Tensions mounting between Shakib and BCB boss?

The Red Team comprising national cricketers lost a T20 practice match against The Green Team by 50 runs at the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium in Mirpur yesterday. However, the focus was not on the match as the question on everyone's lips was: where is Shakib al Hasan?

The Test and T20I captain did not turn up at the venue to play the game. There were a lot of murmurs about the tension between Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) President Nazmul Hassan and the premier all-rounder following the players' strike, which was followed by a letter to the all-rounder from the board.

BCB issued the letter asking Shakib to clarify why he had breached his contract by signing a deal with one of the country's top mobile phone operators without informing the board. Shakib had inked an agreement with the national team's former sponsors, Grameenphone, for an undisclosed sum at a time when he was also playing a pivotal role behind the cricketers' strike for better pay and benefits. Shakib, who attended a UNICEF programme at a local hotel

yesterday, was yet to reply.

"He didn't reply but there is enough time," said BCB CEO Nizamuddin Chowdhury when asked about Shakib's reply.

The BCB boss went to Mirpur to watch the practice match but when approached by reporters after the match, the usually media-friendly Hassan refused to say anything.

It was learned that the BCB boss was upset with Shakib's leading role in the players' strike.

"Everybody should get rid of their

ego... if all the parties allow their ego to take over, it can be suicidal for our cricket. We have to now fully focus on the upcoming India tour," an official said on condition of anonymity.

BCB's cricket operations committee chairman Akram Khan said: "The coach [Russell Domingo] told me that he was given a rest as he wanted to see the young players in the practice match."

It later emerged that Shakib's name was on the original players' list for the match, as a wicketkeeper no less.

BCCI proposes D/N Test for Tigers

The Board of Control for Cricket in India (BCCI) has asked the Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) to consider changing the second Test between Bangladesh and India next month from a day match to a day-night encounter. The second Test will be held at Kolkata's iconic Eden Gardens from November 22.

"Something to that effect is being discussed," BCB CEO Nizamuddin Chowdhury told reporters yesterday. "We have not yet decided. We will have to discuss with the players and team management." Neither country has played a day-night Test, which is played with a pink ball. New BCCI President Sourav Ganguly said recently that India skipper Virat Kohli was open to the idea.

Other than the final of the inaugural Bangladesh Cricket League in 2013 which was a day-night affair, pink-ball cricket is not a regular fixture in Bangladesh's domestic cricket.

Was Nasir deployed against the rules?

All-rounder Nasir Hossain's one-match suspension was lifted and he returned to action in the ongoing third round of the National Cricket League, making Rangpur's playing XI against Rajshahi yesterday.

He was chosen as a replacement for leg-spinner Rishad Hossain, who was among the nine players summoned by national selectors to participate in the Tigers' practice game in Mirpur.

Nasir was handed the ban after being found guilty of being involved in an altercation with the on-field umpire in the previous game against Dhaka at the Zahur Ahmed Chowdhury Stadium in Chittagong.

"Coincidentally, Nasir travelled with the team and paid his own expenses with the intention of attending the practice sessions. It would have been tough for Rangpur to fly in a new squad member for the game, which is why Nasir got included," member of the national selection panel, Habibul Bashar, said yesterday.

However, there are questions surrounding the inclusion as, according to the regulations a bowler can take the field in place of a fellow bowler and the same applies for a batsman in case of replacements.

Nasir is an established batting all-rounder and replaced a full-time bowler, who made headlines on the first day of the game with a five-wicket haul.

Nasir was unbeaten on an 82-ball 55 with five boundaries and two sixes at stumps on day two in the first innings.



Rangpur, Dhaka make headway

Rangpur Division took a first-innings lead of 62 runs with four wickets in hand in their Tier 1 clash against Rajshahi courtesy of fifties from Mehedi Maruf, Naeem Islam and Nasir Hossain on the second day of the third round of the National Cricket League match in Cox's Bazar yesterday.

Resuming the day on 32 for two at the Sheikh Kamal International Cricket Stadium Academy ground, Naeem and Mehedi added 127 runs for the third wicket before the latter was dismissed for a 232-ball 78, which featured seven fours and two sixes.

Naeem departed on 54 off 191 balls, striking six fours and a six, while Ariful Haque added 47 runs. Nasir is playing as the replacement for Rishad Hossain -- who was summoned by the selectors to join the national team's practice game -- and utilised the opportunity. He remained unbeaten on 55 as Rangpur ended the day on 263 for six. Off-spinner Iftekhar Sajjad bagged two while left-arm spinner Saqlain Sajib took a wicket for Rajshahi.

In the other Tier 1 game in Cox's Bazar, Dhaka Division made a good reply to Khulna's first-innings total of 371 as they ended the second day on 206 for two, trailing by 165.

Resuming the day on 290 for six, Rajshahi were bowled out after adding 81 to their overnight score. Dhaka seamer Sumon Khan and left-arm spinner Taibur Rahman bagged three wickets each.

In reply, Dhaka made a steady start riding on openers Rony Talukdar and Joyraz Sheikh, who added 125 for the opening wicket before the latter departed after scoring 51.

Rony looked impressive but he departed after scoring 73 off 126, which included six fours and three sixes. Saif Hasan (41 not out) and Raqibul Hasan (38 not out) then steadied the ship and added an unbeaten 81-run third-wicket stand before stumps. Rubel Hossain and Moinul Islam bagged a wicket each for Rajshahi.

Meanwhile, the other two Tier 2 games between Barishal and Dhaka Metroplis in Bogura and the match between Chittagong and Sylhet in Rajshahi were called off without a single ball being bowled due to wet outfielders for the second consecutive day.

Bangladesh U-16s' first three-day match against Pakistan U-16 ended in a draw on the third day in Rawalpindi yesterday.

Delhi pollution a concern ahead of Tigers' T20I

A spike in air pollution in Delhi has become a cause for concern in the run-up to the day-night India-Bangladesh T20I on November 3. According to government agencies, the air pollution level in the Indian capital shot up yesterday and was expected to enter the 'severe' category last night due to firecracker emissions on the occasion of Diwali, unfavourable weather and a significant spike in stubble burning.

A thin layer of toxic haze hung over Delhi yesterday morning and the overall air quality index stood at 313 at 9:00am local time, which continued its upward trend and was recorded at 341 at 2.30 pm. An AQI of 100 or less is considered 'satisfactory', and between 300 and 400 is considered 'very poor', and 'severe' above 400.

After last year's Diwali, Delhi's AQI had crossed the 600-mark.

It is expected that the Bangladesh team will be asked to carry face masks in case the need arises. "Look, we have factored in the post Diwali air pollution in Delhi but since the match is a week away, we are hopeful that the players won't face any health hazards," a senior BCCI official told PTI while acknowledging that there are practical concerns.

"The travel itinerary has been chalked in such a manner that Bangladesh will directly arrive in Delhi and exit the country from Kolkata. We wanted to make the travelling convenient that it starts from North, goes to West (Nagpur, Rajkot, Indore) and finishes in the east (Kolkata)," the official said.

The Indian government has also asked Haryana and Punjab to stop stubble burning completely for the next 'critical' days.
