Saif Hassan, who captained Bangladesh Aduring their tour of India last month, has been in terrific form as of late scoring a century against India A before going on to hit a hundred against Sri Lanka in Colombo earlier this month. He also smashed a double ton for Dhaka Division in the 21st edition of the ongoing National Cricket League (NCL) and so, the 20-year old was rewarded with his first ever call to the national squad.

Meanwhile, Mustafizur Rahman got a cal back to the team after being dropped from the one-off Test against Afghanistan in early September. Opener Imrul Kayes also made it into the team following a double-ton in the NCL earlier this month while Soumya Sarkar was dropped.

BD Games to be held next year

The Bangladesh Olympic Association (BOA) have decided to hold the ninth edition of the Bangladesh Games in April next year, about seven years since the last edition was held in late April, 2013.

"We are going to hold the ninth edition of the Bangladesh Games from April 1 to 10, 2020, which will see the 100th birth anniversary of Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman. That is why we will name the Games after Bangabandhu," BOA secretary general Syed Shaheed Reza said yesterday. "We want to hold the Games in a large scale with athletes from all over

the country participating.' Reza also informed that they had initially planned to hold the tournament's ninth edition in 2017 but backtracked their decision to hold the inaugural Youth Bangladesh Games in early 2018.

The BOA secretary went on to say that they would soon has out the finer details of the Games after the next executive committee meeting, set to be held on November 2. Reza added that they do plan on having a colourful opening and closing ceremony though.

Lee's emphatic hattrick takes Terengganu into final

But Syafik Bin Ismail regained Terengganu's lead before Lee Tuck completed his treble, ensuring a comprehensive victory for the Malaysian outfit. Terengganu will face hosts Chattogram

Abahani in the final tomorrow. The hattrick took the Englishman to

the top of the scorer's chart with six goals. Terengganu had shown impressive

form in the group stages, scoring nine goals against five, but it was Kibu Vicuna's Mohun Bagan who looked the better side in the first half, dominating possession and attacks.

However, after a few wasted opportunities from the Mohun Bagan forwards, Lee Tuck broke the deadlock in the 39th minute with a grounded free-kick past the wall.

The Malaysians took the lead into the break, but the Kolkata giants continued to impress, with Munoz getting them back on level terms two minutes after restart with a clinical spot-kick following a foul on Britto Pankras Metilda inside the box.

Mohun Bagan side and were in search for inspiration, which came from their skipper Lee Tuck 12 minutes later.

The Englishman once again found the back of the net from a freekick, this time a powerful 25-yarder curled right into the top right corner over the wall. Munoz though, hit the target two minutes later with a towering header on another freekick to get the Green and Maroons back into the game.

It looked like anybody's game at that stage but Syafik, the shortest man on the pitch and one of the most technically gifted ones, found a way past the Mohun Bagan defence to make it 3-2 with an angular shot on 74 minutes.

And then Lee Tuck completed a well-deserved hattrick from a spotkick four minutes later, his sixth goal of the tournament and fifth goal from a set-piece in a match, to confirm Terengganu's place in the final.

Reza hopeful for good results at SA Games

Bangladesh Olympic Association (BOA) secretary general Syed Shahed Reza believes that Bangladesh will produce better results in the upcoming South Asian (SA) Games in Nepal that they had in the last edition of the multisports event. Bangladesh won only four gold medals in the previous edition with two coming from swimming events while the remainder came from shooting and weightlifting events.

Reza expressed these sentiments after attending a meeting with the higher ups of 25 national federations at the Olympic Bhaban yesterday. At the meeting, they also discussed about finalizing the Bangladesh contingent for December's 1-10 Games in Kathmandu.

Reza expressed his expectation after having a meeting with the high-ups of 25 national federation at Olympic Bhaban yesterday where they also discussed about the finalizing Bangladesh continent for the SA Games, to be held from December 1 to 10 in Kathmandu.

"I believe that Bangladesh will produce better results this time than they had in the previous edition. I am saying this on the basis of the athlete's performances in the ongoing training camp. Besides, we have also analysed some data on the athletes," said Reza.

The BOA began the training camp for 23 of 25 disciplines in July and is currently ongoing under the supervision of the BOA, which also looked into why Bangladesh could only secure a single gold medal in 2016 despite having won 18 gold medals in the 2010 edition in Dhaka.

"This time, we have given importance to those disciplines which have PHIFT to begin good potential in upcoming games and we are also watching the progress of athletes of those disciplines in training. Those things are helping us believe we can produce good results," said Reza, who is also the chairman of the training and development committee.

Training and development committee member secretary AK Sarkar informed that hired foreign coaches for 10 disciplines -- Kabaddi, taekwondo basketball, swimming, karate, volleyball, fencing, judo, archery and shooting.

"I am satisfied with the training as we have been trying to provide support as much as we can with our limited resources. We have even sent three teams -- kabaddi to India, karate to Malaysia and boxing to Thailand -- aboard for better training," said Sarker, who believes that Bangladesh could do well in disciplines such as shooting, archery, football and cricket.

"If you look back, we had success in those disciplines in the SA Games in the past. Besides, the athletes of those disciplines are also doing well in the training though it is always difficult to win the gold fighting against mighty India," said Sarkar.

In response to a query, Sarker said, "There is the possibility of producing good results at demonstration events in martial-arts disciplines like judo, karate and others because of the absence of Afghanistan, who quit from the sub-continent multi-sports extravaganza."
