Let goodness, love prevail

Interfaith leaders also urge people to shun violence in the name of religion

Leaders of different religious communities yesterday called upon the countrymen to reject violence in the name of religion and work to establish peace by upholding harmony.

No religion allows violence, they said at the inauguration of the Bangladesh Inter-Religious Forum for Peace and Harmony (BIRFPH) at the Krishibid Institution Bangladesh in the capital.

BIRFPH Coordinator Syed Tayabul Bashar said their main objective was to establish peace and protect those who might fall victim to rumours and religious hatred.

There are vested interests who do not want to see the current progress in Bangladesh and are involved in destructive activities to tarnish the country's image abroad, they added.

Save and Serve Foundation, a non-government, non-profit that aims to promote religious tolerance, will act as the forum's secretariat, according to the organisers.

At the programme, eminent Islamic scholar Maulana Farid Uddin Masud said Islam as a religion considers love as its "core value."

"Only love and affection can solve problems, not hatred," he said. "Not only as a Muslim, but as a human being, I urge all to learn how to respect each other and be affectionate towards others."

A disturbing trend to demean others has emerged all over the world, he said, adding against such a backdrop, launching a forum to work for religious harmony was a timely step.

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

Rover to hunt for water on Moon

Nasa will send a mobile robot to the South Pole of the Moon to hunt for water, the US space agency has announced.

The rover -- the Volatiles **Investigating Polar Exploration** Rover, or VIPER for short -- is the size of a golf cart, and will sample the Moon's soil environments to search for evidence of water and ice.

Judge validates Democrats' bid

Orders release of unredacted copy of Mueller's report

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A US judge on Friday validated the legality of the Democratic-led impeachment inquiry against President Donald Trump and ordered his administration to hand over an unredacted copy of former special counsel Robert Mueller's report detailing Russian meddling in

the 2016 election. US District Judge Beryl Howell, handing a major victory to the Democratic-led House of Representatives, undercut an argument that Trump's fellow Republicans have made in

attacking the impeachment inquiry. The judge said the House need not approve a resolution formally initiating the effort.

The US Constitution gives the House wide latitude in handling impeachment. Democrats began the inquiry without putting such a SEE PAGE 10 COL 2

MIGRANTS IN KSA 200 more return home

Around 200 Bangladeshi workers were deported on Friday night from Saudi Arabia, as the authorities in the Kingdom are continuing to send back migrant workers.

With them, over 800 Bangladeshi workers were sent back this month alone, according to Brac Migration Programme, which maintains a database of deported migrant workers from different countries.

Friday's deportees landed at Hazrat Shahjalal International Airport around 11:30pm on a Saudia flight, said Shariful Hasan, head of the

Tensions high after 42 killed

imposing strict curfews.

Iraqi security forces sought to clamp down on protests in Baghdad and across the south yesterday, a day after dozens died in a bloody resumption of anti-government rallies. A parliamentary session scheduled for yesterday

afternoon to discuss the renewed protests was cancelled after it failed to reach a quorum. Since anti-government rallies first erupted on October 1,

nearly 200 people have died and thousands were wounded in Baghdad and across the country's Shia-majority south in violence condemned worldwide. Almost a quarter of them, 42, succumbed on Friday

alone from live rounds, tear gas canisters or while torching government buildings or offices belonging to powerful Hashed al-Shaabi paramilitary factions in several southern cities. Tensions remained high across several cities there

yesterday, with security forces cutting off roads and

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
