Murder for exercising opinion attack on constitution

Dr Kamal says about Abrar's death STAR REPORT

Gonoforum President Dr Kamal Hossain yesterday said the killing of Buet student Abrar Fahad for exercising freedom of expression is an onslaught on the constitution.

"I won't call them (who killed Abrar) sons; they are beasts. They kill innocent people. We've turned our sons into animals, and it's appalling. We must free the country from this dire situation," Dr Kamal said while speaking at a press conference by Gonoforum at the Jatiya Press Club, demanding proper trial of Abrar killing. He further said, "Only those who are sick can indulge

in such acts. A boy was beaten to death in such a brutal way for expressing his opinion. It's an onslaught on our civilisation, achievements of our independence and the constitution," reports UNB.

Dr Kamal said people's freedom of expression has been clearly enshrined in the country's constitution, and killing anyone for expressing dissenting opinion is completely against the constitution and the state.

OIKYAFRONT TO BRING OUT MOURNING RALLY ON SUNDAY

Meanwhile, Jatiya Oikyafront yesterday annoucned a 'civic mourning rally' in the city protesting the killing of Abrar Fahad, the news agency adds.

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Free student organisations Teenager, woman die of dengue from party politics: TIB

Transparency International Bangladesh (TIB) yesterday called upon the government to free all student organisations and educational institutions in the country -- including Buet -- from party politics.

The gruesome murder of Abrar Fahad is not only a blow to freedom of speech, it is also the result of the influence of unhealthy politics in educational institutions and student organisations, said a press release of In a statement, TIB Executive Director Dr Iftekharuzzaman said, "The

ruthless influence of this criminalised politics on student organisations is eroding the glorious past and the extraordinary role of student movement in Bangladesh." Expressing his concern, Dr Iftekharuzzaman hoped the responsible

section of the political leadership would realise the gravity of the worry, and free student organisations from the clutches of sick politics considering the welfare of future generations and to establish rule of law.

Teachers are responsible for inspiring students to become ideal citizens, but a section of them have failed miserably due to their political affiliation, SEE PAGE 4 COL 4

316 hospitalised across the country in 24 hours

Although the number of hospital admissions from dengue are coming down steadily, the death toll continues to tick up. According to the Directorate General of Health

Services, a total of 316 dengue patients were hospitalised in the last 24 hours till yesterday morning. Of them, 91 were admitted to different hospitals in Dhaka while 225 to district hospitals, DGHS added.

Yesterday, a teenager and woman died of dengue in Dhaka and Khulna respectively, taking the death toll to 164.

Abdul Kader, 13, son of Amin Gazi of Jamtola road in Chandpur city, died of dengue while undergoing treatment at Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH), reports UNB.

Medical officer Md Asibul Hasan of Chandpur General Hospital said Kader was admitted to Sadar

Hospital on Wednesday. He was referred to DMCH for better treatment, he added.

In Khulna, Masura, 25, wife of Habibullah of Abhaynagar upazila in Jashore, died at Khulna Medical College Hospital (KMCH). Shahin Biswas, a physician at KMCH, said

Masura was admitted to the hospital on Monday with dengue fever. "She had been suffering from the fever for last few days. She passed away around noon," he added. So far, 20 people, including 14 women have

died of dengue fever in Khulna. Of them, 17 died in KMCH.

Currently, 1,294 dengue patients are undergoing treatment at hospitals nationwide, of whom, 842 are outside Dhaka, according to DGHS.

DG-LEVEL TALKS ON DRUG TRAFFICKING

Bangladesh and India agree to share real-time intel, involve Myanmar

Bangladesh and India, who share one of the longest land borders in the world, have agreed to share "real-time intelligence information" and involve their common neighbour Myanmar to stop drug trafficking on their frontiers.

The decision was taken at the sixth director general level talks between the narcotics control departments of Bangladesh and India yesterday in

Md Jamal Uddin Chowdhury led the Bangladeshi side while Rakesh Asthana led the Indian side.

In a joint press briefing -- after holding the meeting at Pan Pacific Sonargaon Dhaka hotel -- they said that they have agreed to do whatever is necessary to stop drug trafficking.

Phensedyl, which is legal for cough treatment in India, is illegally trafficked into Bangladesh.

Codeine-based

Yaba tablets, heroin and cannabis also make their way into to Bangladesh and many traffickers go through India to illegally bring these narcotics from

Myanmar.

The director general Bangladesh said the Indian side proposed to involve Myanmar and have a tripartite meeting, because they are common neighbours and drugs come from Myanmar as well.

"We have agreed to the proposal and asked them to contact Myanmar. We are even ready to host the meeting in Dhaka," Jamal said, adding that it will be more fruitful for Bangladesh.

Indian Director General Asthana said they are committed to eliminating this social evil.

At the discussion, the Indian side reiterated their home minister's commitment that Indian soil will not be allowed to use for drug trafficking.

"We have identified various areas of cooperation, as the Bangladesh DG has mentioned in his address," Asthana said.

First and foremost is real-time sharing of intelligence and subsequent action on that, he added.

"The formalities have been chalked out and it will be designed and

redesigned further. The basic fact from remains, we have agreed that whatever intelligence, whatever information is gathered by us shall be exchanged in real time and should be pursued in real time," he said.

Untill and unless they take actions against the drug traffickers actively, this problem is not going to be over,

Asthana said they also discussed the modalities for detailed investigation -- for some big cases where major syndicates are involved.

The Indian official also promised to take "effective and timely" actions against those who push drugs into Bangladesh if investigators in Dhaka inform them about their connections in India.

"So far, as the investigation part is concerned, Bangladesh authorities have expressed the desire to inform us of the drug traffickers' connection in my country and in turn, we have promised to take effective and timely actions against those pushing drugs into Bangladesh," he said.

Decline in values behind current state of student politics: SSA

Sammilita Shamajik Andolon (SSA) yesterday urged the government to ensure exemplary punishment of the killers of Buet student Abrar Fahad.

Breast cancer takes 6,844 lives in Bangladesh every year: report

Speakers demand govt initiatives to raise awareness

UNB, Dhaka

Some 12,764 women are detected with breast cancer in the country every year and 6,844 of them die of the disease, according to a report of International Agency for Research on Cancer (IARC).

To reduce the number and remove the threat of breast cancer, speakers at a programme yesterday urged the government to work in full capacity to raise awareness on the disease across the country.

They also urged women to be aware and undergo regular check-ups to identify whether they have any symptom of the disease.

Speakers came up with the remarks at a roundtable organised jointly by Bangladesh Breast Cancer Awareness Forum (BBCAF) and Rotary International District at Jatiya Press Club, marking the 7th Breast Cancer

Awareness Day.

was formed in front of Jatiya Press Club by members of both organisations.

Citing the IARC report, Head of Cancer Epidemiology Division at the National Cancer Research Institute, Dr Md Habibullah Talukder Ruskin, said, "If detected early, 90 percent of breast cancer patients have the possibility to recover with proper and complete treatment."

The organisation wants to create social awareness on the disease among people of all classes, he added.

Vice-chancellor of Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujib Medical University, Prof Kanak Kanti Barua, said although the mortality rate is seemingly high for women, awareness and proper care can eradicate the threat of breast cancer.

Prof Shubhagat Chowdhury, Prof Mojaherul Haque and Prof Sabera Khatun also spoke at the programme.

According to Global Cancer Statistics, every year, 2,088,849 women suffer from Before the discussion, a human chain breast cancer worldwide.
