filed in 2002. The High Court yesterday scrapped the trial proceeding against Rabeya, the woman from Samirpur village in Daulatpur upazila of Manikganj, in the case. The court also expressed dissatisfaction at the trial court judge and its assistant public prosecutor (APP) for their incompetence and negligence in properly handling the case.

The court told Md Al Mamun, judge of Dhaka Metropolitan Special Tribunal-2, and its APP Shahabuddin that the case against Rabeya had reached this level due to their incompetence and negligence, which is very unfortunate.

The HC bench of Justice Jahangir Hossain Selim and Justice Md Riaz Uddin Khan also asked them to be careful so that such incident does not take place in future.

The bench delivered the verdict after hearing a rule issued by this court earlier about cancellation of the trial proceedings against Rabeya.

Supreme Court lawyer Ashraful Alam Nobel filed a petition with the HC in April this year following a news report saying that Rabeya Khatun had been suffering as she needed to appear before the trial court in the connection

Eight arrested for rape in 4 dists

Eight men were arrested over rape incidents across the country yesterday.

Three of them were arrested on charge of gang-raping a woman in Laxmipur, while another was arrested for allegedly raping his daughter in Narayanganj.

Two others in Sonargaon upazila were arrested for allegedly gangraping a woman.

A man was arrested in a case filed over raping a minor girl in Chattogram and another in Jashore was arrested on charge of raping a girl with a learning disability.

The arrestees in Laxmipur were identified as Billal Hossain, 30, Alauddin, 21, and Billal Hossain, 25. They are residents of Ramgoti upazila's Charneyamot village.

Police said the victim's husband used to work at a furniture shop at Alexander Bazar. The victim went there to look for him on Tuesday

evening, said police quoting her. At one stage, she was introduced to Billal, who told her he would take her to her husband. Later at night, Billal took the woman to one of his friends' houses, where she was raped by five

persons, including Billal. Later yesterday, the victim filed a case against the rapists. Three of them have already been arrested, while police are conducting drives to arrest the rest, said Arichul Haque, officer-

Passengers suffer as Air Asia flight delayed for 24hrs

Around 144 passengers of Air Asia had to suffer an around 24-hour delay due to a technical glitch yesterday, sources at Hazrat Shahjalal International

Among 144 passengers, there were several Bangladeshi migrant workers who were scheduled to go to Brunei through a connecting flight.

Due to delay, the workers and several other passengers failed to reach their destinations in Malaysia and

Brunei, Kamrun Nahar, a passenger, told The Daily Star. The Malaysia-based budget airlines Air Asia flight AK-70 was scheduled

to take off from HSIA for Malaysia around 12:30am yesterday. The aircraft -- Airbus 320 -- was kept waiting for long after the authorities

completed all formalities and got the passengers on board the aircraft. The cabin crew first blamed the

airport authorities for the delay but after around an hour, the pilot requested the bassengers to disembark.

The airlines authorities later arranged accommodation for the passengers at lifferent nearby hotels.

Kamrun Nahar said she was cheduled to attend an international seminar in Malaysia, but missed it due to the long delay.

As per the rescheduled time, the flight was likely to take off at around 12:35am today, sources at the airport said.

Air Asia started operating flights from Dhaka in 2015. It operates seven flights in a week on the Dhaka-Malaysia route.

Officials of Air Asia at the HSIA were not available for comments.

Myanmar out to mislead int'l community

Bangladesh is now hosting over 1.1 million Rohingyas who have fled their homeland in Rakhine after being persecuted by their own country. Myanmar didn't take back a single Rohingya from Bangladesh over the last two years.

Two repatriation attempts were unsuccessful as Myanmar "failed to remove trust deficit" among the Rohingyas and there was "lack of conducive environment" in Rakhine for their return. Bangladesh said Myanmar should

seriously consider a comprehensive participation of the international community in creating conducive environment for the return as well as in the monitoring of repatriation and reintegration process.

"Myanmar should also cooperate with the international community to eliminate the culture of impunity for the sake of a durable solution to the protracted problem," the foreign ministry said.

STORIES COOKED UP

The ministry said Myanmar Union Minister for International Cooperation U Kyaw Tin resorted to misrepresentation of the whole issue.

He also laid unjustified blames on Bangladesh in his effort to refute the well-founded remarks by the Bangladesh foreign minister on the Rohingya crisis at the preparatory ministerial meeting of the 18th NAM Summit in Baku, Azerbaijan, on October 23.

In his statement, Tin accused Bangladesh of mischaracterising the Rohingya crisis as "religious persecution", "driving an ethnic group out of the country", "ethnic cleansing" or "genocide", among others.

In reality, such observations are made by the international community based on documented evidence, which bear unmistakable signs of forcible deportation of a community from its ancestral homeland in Rakhine in the face of atrocity crimes against the civilian population, said the Bangladesh foreign ministry.

It said the nature and extent of atrocities in 2017 surpassed all previous records.

Tin claimed that the crisis is confined only in the northern strip of Rakhine State and people of different faiths are living in harmony in the remaining areas across the country. The Bangladesh foreign ministry

said it is a "well-known fact that continued disenfranchisement of the country's ethnic minorities by successive governments of Myanmar and suppression of their rights and justified demands by force rendered Myanmar as one of the world's largest homes to Internally Displaced Persons and a leading source of cross-border displacements".
