BNP leader Giasuddin jailed for 3 years


Chattogram court yesterday sentenced BNP Vice-chairman Giasuddin Quader Chowdhury to three years' imprisonment in a case filed over issuing death threat to Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina and making derogatory comments about

Verifying all records and evidence, the court of Senior Judicial Magistrate Shahidullah Kaisar handed the

sentence after finding him guilty, said Additional Public Prosecutor Shamir Das Gupta. The court also fined the BNP leader Tk 5,000, in default of which he will

have to serve three more months in jail, he added. Shamir said six witnesses testified

at the trial. He said Giasuddin had

On May 31 last year, Nazim Uddin Muhuri, Fatikchhari upazila Awami League general secretary, filed the case after the

BNP leader issued the death threat to the prime minister and made derogatory comments about her at an event in the upazila on May 29 that year. At the programme, organised by the local unit of BNP, Giasuddin had

reportedly said Hasina would have the fate or worse than that of her father Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman.

After the incident, four cases were lodged against Giasuddin.

Eight men were arrested over rape

raping a woman. A man was arrested in a case filed over raping a minor girl in Chattogram and another in Jashore was arrested on charge of raping a girl with a learning

disability. The arrestees in Laxmipur were identified as Billal Hossain, 30, Alauddin, 21, and Billal Hossain, 25. They are residents of Ramgoti

upazila's Charneyamot village. Police said the victim's husband used to work at a furniture shop at Alexander Bazar. The victim went

there to look for him on Tuesday evening, said police quoting her. At one stage, she was introduced to Billal, who told her he would take her

to her husband. Later at night, Billal took the woman to one of his friends' houses, where she was raped by five persons, including Billal.

Later yesterday, the victim filed a case against the rapists. Three of them have already been arrested, while police are conducting drives to arrest the rest, said Arichul Haque, officer-

delayed for 24hrs

Around 144 passengers of Air Asia had to suffer an around 24-hour delay due to a technical glitch yesterday, sources at Hazrat Shahjalal International Airport said.

Among 144 passengers, there were several Bangladeshi migrant workers who were scheduled to go to Brunei

through a connecting flight. Due to delay, the workers and several other passengers failed to reach their destinations in Malaysia and Brunei, Kamrun Nahar, a passenger,

told The Daily Star. The Malaysia-based budget airlines Air Asia flight AK-70 was scheduled to take off from HSIA for Malaysia

around 12:30am yesterday. The aircraft -- Airbus 320 -- was kept waiting for long after the authorities

completed all formalities and got the passengers on board the aircraft.

The cabin crew first blamed the airport authorities for the delay but after around an hour, the pilot requested the passengers to disembark.

The airlines authorities later arranged accommodation for the passengers at different nearby hotels.

More than two thirds of the vulnerable populations live ın some countries of Asia, including Bangladesh, China, India, Vietnam, Indonesia and Thailand, says the study, titled "New Elevation Data Triple Estimates of Global Vulnerability to

Sea-Level Rise and Coastal Flooding". A map created using a form of artificial intelligence, known as neural networks, shows that by 2050 some coastal cities from South and South East Asia will be under water during

"These assessments show the potential of climate change to reshape cities, economies, coastlines, and entire global regions within our lifetimes," said Dr Scott Kulp, a senior scientist at Climate Central and lead author of the study.

Dr Benjamin Strauss said, "For most of the global coasts we didn't know the height of the ground beneath our feet." The researchers used a model
