Kings on a mission

Bangladesh Premier League champions Bashundhara Kings will start their pre-season campaign looking to add to their double when they take on Gokulam Kerala of India in a Group B fixture at the MA Aziz Stadium in Chattogram today.

The second match of the day will kick off at 7:00pm following the game between Chennai City FC and Terengganu FC at 4:00pm.

Bashundhara Kings, in their debut season in top-flight football, won the Bangladesh Premier League and the Independence Cup, and coach Oscar Bruzon is looking to build on the success with what he feels a more balanced squad.

"Last year we were having some problems as we didn't have lot balance in the squad. There was little bit difference between best players and worst players. But this year is the opposite scenario. This year we have

all good players in our squad," the Spanish coach told reporters after his team's training session at the Port Stadium ground yesterday morning.

The new powerhouse of Bangladesh football currently boasts 10 national players from the most recent squad alongside Topu Barman, Atiqur Rahman Fahad and Mashuk Mia Johnny who are recovering from injuries. The team definitely is stronger as far as local players are concerned, but the coach feels the foreign collection is also much stronger than last season.

"We got Kingsley from BJMC because we like him. Then we have Daniel (Colindres) and Bakhtiyar (Duyshobekov) who are ready now and left a lot last season. We have one new addition, Jalal (Lebanese striker Jalal Kudoh). He is gonna be a sensation, not only in this tournament but also throughout the season. I hope in 3-4 months all of you will recognise Jalal is the best striker in the country," the coach said.

While Bruzon was hopeful that

his side could start the pre-season on a high, he was respectful of his opening-match opponents Gokulam Kerala, who won the prestigious Durand Cup two months ago after finishing ninth in I-League last season.

"They are the recent winners of Durand Cup beating teams like East Bengal and Mohun Bagan in the semifinal and final. Gokulam Kerala is going to be tough rival," Bruzon said.

Gokulam may, however, not be well prepared for this tournament, taking the field after having arrived only on Sunday and playing without an official practice session here.

Meanwhile, the day's other match pits defending I-League champions Chennai City FC against Terengganu FC of Malaysia.

Like Mohun Bagan, Chennai City FC boast a host of Spanish players, but they are taking the field after only one practice session following their arrival on Sunday. Terengganu FC, on the other hand, came to Chattogram three days ago.

Gono Uni clinch title at last

Gono University became champions of the Faraaz Gold Cup Inter-University football tournament by beating Southeast University 4-2 in tiebreakers at the Bangabandhu National Stadium yesterday.

The exciting final rolled directly into the penalty shootout after the regulation 70 minutes ended in a goalless draw in front of a few hundred spectators, who cheerfully backed their sides from the galleries.

Man-of-the-match Bibek Mandal, a former BKSP student and player of Agrani Bank, converted the fifth spot kick to give his fellow students something to really cheer for as he delivered the title in the process. After being eliminated from the group stages in the first two editions of the tournament, Gono University were surely glad to get their hands on the coveted trophy.

Meanwhile, Southeast University had to be satisfied with the runners-up trophy for the second time in a row despite having fielded a strong squad, featuring about seven-eight students who also play different competitive leagues under the Bangladesh Football Federation.

Gono University, studded with former BKSP players, played comparatively better between the sides, however, their forwards failed to cash in on their opportunities in regulation time. On the other hand, Southeast University were unlucky to not have notched a victory as they were twice denied by the woodwork.

"It was bad luck that we lost the final in tiebreakers again. We had confidence to win the match in regulation time but we were denied by the crossbar twice. We had less preparation in penalty taking," said Southeast University Games and Sports Club president and coach Golam Rabbani.

"Faraaz Gold Cup has tuned into a platform for university footballers to show their skills and the university authority is also providing different scholarships to athletes during the

admission," said Rabbani. "Faraaz Gold Cup is helping those university footballers who don't play any competitive football to grow up as they have no other platform to show themselves," said Mandal.

Chief guest, state minister for youth and sports Zahid Ahsan Russel, congratulated both teams.

"Faraaz Gold Cup is not only a football tournament, it has turned into a platform of friendship as the students from different universities are getting opportunities to get introduced with each other through Faraaz Gold Cup. I want to thank both the winners and losers for participating in the tournament," said Russel.

There are very few footballers in Bangladesh who can boast a record of three goals in first 11 international matches. In fact with Bangladesh's ever-present scoring issue, forwards hardly score in international matches and spend the season at reserve bench of their respective clubs.

Rabiul, however, has proved to be a bit different. The Arambagh forward last season showed his quality under Maruful Haque and has become a go-to-man for national team coach Jamie Day when looking for goals and injection of fresh legs in the latter part of games.

The 20-year-old forward came to everyone's notice last year when he scored against Cambodia in a FIFA friendly in Phnom Penh. But he scored the most important goal of his fledgling career, and arguably the most important goal for Bangladesh in recent times, in the 1-0 away win against Laos in the first round of World Cup Qualifiers. The slightly-built forward has since added to the tally, scoring against Bhutan in a FIFA friendly in Dhaka recently.

Rabiul is setting his sights on much higher things though.

"I want to be the best player in South

Asia and for that I have to be established in the best club of the country," said the forward who moved from Arambagh to champions Bashundhara Kings in the recent transfer window.

A member of the first batch of the now-defunct Sylhet BFF football academy, Rabiul started his journey in Dhaka football with third-division outfit Dilkusha KC before being quickly poached by Arambagh, where he improved his reputation under Maruful.

The forward sees his recent move to Bashundhara Kings as a just reward. "You have to take challenge if you have to achieve and do something good. If I can't take the challenge myself, I can't be a top player. That's why I came to Bashundhara Kings. Hopefully it will be a good outcome at the end of the season."

Rabiul heaped praise on his new coach Oscar Bruzon, who he believes has brought 'European system' into training drills, which he believes will further his development as a footballer. "Oscar (Bruzon) is a very good coach. His tactical work is very good, like the European style. The match we played in Salt Lake, if I were in Bashundhara team before, I would have played better because of the way Oscar trained us, making us better players," Rabiul said.

'Cannot accept physical punishment'

The Bangladesh national swimming team's Japanese coach, Takeo Inoki, resigned from his post and left for his home country after witnessing the horror of how meaningless punishments were inflicted on junior swimmers at the Syed Nazrul Islam National Swimming Complex in Mirpur on Sunday.

Inoki, who was appointed as head coach in August, yesterday wrote on Facebook about how the junior swimmers who violated the rules by bringing cellular phones to the training camp were punished in cruel fashion.

"I felt it was important for me

to show that I really do have zero tolerance with organizations or individuals who physically abuse/punish or harass the swimmers," wrote Inoki, who left the country on Sunday following the incident which took place at around 11:00am.

According to Inoki, a few junior national swimmers broke the rules by bringing phones to training and were subsequently reprimanded by the junior team's coaching staff.

"They were meaninglessly punished through physical exercise under the strong sun. All swimmers were required to wear long sleeve shirts and tracksuit pants. Some of the exercises were running, front summersaults on the hard tiled floor and rolling around on the hard tiled floor," stated Inoki, who added that one swimmer lost

India on the brink of series sweep

Pace duo Mohammed Shami and Umesh Yadav claimed five wickets between them Monday to put India on the brink of a series whitewash after South Africa crumbled while following-on in the third Test.

At the end of the third day in Ranchi, the tourists were on 132-8, trailing India by 203 runs, with replacement batsman Theunis de Bruyn on 30 and Anrich Nortje, on five.

De Bruyn came in under the new concussion sub rule after Dean Elgar took a nasty hit on the helmet from a short delivery by Yadav and had to retire hurt on 16.

The impact left the opener shaken as he lay on the ground getting physio assistance, and officials called for early tea with the Proteas reeling on 26-4.
