# U-16s one point away from being crowned

Bangladesh are just one win away from becoming champions in the UEFA-Assist U-16 Development Tournament after smashing favourites Faroe Islands 3-1 in their second match at the Bangabandhu National Stadium yesterday.

With two straight wins, the hosts are on top of the four-team table with six points, three ahead of Faroe Islands and five ahead of Maldives and Cambodia, who played out a 2-2 draw in yesterday's second match.

Moinul Islam, who scored a brace against Cambodia in the opener, once again showed his quality -- this time against a European side -- scoring twice on either side of substitute Piash Ahmed's strike. Faroe Islands defender Mourits Mhr Bisgaard had equalised earlier to bring some excitement into the match which the hosts dominated.

Faroe Islands came into the match on the back of a colossal 10-3 win against Maldives, but they faced unexpected challenges from the hosts, who distributed the ball quickly and pressed their physical superior opponents.

The home side broke the deadlock in the 27th minute when Moinul headed home a cross from captain Jonny Shikdar. The forward from Barishal was then denied by goalkeeper Hans Jakup Amgrimsson, who

tipped a header over on half-hour mark.

After resumption, Faroe Islands sent on two pairs of fresh legs to accelerate their attacks and it paid off as Mourits headed home from a free-kick delivered by substitute Heini Fossdasa in the 72nd minute.

However, Bangladesh only took seven minutes to restore their lead as Piash ran onto a long ball from Sajed Hasan and nicely danced past a defender before driving into the near post in the 79th minute.

In stoppage time, Moinul brilliantly dribbled three defenders and the goalkeeper before driving home to wrap up a victory.

"I'm really feeling nice after two goals. We tried to play by the coach's instructions. We had confidence we could leave with a win and we did. Now, we will try to win our next match [against Maldives] to become champions," said the 11th-grade student.

Bangladesh's British coach Robart Martin Ryles said it was a 'drastic' improvement.

"They have improved drastically as a unit and today they played really well. They have great cohesive experience. I think the experience of the SAFF Championship and AFC Championship Qualifiers have given them foundation for this tournament."

Opposing coach Aki Johnsen said: "The better side won. Bangladesh had a bit more possession and they deserved the win."

# Enough to make the right noises?

The month's break from international cricket that started after Bangladesh and Afghanistan shared the T20I tri-series trophy on a rain-marred September 24 evening shifted focus to the Bangladesh Cricket Board's (BCB's) operation of domestic cricket.

News over the past month had much to do with BCB's plans for the ongoing National Cricket League (NCL) -- a first-class tournament -- and the seventh edition of the Bangladesh Premier League (BPL), a T20 tournament that the board have decided to run without franchises for the first time.

The board took some initiatives that could be said to be positive for the country's cricket -- increasing fitness requirements for players wishing to play the NCL and placing emphasis on leg-spinners in both leagues -- but it is still in doubt if enough is being done.

Both are areas for urgent improvement as new Bangladesh coach Russell Domingo was

reportedly unhappy with fitness levels while a lack of quality leg-spinners has been a thorn in Bangladesh cricket.

Before the NCL started, the BCB raised the passing score on beep tests to 11 this season from nine in the last season. While the board initially said that it would be compulsory for players to pass in order to participate, they ended up showing leniency when a few of the more experienced domestic cricketers failed.

As for leg-spin, BCB director Mahbubul Anam said on October 10 that BPL teams -- each of which will be run by the BCB instead of franchises as in previous editions because of a disagreement about the terms ahead of a new four-year cycle of the league -- would have to have one leg-spinner in the playing eleven, who would have to bowl his full four-over quota in every match.

On October 17, BCB President Nazmul Hassan suspended the coaches of Dhaka Division and Rangpur Division for not fielding leg-spinners in their sides in the second round of the NCL, despite being asked by the BCB to do so.

Hassan's move is a commendable one as it shows that action is finally being taken to improve the lot of leg-spinners in the country with Jubair Hossain -- Bangladesh's only specialist leg-spinner -- falling by the wayside because of a dearth of first-class games after playing the last of his six Tests for Bangladesh in August 2015.

Meanwhile, the BPL's leg-spin action plan seems to be lacking in substance and practical workability as a scenario could easily arise that a captain would have to bowl a leg-spinner in the last over when he only has a few runs to save and the leg-spinner in question is not the right man for the job.

Anam's plan also ignores that there are not enough specialist local leg-spinners -- or those of a quality to rub shoulders with local and foreign elite cricketers -- to populate the seven franchises of the BPL.

All of the initiatives -- the fitness tests, Hassan taking action against the coaches, and BPL's more whimsical plans -- vary in efficacy but all suffer from a tendency to focus on the immediate and not going in-depth to solve the issues.

BCB announced the increase in passing beep test levels less than a month before the NCL and therefore many players were hard-pressed to raise their fitness to the required level in that time, leading to the BCB having to backtrack from an initial hard stance. To more realistically raise general fitness standards, the lower leagues will also have to be directed to raise standards and supplied with necessary tools to do so.

Hassan sent a clear message by suspending the two coaches, but once again, to grow new leg-spinners the board president will have to cast his eyes to lower than first-class cricket and encourage the style of bowling in age-level cricket.

The BPL's plans appear to be the most superficial, geared more at creating the impression that developmental aims are a priority.

With some welcome changes taking place in some spheres, Bangladesh cricket will benefit if the BCB see the big picture to implement real changes, instead of focusing on tournaments when they pop up on the calendar.

### Sarfaraz axed as T20 & Test skipper

Pakistan sacked Sarfaraz Ahmed from his post as T20I and Test skipper on Friday, a week after he led the side to a 3-0 home defeat against an inexperienced Sri Lanka.

The showdown in Lahore gave the visitors their first T20I series win against Pakistan in seven attempts while missing 10 of their top players.

Senior batsman Azhar Ali will replace Sarfaraz as Test skipper, while Babar Azam will lead the Twenty20 side.

"Sarfaraz has been replaced... on poor performance," said a board press release.

Azam has been appointed skipper until next year's Twenty20 World Cup in Australia, while Azhar will remain in charge for the 2019-2020 season.

According to the RFEF, Real Madrid have already approved December 18.

Zidane was keen to bring Pogba to the Bernabeu in the summer and is reportedly still set on getting the France international.

Zidane also fielded questions about the picture ahead of Real's trip to Mallorca on Saturday in La Liga.

"Pure coincidence," said Zidane. "He was there and I was there at the event and, since we know each other, we talked. That's all. And it was personal,

"I'm not going to tell you what we talked about, that's between him and I. But we've known each other for a long time, so if we meet, we say hi and we talk."

## Faf looking to avoid whitewash

South Africa captain Faf du Plessis is hoping for a fighting reaction from his team as they go into the final Test against India at Ranchi on Saturday seeking to avoid a series whitewash.

South Africa suffered their heaviest loss to India in the second Test, losing by an innings and 137 runs in Pune last weekend.

"It's important for us to understand that we have to fight our way out of these last two losses," Du Plessis said on the eve of the first day yesterday.

"We can't expect things just to happen. They won't happen, because India are a very powerful team at the moment. Their record at home is amazing. So for us, it's just about trying to keep doing the things well and then it's a matter of time."
