Khulna look to stretch lead as 4th rnd begins

The fourth round of the National Cricket League (NCL) will begin across four venues from today. Tier 1 table-toppers Khulna Division will take on Rangpur Division in Bogura while Rajshahi Division will host Dhaka Division. In Tier-2 Barisal will lock horns against Sylhet in Cox's Bazar and host Chittagong Division will take on Dhaka Metropolis.

Courtesy of their left-arm spin duo of Sunzamul Islam and Saqlain Sajib, who bagged five wicket each in the second innings, Rajshahi registered a magnificent six-wicket win over Rangpur in the previous round. With that win, Rajshahi jumped to the second position with 13.11 points while Khulna sits on top with 17.25 points after one win and two draws in three games.

It was Khulna's wicketkeeper-batsman Anamul Haque who registered back to back hundreds in each innings against Dhaka and the cricketer will be looking to continue his form to make a possible comeback to the national team.

Dhaka Division are in third place with 10.2 points and they will surely miss their prolific scorer Saif Hassan, who struck a double hundred in the second round and earned a maiden call-up to the Tigers' Test squad for the two-Test series in India. Rangpur, with one defeat and two draws, are at the bottom of the table with 6.72 points.

In Tier 2, after a comprehensive nine-wicket win over Sylhet Division, Chattogram Division top the table with Barishal Division and Sylhet Division not far behind at second and third respectively. Dhaka Metropolis, who are still at the bottom of the table despite managing to draw their previous game against Barishal, courtesy of Mohammad Ashraful's hundred on the last day, which was coincidentally the day that Shakib Al Hasan was suspended for two years by the ICC for failing to report approaches from a bookmaker.

Itchy eyes, sore throat but Tigers not complaining

Delhi's air pollution has left several Bangladesh players with sore throats and itchy eyes but coach Russell Domingo dismissed any health concerns and said they were focused on giving a good account of themselves in Sunday's Twenty20 match against India.

The city government instructed schools in Delhi on Friday to remain shut until Nov. 5 as residents breathed the season's worst air for a third straight day.

Several Bangladesh players and support staff wore face masks during Friday's training at the Arun Jaitley Stadium and Domingo said it was not ideal but the tourists would not make an issue out of it.

"Not obviously perfect with the smog but it's the same for both the teams," the South African told reporters.

"It's not perfect, it's not ideal, but it's nothing we're going to complain about and moan over.

We just got to get on with it...

"For sure we have some scratchy eyes, maybe a little sore throats now and then, but it's been okay. Nobody is being sick or dying or anything like that."

Delhi's notorious smog caused Sri Lankan bowler Suranga Lakmal to vomit on the field during a 2017 Tests at Kotla and prompted questions about scheduling matches in northern India during winter.

Domingo referred to Bangladesh's own struggle with air pollution and said the team were not taking any special precaution.

"We know Sri Lanka struggled a bit last time. There's bit of pollution in Bangladesh as well. So it's not a massive shock to the system," Domingo said.

India's batting coach Vikram Rathour was rather dismissive about it.

"You're asking the wrong person I think," said the former player from Punjab.

"I've played all my life in north India. We're used to these conditions. We are not taking any

special measure. The game has been scheduled and we're here to play."

More than air quality, the tourists are struggling to cope with the absence of talismanic all-rounder Shakib Al Hasan, who was banned earlier this week for an anti-corruption breach.

"He [Shakib] has been a big player for Bangladesh and is close friends with a lot of players. Anybody will miss Shakib...but he made a mistake and is paying the price for it," Domingo said.

Shakib's absence has left the coach with a selection dilemma, though he expected youngsters to step up.

"It's very tricky because Shakib bats at number three and often opens the bowling or bowls first change," Domingo said.

"So you got to decide 'whether I want to replace the batsman or I replace the bowler' because it's very difficult to replace both. Not many players provide you both skills."

"I don't think there is anyone earmarked to specifically do Shakib's job."

It's a courageous decision: Waugh

Former captain Steve Waugh, an alumni of the "tough school" of Australian cricket, has praised all-rounder Glenn Maxwell for having the courage to seek treatment for a mental health issue.

Maxwell was ruled out of the Australian team indefinitely on Thursday after confiding in coach Justin Langer about his health issues ahead of a T20 match against

Sri Lanka in Adelaide.

"I think it's a courageous decision and one that should be applauded," Waugh told reporters on Friday of Maxwell's break from the team.

"It's a high-pressure situation, professional sport, and people have got outside pressures and things happening in life just like normal people. Sometimes it becomes a bit too much."

Waugh, who led a series of uncompromising teams in the late 1990s and early 2000s, is renowned for unabashedly championing "mental disintegration", Australia's tactic of putting opposition players off their games through targeted sledging.

He freely admitted that speaking about a mental health issue was taboo during his playing days.

"It was a tough school back then, and I look at a lot of players I played with and I think back now, and maybe they had mental issues," said the 54-year-old.

"But at the time, it was almost a

sign of weakness to put your hand up.

"I'm glad that that's changed because so many people suffered in silence." --REUTERS

Kane's action cleared

New Zealand captain Kane Williamson's bowling action was given the all-clear Friday after he was reported during the first Test against Sri Lanka in August.

The right-handed batsman and occasional off-spinner came under scrutiny in Galle during a Test that Sri Lanka won by six wickets.

He subsequently underwent a bowling assessment in England last month, where his action met the elbow extension angle permitted under ICC rules.

"The International Cricket Council today confirmed that the bowling action of New Zealand captain Kane Williamson has been found to be legal, and he can continue bowling in international cricket," the ICC said in a statement. --AFP

Warner stars again in Australia's clean sweep

Australia cruised past Sri Lanka to clean sweep their three-match Twenty20 series Friday, with an in-form David Warner grinding out a third successive half-century in the seven-wicket win.

The home team have been dominant throughout, winning by 134 runs in Adelaide and by nine wickets with seven overs to spare in Brisbane ahead of the clash in Melbourne.

Sri Lanka's batting had been insipid until now, but they finally posted a competitive score of 142 for six, with Kusal Perera hitting 57.

However their bowlers, led by Lasith Malinga, have been no match for a quality Australian batting line-up, spearheaded by Warner who has now scored 217 in three innings without losing his wicket.

"It was pretty clinical once we got into a routine," said Australia captain Aaron

Finch.

"The way the bowlers set it up for us over the last two games, it was outstanding.

"Every game is a different challenge and a different surface, so it's important to bring in your best, in terms of preparation and mental side of the game too," he added.

"We haven't been up to our standards. We haven't performed at our best and if we don't, we will end up like this," said Sri Lanka opener Niroshan Dickwella. "We learnt a lot in this series, but we couldn't even compete properly."

Rohit walks off after being hit

India's T20I skipper Rohit Sharma was hit on his left thigh while batting in the nets at the Arun Jaitley Stadium in New Delhi yesterday, forcing him to leave the net session ahead of Sunday's first T20I against Bangladesh.

Rohit, who will lead India in the three-match series in Virat Kohli's absence, received the blow while taking throwdowns to simulate batting against Bangladesh's left-arm fast bowlers. After a few throwdowns, one sharp delivery hit Rohit on his left thigh. He immediately left the nets and was not at all happy with the pace at which the ball was hurled at him.

It was learnt that Rohit was taking treatment for the blow and didn't take further part in the net session.

It is understood that Indian batsmen are particularly training how to counter Bangladesh's left-arm paceman Mustafizur Rahman.

U-19s square off against SL

Vince puts England 1-0 up

A maiden half century from James Vince powered England to a convincing seven-wicket victory over New Zealand in the opening Twenty20 international in Christchurch on Friday.

Vince top-scored for the tourists with 59 as England chased down New Zealand's 154-run target in 18.3 overs to take a 1-0 lead in the five-match series.

While Vince's player-of-the-match performance caught the eye, captain Eoin Morgan was also full of praise for his bowlers, who laid the platform for victory by restricting the Black Caps to

153 for five.

"The game was won and lost in the first innings... James Vince played outstanding well but all credit to the bowlers today," he said.

A three-wicket haul from spinner Mitchell Santner was not enough to rescue the Black Caps, whose batting line-up failed to fire after Morgan won the toss and sent them in.

England's win came despite the absence of several senior players, who have been rested for the series after a gruelling period that saw them win the World Cup and fail to reclaim the Ashes.

A trio of debutants in the team facing New Zealand fitted in seamlessly, with Sam Curran and Pat

Brown both snaring a wicket each.

Morgan said his squad was building its depth by blooding youngsters ahead of the T20 World Cup in Australia next year.

"It's a chance for them to stake their claim," said the England captain, who emphatically ended the match with a six off the final ball to finish on 34 not out.
