The school of inclusion

Patuakhali's floating school serves kids of underprivileged Manta community

Eight-year-old Khadija Akhter has never been to school. She is also well past the eligible age to enter a primary

A member of the Manta community, she was born and

lived her whole life with her family in a boat at a riverbank in Char Montaz Launch Ghat area, a remote shoal in Patuakhali's Rangabali upazila. The community survives on fishing and leads a nomadic life in boats since losing their lands to river erosion and

climate change. They have no identity, like National Identity Cards or birth registration. Attending school is, at very best, an alien concept to her. But the unthinkable has become possible for her, thanks to an initiative of local nongovernment organisation Jago

Charity. They inaugurated a floating school at a remote shoal area near her fishing community.

Her nineteen-year-old brother Md Ripon, never having had the privilege of attending school himself, recently enrolled his sister in the free school.

"I never got an opportunity at education. But I should send my sister when there is a chance of a better future," Ripon told The Daily Star.

There are a total of 86 Manta families in Char Montaz area, with a population of 350, including 100 children. SEE PAGE 10 COL 2

easiest country to get away with killing a journo

Impunity for the murders of journalists is still overwhelmingly the norm in more than a dozen countries, including Bangladesh, a Committee to Protect Journalists (CPJ) report warned yesterday. The study titled "Getting Away with

Murder" was released ahead of the International Day to End Impunity for Crimes Against Journalists on November 2.

The New York-based group's report placed Bangladesh, with 10 unsolved murders, at 10th spot on a list of 13 worst

offenders. been killed for their work across the globe, the report found. Of those cases, some 243

perpetrators have gone unpunished. Of the murders, some 222 were in the 13 countries listed in the report, CPJ said, with many of the cases linked to war and

civil unrest. The countries "represent a mix of conflict-ridden regions and more stable countries where criminal groups, politicians, government officials, and other powerful actors resort to violence to silence critical and investigative reporting," SEE PAGE 10 COL 4

Opposition parties back PM's December 12 election

Britain was heading towards its first December election in almost a century after Prime Minister Boris Johnson's bet on breaking the Brexit deadlock with an early ballot gained support from opposition parties yesterday.

As the European Union agreed a third delay to the divorce that was originally supposed to take place on March 29, the United Kingdom, its parliament and its electorate remain divided on how or indeed whether to go ahead with Brexit.

Johnson, who had promised to deliver Brexit on Oct. 31 "do or die", has repeatedly demanded an election to end what he casts as a nightmare paralysis that is sapping public trust in politicians by frustrating any Brexit outcome at all.

After parliament refused Johnson his third demand for an election on In the past decade, 318 journalists have Monday, he was set to try to force a bill through parliament yesterday that calls for a Dec. 12 election. It needs a simple majority in parliament. In a move that aligns the stars for an election after months of Brexit

discord, Jeremy Corbyn, leader of the main opposition Labour Party, said he would back an election now the threat of Britain exiting the EU without a transition deal had been removed.

"Whatever date the House decides the election will be, I'm ready for it, we're ready for it," Corbyn told parliament.

Johnson said the House of Commons was obstructing Brexit and thus damaging the economy by preventing investment decisions, and corroding faith in democracy.

"There is only one way to get Brexit done in the face of this unrelenting parliamentary obstructionism - this endless wilful fingers-crossed 'not me Guy' refusal to deliver on the mandate of the people - and that is, Mr SEE PAGE 10 COL 2

Three men were killed in what Rab said was a gunfight with their members in Chattogram's Sitakunda upazila early yesterday.

Origin of modern humans traced to Botswana

Modern humans emerged 200,000 years ago in a region of northern Botswana, scientists claimed Monday, in what appeared to be the most precise location of mankind's "ancestral homeland" yet discovered.

While it has long been known anatomically modern humans -- homo sapiens -- originated in Africa, scientists have until now been unable to pinpoint the precise location of our species' birthplace.

An international team of researchers took DNA samples from 200 Khoesan people, an ethnic group known to carry a high proportion of a branch of DNA known as L0, living in modern day South SEE PAGE 10 COL 2

They built bridge on their own

Locals of Gaddimari village have taken it upon themselves to build a bridge made of bamboo after the government failed to do so, despite repeated appeals.

The concrete bridge over a canal at the Teesta basin had collapsed around four years ago in the village of Lalmonirhat's Hatibandha upazila, which locals were now replacing with a bamboo bridge.

They donated the bamboo and raised funds for the construction of the bridge, which is being built to ensure better communication to the upazila headquarters.

Baghdadi given burial at sea

US officials say remains of IS chief afforded religious rites, did not disclose where ritual was performed

The United States has given the remains of Islamic State leader Abu Bakr al-Baghdadi a burial at sea and afforded him religious rites according to Islamic custom after he was killed in a US commando raid in Syria on Saturday, three officials told Reuters.

Baghdadi, an Iraqi jihadist who rose from obscurity to declare himself "caliph" of all Muslims as the leader of Islamic State, died by detonating a suicide vest after fleeing into a dead-end tunnel as elite US special forces closed in, according to the US government.

The US officials, who spoke on condition of anonymity, did not disclose where the ritual was performed or how long it lasted. Two officials said they believed his remains were delivered to the sea from an aircraft.

US Army General Mark Milley, the chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, told a Pentagon news briefing on Monday that the US military disposed of Baghdadi's remains "appropriately, in accordance with our (standard operating procedures) and in accordance with the law of armed conflict."

Given the gruesome nature of Baghdadi's death, it was unlikely the US military followed as complete a process as it did after Navy SEALs killed al Qaeda founder Osama bin Laden in a 2011 raid into Pakistan. Bin Laden was killed by a gunshot wound to the head, according to the US government.
