Prof Belal Ehsan Baaquie tells govt

Bangladesh will have to deal with China intelligently since for the first time in its with the world and the global power Fragmentation". may rise as the world's largest economy, said Belal Ehsan Baaquie, a professor at International Centre for Education in Islamic Finance in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia yesterday.

JSC AND JDC EXAMS

66,000 candidates absent on first day

A total of 66,194 candidates were absent on the first day of Junior School Certificate (JSC) and Junior Dakhil Certificate (JDC) examinations while 38 students were expelled for resorting to unfair means.

Madrasa board stood highest in terms of absentees as 21,232 students did not appear at the Quran Majid and Tajbid exams yesterday.

A total of 44,962 candidates of nine general education boards were absent at the Bangla exam, according to the control room of the education ministry.

Among the general boards, highest 13,192 examinees under Dhaka board were absent while Sylhet board had the lowest number with 2,996 absent candidates.

Of the expelled students, 18 are from Mymensingh board, eight from Barishal, five from Rajshahi, two each from Dhaka, Cumilla and Madrasa boards, and one from

Meanwhile, one invigilator from Mymensingh board was expelled for "assisting" students in using unfair

Education Minister Dr Dipu Moni yesterday said law enforcers are vigilant about those who spread rumours on social media about leaking of question papers.

"There is no question paper leak this year but still rumours are being spread. Strict action will be taken against those who spread rumours," she said. The minister was talking to reporters after visiting PM

Combating Climate Change

Region-based strategy needed, experts say

Environmental activists and economists at a seminar yesterday urged the government to prepare its strategies for combating climate change impacts based on region and geographic condition.

In Bangladesh, geographic pattern is not the same everywhere, while the type and intensity of natural disaster and other climate change impacts also differ region-wise,

Therefore, the government strategy on climate change should vary for regions and all regional strategies should be unified under one national strategy, which is absent now, they added.

Coastal Association for Social Transformation (COAST) Trust and Campaign for Sustainable Rural Livelihoods (CSRL) jointly organised the seminar to review the proposed draft of "National Strategy on Management of Disaster and Climate Induced Internal Displacement (NSMDCIID)".

The event was held at CIRDAP auditorium in the capital. Providing his observations on the draft strategy, Salehin Sarfaraz, a coordinator and advocacy officer of COAST Trust, said the proposed national strategy lacks participation of relevant people -- like climate victims, activists and civil society representatives.

"That's why, it might become a standalone policy document -- as in many other cases when the policy is developed by consultants only," he said in a keynote presentation.

To make the strategy people-friendly, he suggested the authorities concerned to share the draft with the communities who are vulnerable to climate change and

Affirms Menon at inauguration of Workers Party's 10th congress





Amidst a boycott by six dissident central leaders and two politburo members at the party's 10th congress, Workers Party of Bangladesh President Rashed Khan Menon yesterday affirmed that his party will continue its alliance with the ruling Awami League.

"Maintaining an alliance with Awami League is still needed to establish a Bangladesh in line with the spirit of Liberation War," he said.

Menon was speaking at the inauguration ceremony of his party's 10th congress held "with a vow to continue its fight against corruption, inequality and sectarianism' at the Institution of Engineers, Bangladesh

The party president, who has been facing a chorus of criticism on ideologica grounds from some central leaders, said his party had formed its alliance with the pro-Liberation War forces to fight against militancy, fundamentalism and communalism that increased during the BNP-Jamaat period.

Citing existing disparity among people, Menon said there have been many development activities in the country. "But not all have a fair share in that development. Rather, a handful of people made a lot of money and they are smuggling it abroad," he alleged.

Residential Model College student buried

Remarks on social media causing misunderstanding, Kishor Alo editor says STAFF CORRESPONDENT

Dhaka Residential Model College student Naimul Abrar, who was electrocuted to death on Friday, was buried at his village home in Noakhali yesterday.

Meanwhile, fellow students of the ninth grader yesterday demonstrated in front of the college, demanding proper investigation into the death during anniversary celebration of the youth magazine Kishor Alo.

After Abrar's janaza at his village home, his father Mujibur Rahman told the media that he had no complaints

Mujibur Rahman, however, said it would have been better if his son were taken to a nearby hospital. Meanwhile, Editor of Kishor Alo Anisul Hoque expressed

deep shock over the tragic death. "We are shocked and speechless... Kishor Alo strives for safe childhood, for the development of children as enlightened persons. It's a great blow and matter of regret that an adolescent became a victim of a tragic death while attending a Kishor Alo programme," he said.

The editor said some remarks are being posted on social media which are not true and causing misunderstanding. It has been said that Abrar's death news was "concealed" and the programme continued, which are untrue.

The accident happened when the last artist was performing on stage. Immediately, he [Abrar] was taken to the emergency medical camp set up near the venue. Later, he was taken to the intensive care unit of Universal Hospital in Mohakhali in an ambulance.

Kishor Alo authorities came to know about his death after the programme ended. So, the programme did not continue, neither was the news concealed.

Anisul said some commented that Abrar was taken to the hospital as it sponsored the programme but it is not true either. Rather, two of its doctors were working at the emergency medial camp. They immediately decided to take him to Universal Hospital during the crisis.
