Moushumi stays adamant during election season



Moushumi is one of the most beloved faces in the film industry, and has been ruling Dhalywood with an iron fist for more than 25 years. The celebrated actor is running for President at this year's Cholochitro Shilpi Samiti Elections. Recently, she caught up with The Daily Star, and talked about her ventures.

You are contesting the elections this year. Tell us about how you feel. I have participated in the elections earlier. However, I am running for President for the first time. I am overwhelmed with the love I am receiving, and I hope that I can do justice to all the good thoughts by my friends, family and fans.

What are the artistes' reactions on your participation in the election? My career in the film industry has spanned more than 25 years. This is where I have spent most of my life, and all of the people around here are my own. They are supporting me a lot. Again, I am grateful for the support.

Rumours previously surfaced that you will withdraw your name from the election. How would you respond to that?

This is completely a rumour. I am calling people for votes, meeting them and doing my shoots at the same time. I am very positive about this, so there is no chance that I am backing off.

Observing all the circumstances, do you expect a fair election? Every individual linked to the election is expecting a fair one. Let us hope that everything goes well. We have senior actor Ilias Kanchan as the Election Commissioner, and we believe that we

If you win, what are the changes you will make as President?

will have a fair election under him.

My first priority as an artiste will be ensuring the rights of all the artistes in the industry. I do not want to reveal everything now, as time will explain the rest.

Have you faced any difficulties while running the election?

I was a bit hurt when some of my peers backed off from the election. They were the ones who brought me into the light, but then, they disappeared. However, I am determined, and I will fight for it until the end. Besides that, I am not alone. Everybody is supporting me, and I will try to make them proud.

Tell us something about your new film, Orjon 71.

Orjon 71 is based on the boundless contributions of the Bangladeshi police force during the Liberation War of 1971. Shatabdi Wadud will be seen as a courageous police officer in the film. I am playing the role of Firoza, his wife. Orjon 71 will be filmed at BFDC, Rajarbagh Police Line and a few other locations in North Bengal.

This year, noted thespian and cultural personality Ramendu Majumdar received the Gandhi Memorial Peace Prize, introduced by Gandhi Peace Foundation, India. The award-giving ceremony was organised by the West Bengal branch of the foundation, in association with The Times of India on October 10 in Naihati.

Javed Ahmed Khan, Disaster Management and Civil Defence Minister of West Bengal, was the chief guest. The ceremony was organised to mark the 150th birth anniversary of Mahatma Gandhi. Dr Aniruddha Majumdar, Chairman of Gandhi Peace Foundation's West Bengal unit, gave the welcome speech.

Ramendu Majumdar also delivered the Gandhi Memorial Lecture on the topic, "Mahatma and Bangabandhu: Two symbols of nonviolence.

AN EVENING ON PERFORMANCE ART

Artists and art enthusiasts gathered in the quiet premises of Shunno Art Space in Lalmatia on Saturday evening to listen to noted performance artist Abu Naser Robii share his experiences.

Founder of Porapara Space for Artists, Robii has experimented with various forms of art throughout his career. The event featured a presentation on his artistic journey, shedding light on how he, a young man from Patenga, discovered the world of performance art. The artist opened up about the experiences that

shaped him and drove him forward. Born in 1975, Robii wanted to pursue art from a young age. He was enrolled in Chittagong University in 1996. However, he was soon disillusioned as he faced harsh realities. It was a time of unrest and fear, where one could

not utter a word against the authorities. The violence at the campus, muted everyone's freedom of expression. This was especially evident for artists, as there was not a single exhibition held during his eight years of university. The frustration of having his freedom taken away led him to pursue farming for a while. But when his best friend, Sanjay Talapatra, was brutally murdered in broad daylight, Robii decided to take a stand through performance art.

Robii describes his art as a "social engage act", due to its politically conscious nature. He also talked about his experiences of performing for social and political movements. "To be frank, performance art is like a guerilla in art. In many countries, artists had to hide soon after they made a statement against the authorities,' he said. "You can create such an impact with the simplest of tools. A performance artist has to physically portray the art through their body, making it impactful, yet dangerous." Other artists also exchanged their views at the interactive session. Afterwards, Robii put up a short performance."The base of a play is literature and the base of a performance is like a painting. In a play, the message has to be elaborated through characters and dialogues. Whereas in performance art, one has to portray he message in the limited space of the canvas," explained Robii, talking about the difference between performance art and acting.
