Rafiqul Islam and his wife Sabina Yeasmin have a different outlook on life. The couple care for pets and stray animals like very few do and spend a sizable portion of their limited income on feeding and grooming them. At present, the number of animals they care for exceeds 48. The animals have found a

home in their single-storey house, doubling as a drug store called Shreoshi Medicine Corner. It is located on Road 10 in the capital's Shekhertek area. Anyone dropping by the store or house may mistake the place for a play zone for pets or a small pet sanctuary, which in some aspect, it is.

A visitor may also see a few kittens curled up comfortably in the store's shelves, some others nestled under the chairs, and some playing hide and seek.

There are 39 cats and nine dogs now. Except for two cats, all were abandoned. Most of them were crippled following injuries inflicted by people or born with disabilities. The family fondly calls them by

Sabina quit her job at a real estate company in Dhaka last year after working there for almost 17 years. Now she dedicates her entire time to caring for the animals and running the pharmacy. Cynthia helps her mother with the pets when she comes home from her college dormitory.

Sabina provides three servings of rice, fish, and chicken legs for the animals daily. She also feeds street dogs and cats in the neighbourhood on alternate days. Sabina said they have to spend around Tk 40,000 on animal food every month.

The family also takes the animals' health into consideration.

No mercy for child abusers: PM

Sheikh Russel's 56th birth anniversary observed

Bss, Dhaka

Issuing a strong warning against child repression, Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday said those involved in killing and torturing children must face "toughest" punishment.

"Repression of children will not be tolerated. People involved in killing and torturing children must have to face the toughest punishment," she said.

The prime minister said this while addressing a function marking the 56th birth anniversary of Sheikh Russel, youngest son of Father of the Nation Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman.

"Sheikh Russel National Shishu-Kishore Parishad" organised the programme at Bangabandhu International Conference Center. The premier said people have been

involved in killing and torturing children since August 15, 1975 when not only the president, but also children and women were killed. But they were not given any punishment at that time.

"Instead of punishing them, a law was enacted to stop tracking the killers. They Describing the recent killing of a child

reportedly by his father as an outcome of a perverted mentality, she said, "Such a killing might not have taken place, if the trials [of killing women and children] were held at that time."

Hasina said her government has been working to ensure a beautiful life for each child so that they do not have to face the same fate as Sheikh Russel.

Nothing that Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman had enacted the Children Rights Act in 1974 to protect the rights of children, she said, "We have formulated the National Children Policy in 2011 and taken measures to protect children's rights."

"We have also given special attention

in this regard so that children can get the scopes for education, sports, physical and cultural exercises," she added.

Society has become too exam-centric

Says Asaduzzaman Noor; BSK awards 580 readers

Nurturing reading habit of students can help change the society and end the "unhealthy competition" for grades, which is robbing them of their childhood, said speakers yesterday.

They also urged guardians not to force students to run after better academic achievements, rather encourage them to love learning and develop the ability to learn new things.

The speakers said this at a prize distribution ceremony of Bishwo Shahitto Kendro's book reading initiative at Bangla Academy.

"Nowadays many parents do not allow children to do anything other than chasing high grades," said former cultural affairs minister Asaduzzaman Noor.

The noted cultural personality said the society has become too exam-centric. "But it [better grades] should not be the only target. Cultural activities like reading, singing, dancing, poetry recitation and debate will help you [students] become good persons," he said.

"Many schools do not engage in cultural practices. Some do not even practice singing the national anthem," said Noor, also a lawmaker.

BSK founder Prof Abdullah Abu Sayeed said there should be more initiatives like reading programmes to motivate students, as one can discover life, freedom and light through reading.

'Invest in infrastructure, renewable energy and manufacturing'

Foreign minister tells German businesses DIPLOMATIC CORRESPONDENT

Foreign Minister AK Abdul Momen has invited German businesses to invest in bangladesh, highlighting the business-friendly policies and environment of the country.

While addressing the German Federal Association for Economic Development and Foreign Trade (BWA) in Berlin during his first official visit to Germany, he called upon them to invest in infrastructure, renewable energy and manufacturing sectors in Bangladesh.

Explaining the Special Economic Zones set up by Bangladesh in different areas, Momen also urged German car manufacturers like Mercedes, BMW and Volkswagen to set up their assembly plants in Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujib Shilpanagar in Chattogram, according to a press release.

The minister informed the German companies of the skilled, young labour force available at competitive wages, and assured them of complete support to the German investments.

Referring to the National Skills Development Authority (NSDA), recently formed under PMO, Momen requested Germany to help Bangladesh build a strong workforce of skilled young population, explaining that it would create a win-win situation for Bangladesh and the potential German investors.

BGMEA President Rubana Huq, who attended the meeting yesterday, also invited German businesses to invest more in Bangladesh in a sustainable way that would ensure better wages, better prices and better consumer satisfaction.

The foreign minister also addressed the 7th International Conference on Bangladesh organised by the Bangladesh Forum in Germany, where he highlighted the successes achieved and challenges faced by the government in achieving Vision 2021 and Vision 2041.

He called upon the international community to help Bangladesh in its journey forward. He explained the Rohingya crisis to the international audience and called for a more active role of the friends of Bangladesh in solving the crisis urgently.

Momen also held a meeting with Tobias Pfluger, member of German Federal Parliament and chairman of the South-Asian Parliamentary Group at the German Parliament, yesterday.

He requested Tobias to take appropriate measures in the German Parliament to ensure fair prices for Bangladesh's textile products.

'GDP growth hasn't changed lives of the masses'

Gonoforum general secretary and economist Reza Kibria says

The current government has been identified as "the most tyrannical" in the history of Bangladesh because of widespread corruption and misrule, Gonoforum General Secretary Reza Kibria said yesterday.

"They did not only loot the country's assets, but also robbed banks, killed innocent people and snatched people's right to vote," Reza said, while speaking at a discussion in the capital.

"...It is an illegal, incapable and tyrannical government. The culture of violence which they have brought into the country's politics should be ended through forging a national unity," he added.

The noted economist also said there is no reason to be excited about GDP growth as the lives of general people are yet to

change. Bangladesh Sangskritik Muktijot, a political party, organised the discussion on the importance of national unity at Jatiya Press Club.

Speaking at the event, Jatiya Oikyafront Convener Dr Kamal Hossain said none of the autocrats have lasted forever anywhere in the world, regardless of the efforts they made using power and money.

The current "autocratic" government

will suffer the same fate, he added.
