoff date of December 6. Sohel assured that there will be no shortage of colour in

Bangladesh A win a thriller

Bangladesh A prevailed in a last-ball thriller to draw level in the three-match oneday series against Sri Lanka A, winning the second match by one wicket at the R Premadasa Stadium in Colombo vesterday. After electing to field, Bangladesh restricted

Sri Lanka to a modest 226 for nine and seemed on course for a comfortable win, with 37 runs required off 41 balls with five wickets in hand. A flurry of late wickets, however, left Bangladesh needing nine runs from the last over with bowlers Sunzamul Islam and Ebadot Hossain at the crease.

Sunzamul hit a boundary off the third ball, a single and a wide then helped Bangladesh's cause but Ebadot was dismissed off the fifth ball. Sunzamul had however crossed over during the catch and knocked away the last ball for a single to deliver the nail-biting win.

Before the late drama, Bangladesh were quite calm in the early stagesof the chase with skipper Mohammad Mithun hitting 52 and Mohammad Naim providing the impetus with a 59-ball 68.

Earlier, Kamindu Mendis's 67-ball 61 and a 62-ball 52 from Priyamal Perera powered Sri Lanka. Ebadot, Sunzamul and Abu Hider took two wickets each.

Agarwal, Kohli give India early edge




Mayank Agarwal hit his second century in successive matches on the opening day of the second

Test against South Africa Thursday and said his side should aim for a 500-run first innings. The opener, who made a double century in India's opening Test win, scored 108

after the hosts elected to bat. India were 273-3 when bad light forced an early end to play, with skipper Virat Kohli unbeaten on 63 and vice-captain

Ajinkya Rahane on 18. Kohli and Rahane put on 75 runs for the fourth wicket to thwart South Africa's determined bowlers who kept them under

pressure as the gloom crept in. Agarwal, 28, said he was thrilled with his

"The team is in a good position, winning the toss, batting first and with one batsman short, it's a good thing to make runs... 450-500 would be nice," Agarwal said.

"Try and get big runs in the first innings.. (that) could help us in case we don't want to bat again. It could really put pressure on the South Africans.'

Kohli, leading the Test side for the 50th time, reached his half-century with a boundary off fast bowler Vernon Philander.

But Agarwal took the lead role despite being hit on the helmet from a bouncer by debutant paceman Anrich Nortje. He went on to hit Nortje for three glorious off drives in one over before lunch.

The right-handed batsman put on 138 runs for the second wicket with Cheteshwar Pujara, who made 58, to steady the innings after the fall of Rohit Sharma early in the day.

He was eventually caught in the slips by South African captain Faf du Plessis -- one of fast bowler Kagiso Rabada's three wickets

There were periods where I was getting boundaries very easily, there were periods where they bowled very good line and lengths and were testing the bouncer as well," said Agarwal, who is playing his sixth Test since making his debut last year.

Rabada also claimed Sharma, who edged the ball into the gloves of wicketkeeper Quinton de Kock for 14 in the 10th over.

break of more than two months, featured for Chattogram. The star left-handed opener, who had a torrid time during Bangladesh's Sri Lanka tour last July, was nowhere near his best. While his partner Sadiqur Rahman played comfortably to score a 69-ball 51 before being dismissed in the 22nd over off a Mahmudullah delivery, a shaky Tamim at the other end bided his time and could not get into the groove.

Tamim could only manage 30 off 105 balls at a strike rate of 28.57 before national teammate Mahmudullah ended his misery. Tamim, attempting to break the shackles with a pull miscued the shot and Mahmudullah completed

an easy catch as the ball got the elevation and not the distance. Mahmudullah also took the other wicket that fell on the day, returning impressive figures of three for 40 in 18 overs.

In Fatullah, two other national players shone with the ball. Leftarm spinner Taijul Islam and pacer Shafiul Islam accounted for all seven Dhaka wickets as Rajshahi ended the day in control. While Taijul scalped four wickets for 55 in 20.5 overs, Shafiul ended the day with figures of three for 40 in 17 overs. For Dhaka, opener Rony Talukdar - who featured in one T20I for Bangladesh in 2015 -- scored a team high of 63 from
