

Dhaka air unsafe even before winter

Finds study on the city's air quality in last 5 years

Overall air quality status in Dhaka previously showed that winter was the most polluted season. But according to a study, things are changing in recent years.

Air pollution in the city reaches "unhealthy" level even before the winter sets in, exposing its residents to health

Dhaka's air remained unsuitable for breathing for more than half of last year. The air quality remained "very unhealthy" and "extremely unhealthy" for 197 days, according to an analysis of Air Quality Index data, monitored by the Department of Environment under its Clean Air and Sustainable Environment (CASE) project.

The duration of the "unhealthy" air level is increasing day by day, it said.

According to the approved Air Quality Index (AQI) in Bangladesh, an AQI range between 151-200 is categorised as "unhealthy", while the range between 301-500 is classified as "extremely unhealthy"

A study by environment researcher Atik Ahsan found that the capital's air quality category ranged between "unhealthy" and "extremely unhealthy" for 165 days in 2014. The duration increased to 173 days in 2015, 185 days in 2017 and 197 days in 2018.

"Roads in Dhaka remain unclean almost round the year. Repair and maintenance of the roads by different government agencies worsen the situation as there is no proper management of the sites. It is alarming that Dhaka's air quality never improves for a day in January and February," said Atik, a medical anthropologist and a former senior research investigator of the International Centre for Diarrhoeal Disease Research, Bangladesh (icddr,b).

Experts blamed increasing number of construction works, rise in the number of vehicles and worsening traffic congestion for the decreasing air quality of Dhaka. The operation of brick kilns around the capital in the winter in full swing aggravates the situation.

Small fine for 1st time offenders

DMP boss says on new Road Transport Act STAFF CORRESPONDENT

After the week-long public awareness programme on the new Road Transport Act finishes, police will fine small amounts to first-time violators of traffic rules.

Dhaka Metropolitan Police Commissioner Shafiqul Islam made the remarks while attending a press briefing at DMP Media Centre yesterday.

"We will inform them [first-time traffic rules violators] about different sections of the new Road Transport Act. We will tell them that they can be punished with a fine up to Tk 25,000 in future," he

Strict rules and the fear of being penalised with a hefty amount would improve discipline on roads, the DMP chief hoped.

Over hundred students confine JU VC for hours

Demonstrating students kept Jahangirnagar University Vice Chancellor Prof Farzana Islam confined to her residence since yesterday evening, demanding her resignation over

allegations of corruption. Over 100 students took position in front of the VC's residence around 7:00pm and were continuing the

demonstration when this report was filed early today. "We have confined the VC to her residence. We will stay here until she resigns from the post," said Mahathir

Iran yesterday announced its latest violations of the nuclear deal with world powers, saying that it now operates twice as many advanced centrifuges banned by the 2015 accord and is working on a prototype that's 50 times faster than those allowed by the deal.

The announcement came as the country marks the 40th anniversary of the 1979 US Embassy takeover that started a 444-day hostage crisis.

By starting up these advanced centrifuges, Iran further cuts into the one year that experts estimate Tehran would need to have enough material for building a nuclear weapon — if it chose to pursue one.

The comments by Ali Akbar Salehi, the head of the Atomic Energy Organization of Iran, came ahead of an expected announcement by Tehran of the new ways it would break the accord.

Already, Iran has broken through its stockpile and enrichment limitations, trying to pressure Europe to offer it a new deal, more than a year since President Donald Trump unilaterally withdrew America from the accord. Speaking to state TV, Salehi said Tehran is now operating 60 IR-6

advanced centrifuges — twice as many as before. Such a centrifuge, an IR-6, can produce enriched uranium 10 times as fast as the first-generation IR-1s allowed under the accord. The nuclear deal limited Iran to using only 5,060 first-generation IR-1

centrifuges to enrich uranium by rapidly spinning uranium hexafluoride Salehi also announced that scientists were working on a prototype he

called the IR-9, which worked 50-times faster than the IR-1. Meanwhile, demonstrators gathered in front of the former US Embassy

in downtown Tehran yesterday as state television aired footage from other cities across the country making the anniversary. "Thanks to God, today the revolution's seedlings have evolved into a
