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option, which can now be used for free, said a member of the joint team.

The government now needs to make a regulation on the “SIM-less” emergency service can be used, he added.

“Against this backdrop, mobile operators need to align their network with this system and then users can access these facilities,” said Md Zahik Hossain Khan, senior assistant director of the Bangladesh Telecommunication Regulatory Commission (BTRC).

“It’s like a normal call. The joint team has tested it by removing their SIM cards and they found response,” Khan, also the spokesperson of the BTRC, said.

The emergency number can prove very useful in cases of natural disasters, mostly in the coastal belt of the country, where mobile towers are often damaged. If even one mobile network is live, then mobile phone users can use that for the calls, said a senior member of the armed forces division.

He said in some developed countries these kind of channels already have been introduced.

“We have done our part; now the government needs to formulate a policy for it, which will be a milestone of our resistance against natural disaster.”

To make this initiative successful, the joint team will bring all mobile operators under a single network and take support from Chinese network vendor Huawei, they said.

BTRC officials said mobile operators would be directed to facilitate the emergency services.

The trial for the initiative was held in Purbachal, Dhaka and Rangpur. Government and Rural Development Minister Md Tazul Islam and State minister for disaster management and relief Md Enamur Rahman were present.

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April 29 this year issued a rule asking the government to explain why the trial proceeding against Rabeya Khatun should not be quashed.

After hearing the rule, the HC bench yesterday scraped the trial proceedings of the case against Rabeya and acquitted her of the charges in the case.

The police allegedly arrested Rabeya Khatun with a firearm and six bullets from a residence of Garden Road area under Tejgaon Police Station on June 2, 2002.

Police filed a case against Rabeya and two others with Tejgaon Police Station on the same day.

On September 19, the same year, police submitted a charge sheet against Rabeya and another accused Zulhas before a trial court.

The trial court, on March 24 in 2003, framed charges against Rabeya and Zulhas but there was no progress of trial proceeding of the case. Detailed information about Zulhas could not be known.

After suffering in jail for six months, Rabeya was released from jail on bail.

Advocate Ashraful Alam Nobel himself moved the petition while Deputy Attorney General Harunur Rashid represented the state.

Manipur, one of India’s smallest states with a population of around just 2.8 million people, is one of the so-called “Seven Sisters” -- a group of restive northeastern states.

The region, encircled by five other countries and connected to the rest of India by a sliver of land arching over Bangladesh, has been wracked by armed conflict and instability.

It has spawned more than 100 militant groups over the decades whose demands range from autonomy to secession.

Violence has been part of daily life for decades in Manipur, which borders Myanmar, with a strong presence of the Indian military.

The state has a strong ethnic mix, and its Meitei, Naga, Kuki and Pangal communities are all deeply committed to preserving their own cultural autonomy.

Its people have also always tended to look eastwards in their search for cultural links.

Samarjit said he hoped the world would support its independence cause.

“We are not free there and our history is going to be destroyed, our culture is going to be extinct,” he warned.

“So the UN should listen... we raise our voice to the whole world that the people living in Manipur are human beings.”

The High Commission of India did not respond to a request for comment.

The Daily Star obtained a video clip of the incident that showed Shaibal dragged Joy to the ground and took him away from the protesters.

In the footage, Shaibal was saying, “Let’s go. Let’s move.”

Joy submitted a written complaint to the proctor in this regard.

Meanwhile, a second-year student of drama and dramatics department -- Chamelia Sharmin Chura -- submitted a written complaint demanding punishment of some students for assaulting her during the protest.

“Assistant Proctor Shaibal instigated some students and carried out an attack on us,” she said in her complaint.

Contacted, Shaibal denied the allegations and said, “Rather, I suffered injuries”.

He said, “I did not grab Joy by his collar. I rather held him by the shoulders and moved him from the spot.

“Someone kicked me eight to ten times at that time.”

However, the footage that this newspaper obtained did not show anything of that sort happened to Shaibal.

The assistant proctor further said that he suffered injuries near his urethra (urinary passage) and was being treated at Enam Medical College and Hospital in Savar.

Bangabandhur Adarsher Shikkhakh, a teachers’ platform backed by the VC, also issued a statement in this regard, saying Shaibal was “seriously wounded” by the protesters.

FRESH PROTEST FLARES UP

Soon after the news spread among the students, they broke off into separate groups and started chanting slogans against Shaibal.

Professor Rayhan Rhyne of Philosophy department, also a spokesperson of Jahangirnagar Against Corruption, condemned the attack.

He said that it was “tragic” that a teacher could do this to a protesting student.”

At a press briefing, he said, “VC’s removal is the only solution to reduce the crisis. So, we will continue our protest until the VC is removed.”

In the evening, a concert was also held in the university’s transport area in solidarity with the protest. It was the third day of all-out strike on the campus.

A section of teachers and students

have been staging demonstration on the campus demanding VC’s removal since September 18 over corruption.

On the other hand, JU unit Chhatra League yesterday brought out a procession demanding “free environment for classes and examinations”.

Syrian and Turkish armies in deadly border clash

The armies of Syria and Turkey traded deadly fire Tuesday for the first time since Ankara launched an anti-Kurdish offensive in early October, as Russia announced Kurdish forces had withdrawn from the key border area.

Russian Defence Minister Sergei Shoigu said Kurdish forces had pulled back from the entire Turkish-Syrian border in accordance with a deal struck between Ankara and regime backer Moscow in Sochi earlier this month.

“The withdrawal of armed units from territory where a security corridor should be created has been completed ahead of time,” Shoigu said, as quoted by Russian news agencies.

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disastrous” re-nationalisation programme and “continually to flip-flop one way or the other” on Brexit.

Corbyn shot back by claiming that the Conservative prime minister’s post-Brexit trade proposals were selling out British interests to US President Donald Trump.

“Despite his denials, (the National Health Service) is up for grabs by US corporations in a Trump-style trade deal,” Corbyn said.

Corbyn’s attack line underscores Labour’s desire to shift the campaign’s focus to traditional social issues and away from its past difficulties with the defining issue of UK politics.

Britain’s first December vote in nearly 100 years and third general election in four years finds his party splintered by bitter infighting.

Pro-EU supporters from big cities have been at loggerheads with Brexit-backing groups such as the powerful trade unions.

Some of Corbyn’s chief lieutenants have further suggested the party should pick a new leader should it flounder at the polls.

But the 70-year-old Corbyn, a veteran socialist, is an energetic campaigner who nearly managed to score an upset victory in the last general

election in 2017.

“The choice at this election couldn’t be clearer,” he said yesterday.

“People have a chance to vote for real change after years of Conservative and Liberal Democrat cuts.”

Labour’s Brexit promise is to seize power and then strike a more European-friendly agreement with Brussels that preserves many of the existing trade ties.

It would then let voters choose between that deal and the option of simply staying in the EU.

Government figures indicated there had been a spike in voter registration since Tuesday, with people aged 18 to 34 leading the way, although their intentions are difficult to predict.

Announcements by dozens of sitting MPs that they would not be seeking re-election have also complicated forecasts.

The two other main players -- the Liberal Democrats and the Scottish National Party -- are adopting much firmer Brexit stances.

The SNP also sees the vote as another chance to bolster support for independence.

The fast-rising Lib Dems are going into the vote on a simple promise of stopping the EU-UK divorce by any means.

Talks on for purchase

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“We need to keep pace with the new era,” Abdullah Ibn Zaid, director of the Inter Service Public Relations Directorate, an arm of the Bangladesh Army, told Nikkei.

“Professionalism won’t develop unless we modernise the military,” Zaid said.

Since Bangladesh’s independence from Pakistan in 1971, China, Russia, the US, the UK and South Korea have been the country’s main suppliers of arms and ammunition.

While China remains Bangladesh’s largest defense equipment provider, purchases from the US have grown steadily since the 1990s, reaching \$110 million for the nine years since 2010. The figure is dwarfed by its “\$1.92 billion in defense purchases from China in the 2010s”, Nikkei reported, quoting the Stockholm International Peace Research Institute.

Asked whether procurement from the US would antagonise China, Abdullah Ibn Zaid told Nikkei, “It’s not an issue of making one happy while [the] other [is] unhappy.

“We have bought from the US before. We have a pact with China as well.”

US officials in Dhaka earlier on October 17 told a group of journalists that US wants to sign two agreements -- the General Security of Military Information Agreement (GSOMIA) and the Acquisition Cross-Servicing Agreement (ACSA) -- as Bangladesh last year sought to buy sophisticated military equipment.

According to them, GSOMIA is a foundational government-to-government legally-binding agreement that permits greater collaboration, and ensures that governments understand and commit to protecting classified military information.

The GSOMIA does not obligate governments to share classified

information or material. It ensures protection of the information shared by partner governments, the officials said.

Meanwhile, ACSA allows US and partner nations’ forces to procure and pay for common types of supplies and services, including food, water, clothing, transportation, training, petroleum, ammunition, maintenance and medical services.

“The agreement does not, in anyway, commit a partner nation to military action nor does it authorise stationing of ships, aircraft or military personnel in foreign countries,” an official added.

A US official told Nikkei one benefit would be “to significantly ease our ability to transfer major defense equipment that will help safeguard Bangladesh’s sovereignty and our mutual interests in the region.

“These agreements are also consistent with our interest in expanding our partnership with Bangladesh in the areas of humanitarian assistance and disaster relief, peacekeeping, defense trade, military cooperation and counterterrorism, as well as maritime security and regional issues,” he told Nikkei.

Analysts told Nikkei that Bangladesh’s booming economy and strategic location make a compelling case for Bangladesh to bolster its military strength.

Delwar Hossain, professor of international relations at Dhaka University, said it was imperative for Bangladesh to acquire sophisticated military gear because the importance of the Bay of Bengal has risen “all of a sudden”, while China’s Belt and Road Initiative has raised the profile of the region globally.

“It’s a pragmatic decision,” Hossain told Nikkei. “It’s a new area of building strategic relations with the United States.”

Eight arrested

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in-charge (OC) of Ramgati police station.

In Narayanganj’s Bandar upazila, police yesterday arrested a father on charge of raping his daughter.

Police said the victim was raped by her father, when the mother was at work. He had allegedly raped the 18-year-old girl multiple times over the last one year.

Around three months ago, the victim shared the incident with her mother. Then, the mother and the victim left the house and started living elsewhere, said Raiful Islam, OC of Bandar police station.

But the father would often visit and threaten them. Later, the victim and her mother informed the matter to locals who helped the victim file a case against her father yesterday, said the OC.

Following filing of the case, police arrested the father, who was later sent to jail by a court, added the police officer.

In a separate incident in Sonargaon upazila, police yesterday arrested two men on charge of gang-raping a domestic help.

The arrestees are Habibur Rahman, 40, and Shahinur Islam, 30.

Police said the 27-year victim used to live in a rented house owned by Habibur in Baghbhari area of the same upazila. But recently, the woman left the house and started living elsewhere.

On Monday night, the woman came to Habibur’s residence for some discussion over payment of house rent. Then, Habibur along with three of his accomplices, gang-raped her.

On Tuesday, the victim filed a case against the four. Police yesterday arrested the two, while the others accused were on the run, said

Moniruzzaman, OC of Sonargaoan police station.

In Chattogram, police arrested a man for raping a minor girl at Banskhali upazila yesterday morning.

The arrestee was identified as Mohammad Ismail, 32, hailing from Chambal village of the upazila.

Police said the nine-year-old victim and the accused were related to each other. The accused raped the girl on Tuesday night around 9:00pm, said police.

Afterwards, the victim’s mother filed a case yesterday. Police arrested the accused, said Kamal Uddin, inspector (Investigation) of Banskhali police.

In Jashore, a man was sued yesterday in Chowgacha upazila on charge of raping his neighbour.

The accused was identified as Korban Ali, 50, of Balidapara village under the same upazila.

Quoting the victim’s family members, police said she used to work as a domestic help at Korban’s house. But the girl with a learning disability quit as Korban often sexually harassed her.

On October 24, the victim was going to a nearby shop, when she was intercepted by Korban, who forcibly took her to a nearby banana garden and raped her. Korban then beat her with iron rod and threatened to kill her, if she disclosed the matter.

Yesterday, the victim’s father filed a rape case against Korban. Police was conducting raid to arrest the accused, said Rajib Khan, OC of Chowgacha police station.
