# Fiddling with disaster

Hydrogen gas cylinders used for inflating balloons pose risk of explosion

It is hard to find a birthday party without a few floating balloons.

But in order to get the balloons to defy gravity, one needs a gas that's lighter than air, namely hydrogen or helium.

Since hydrogen is the cheaper of the two gases, most vendors in the country use it to inflate balloons.

However, the method in which most of the vendors produce the inflammable gas has proven to be risky on many occasions.

A cylinder used for inflating balloons exploded last week in the capital's Rupnagar killing seven children and injuring 20 others. Six of the injured children are being treated at Dhaka Medical College Hospital.



Besides, a hydrogen balloon can cause mishaps if it catches fire. "There is neither any act

nor any regulation regarding the use of hydrogen in balloons," Samsul Alam, chief inspector of the Department of Explosives, told The Daily Star. Officials and balloon

sellers said that the vendors collect old and discarded

LPG and CNG cylinders and, with some modifications, use them for producing hydrogen.

They modify the cylinders to be able to put aluminium powder, sodium hydroxide and water inside, and then seal it, said Samsul.

#### No case for next 7 days Says Quader about new

No case will be filed under the new Road and Transport Act (RTA) for the next seven days when public awareness programmes on the matter will be conducted, said Road Transport and Bridges Minister Obaidul Quader yesterday.

"Major developments in the road sector have taken place, but there is a lack of discipline.... It may take time but we believe this law will bring discipline on the roads," he said during an awareness programme at Signboard area in Narayanganj district.

The minister said accidents and traffic jams were major concerns and tougher laws were needed to solve those, but awareness was also needed.

"It is not possible to bring discipline by implementing laws only. People have to be aware... We are now campaigning for that," he added.

## IMPEACHMENT PROBE **Trump predicts 'angry majority' in 2020 polls**

A combative US President Donald Trump told supporters in his electoral stronghold of Mississippi on Friday that a push to impeach him is driving an "angry" Republican surge ahead of 2020.

"We've never had greater support than we have right now," Trump claimed in front of thousands of cheering supporters in a packed arena in Tupelo.

The latest average of polls shows only 40.9 percent of Americans approve of Trump, but the fired-up president clearly sees his core base as essential to his political survival -- and reelection next year.

He called impeachment proceedings against him in the Democratic-led House of Representatives "an attack on democracy itself."

"But I tell you the Republicans are really strong," he said, touting the emergence of "an angry majority."

The rally in Tupelo was Trump's first since the House voted overwhelmingly -- but along sharply divided party lines -- to put the impeachment probe on a formal track.

Kuet shut after clash over soccer match Our Correspondent, Khulna

Khulna University of Engineering and Technology (Kuet) was closed for an indefinite period yesterday after students of two dormitories clashed over a football match on Friday, which left six injured.

"The residential students have been asked to vacate the halls," said Kuet Vicechancellor Quazi Sazzaad Hossain, adding, "To avoid any untoward incident, the university authorities made the decision."

Male students were asked to leave their dormitories by 5:00pm yesterday and female students by 10:00am today, he added.

Around 3,500 students reside in seven dormitories, including the female one.

Visiting the Kuet campus around 1:30pm yesterday, this correspondent found students leaving with their belongings. Some of them were going to nearby student messes or their relatives' houses.
