Mobile Tower shortage

Users denied quality service

Only 2 towers set up in last one year despite growing number of users

Over the last one year, 62 lakh new mobile connections became active, 57 lakh new users started using mobile data, and about 2 crore people switched to the much faster 4G connection. But only two new cell towers have been set up in the entire country.

This is subjecting subscribers to call drops, poor internet speeds, busy networks, and signal bars disappearing.

To ensure proper service to their subscribers, they need at least 3,000 cell towers either newly built, upgraded, or replaced altogether, carriers said.

They said they could not do that themselves since Bangladesh Telecommunication Regulatory Commission (BTRC) introduced a new tower licencing system under which third parties are in charge of cell towers and carriers rent towers from them.

The BTRC gave four cell tower companies licences a year ago and they were supposed to start building towers within six months of getting the licences. None of them are doing so now because none of the companies that are new are ready to do so, sources said.

Mobile operators and cell tower companies are supposed to make deals regarding tower usage and rents and the BTRC is supposed to approve those deals. But the BTRC is interfering by making the agreement and imposing it on SEE PAGE 2 COL 3

Fresh Bank Loans

Defaulters must make 15pc down payment

HC rules, says borrowers may apply for rescheduling for the next 90 days

The High Court yesterday ruled that the loan defaulters must make down payment of 15 percent of the outstanding amount to get fresh loans from any scheduled bank in line with the 2012 Bangladesh Bank circular.

Delivering a verdict on a writ petition, the court, however, said the BB circular issued on May 16 this year will be valid for the next 90 days so that the borrowers can apply for rescheduling their bank loans.

The central bank issued the circular allowing borrowers, who became defaulters by December last year, to reschedule loans for 10 years by making a down payment of only 2 percent instead of the existing 10 percent.

The HC gave the verdict after hearing the writ petition filed by Human Rights and Peace for Bangladesh (HRPB) in early February. The rights organisation sought court directives for the formation of a commission to look into the irregularities and corruption in the banking sector in the last two decades.

Talking to The Daily Star, Barrister Munirujjaman, a counsel for the BB, said the HC made the observation as the central bank's May 16 circular was suspended for various reasons.

BNP may take Economy under stress for lack of reforms: CPD

The think tank also questions GDP growth without rise in private sector investment

A lack of good governance and reforms has put the Bangladesh economy under the most severe strain it has faced in the last decade, the Centre for Policy Dialogue said yesterday.

The fault lines in the economy are getting deeper and need to be fixed; otherwise the country's economic growth cannot be sustained in the coming years.

The observations were made at the launch of the think tank's "State of the Bangladesh Economy in fiscal 2019-20" report at Cirdap in the capital. The Centre for Policy Dialogue (CPD) identified four areas -- banking, revenue mobilisation, capital market and balance of payments -- where

the fault lines have been exposed in recent months. A rapidly increasing trend of defaulted loans, a potential risk of large revenue shortfall in the target set by the National Board of Revenue, the ongoing problems in the capital market and crisis stemming from balance SEE PAGE 13 COL 2

During an exam for second semester students in September, the teachers of Rajshahi Polytechnic Institute noticed, to their astonishment, that some of the students were whiling away the hours.

"They were not writing at all," Principal Farid Uddin Ahmed said yesterday, describing how he drew the wrath of Bangladesh Chhatra Legaue activists who would throw

him into a pond about two months later. When the teachers asked the students what was going on, the examinees simply said that their senior BCL leaders assured them of good grades even if they didn't write

anything on the answer script, the principal said. Eventually, at least 133, mostly BCL activists, of 455 examinees got 0, 1 or 2 in the 90-mark exam.

The BCL men then asked the authorities to make sure

the activists pass the exam. "If such students pass the exams, we'll have some useless

graduates," Ahmed told The Daily Star.

After he was assaulted on Saturday, Ahmed filed a case SEE PAGE 11 COL 2
