KL to reopen labour market

The decision comes at ministerlevel meeting with Dhaka

Dhaka and Kuala Lumpur yesterday agreed to reopen the Malaysian labour market soon, which was suspended by the Mahathir-led government over a year ago on allegations of monopoly by a manpower syndicate.

The two countries will hold a joint working group meeting on November 24 and 25 in Dhaka, and the market is expected to be opened then.

The decisions were made at a meeting between Bangladesh's Expatriates' Welfare Minister Imran Ahmad and Malaysia's Human Resources Minister M Kulasegaran at the Malaysian parliament in Kuala Lumpur.

"Labour recruitment in Malaysia will not be confined to the previous 10 agents this time," an official, who was at the meeting, told The Daily Star by phone.

According to a statement issued by the expatriates' welfare and overseas employment ministry, the two ministers elaborately discussed minimum recruitment costs, increasing the number of recruiting agencies, medical tests of migrants, social and financial protection, and data sharing. The ministers have emphasised the necessity for

improving the process of recruitment, employment and repatriation of Bangladeshi workers. Moreover, they said they were also on the same page to eradicate recruitment malpractices and abuses.

Especially, the two sides agreed on recruitment of workers at minimum costs and on conducting medical tests of workers once before migration," the statement said.

ROAD TRANSPORT ACT Mad rush for updating docs at BRTA office

As the new Road Transport Act imposes tougher penalties on traffic rule violators, a huge number of people are thronging the Mirpur office of Bangladesh Road Transport Authority (BRTA) every day to have the documents of their vehicles renewed and keep those up to date.

Many people are visiting the office to get new driving licences and renew the old ones. Others are going there to get fitness or registration certificates of their vehicles.

BRTA officials said the number of service seekers increased significantly since Sunday, two days after the new law came into force. At some sections of the office, the number has almost doubled than the usual number of visitors in a single day.

This rise in the number of service seekers has put the BRTA officials under pressure. A similar situation was seen during the student movement for safe road in

Climate deal 'irreversible'

Xi, Macron unite after US withdraws from Paris pact

Chinese leader Xi Jinping and French President Emmanuel Macron yesterday declared that the Paris climate pact was "irreversible", showing a united front after Washington formally withdrew from the accord this

The joint declaration came at the end of Macron's second visit to China, which started on Monday in Shanghai and included talks on trade and the Iranian nuclear issue.

The French leader also said he told Xi there was a need for dialogue to resolve months of unrest in Hong Kong -- ignoring Beijing's prior warning that such sensitive topics should not be on the agenda.

But Xi and Macron found common ground on climate change Major powers expressed regret and concern after President Donald Trump went ahead with the pullout from the Paris accord despite mounting evidence of the reality and impact of climate change.

Washington presented its withdrawal letter to the United Nations on Monday, the first possible date under the accord negotiated by Trump's predecessor Barack Obama, making the world's largest economy the sole major outlier from the agreement.

In a joint written statement, Xi and Macron reaffirmed "their firm

support for the Paris accord which they consider as an irreversible process and a compass for strong action on climate". Without directly naming the US, Macron said he "deplores the choices

made by others" as he sat next to Xi following the talks at the imposing Great Hall of the People in the Chinese capital. "But I want to look at them as marginal choices," Macron said.

With the European Union, China and Russia backing the pact, he added, "the isolated choice of one or another is not enough to change the course of the world. It only leads to marginalisation."

In his remarks, Xi took a veiled swipe at the United States, which launched a trade war with China last year and has angered Beijing on various diplomatic issues.

"We advocate for mutual respect and equal treatment, and are opposed to the law of the jungle and acts of intimidation," Xi said.

As their friendship deepened after days of conversation, Fabian told Suma that she wanted to visit Bangladesh and that she wanted to send her some gifts.


A day after, Fabian told Suma that she had already sent a parcel in Suma's name through a courier service and gave her the address of a website with a tracking code.

The self-proclaimed Turkish national told Suma that she had also sent £55,000, along with the other gifts.

After a few days, Suma received a WhatsApp call from an Indian number

Voyager 2 charts interstellar space

A probe launched by Nasa four days after Elvis died has delivered a treasure trove of data from beyond the "solar bubble" that envelops Earth and our neighbouring planets, scientists reported.

But for every mystery Voyager 2 has solved about the solar winds, magnetic fields and cosmic rays that buffet the boundary between interstellar space and the Sun's sphere of influence, a new one has cropped up.

Voyager 2 left Earth's orbit in 1977 a month before its twin Voyager 1, but took seven years longer to reach the heliosphere's outer limit some 18 billion kilometres (more than 11 billion miles)

Shaped something like a windsock in a stiff breeze, the heliosphere is formed by the Sun's magnetic field and solar winds that can reach speeds of three million kilometres per hour.

It can be compared to a cosmic supertanker ploughing through space, said Edward Stone, a professor at the California Institute of Technology and lead author of one of five articles published in Nature Astronomy.
