# Prove it or face music

PM asks campus demonstrators raising allegations against VCs

UNB, Dhaka

Coming down hard on those involved in movements against the vice-chancellors of several universities, including Jahangirnagar University, Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday said the accusers would have to face punishment if they failed to prove the allegations. "If they fail to prove the

allegations, they will be punished for bringing false accusations... we will definitely do this. Because I can't tolerate that classes will remain closed day after day," she said. The PM made the comments while distributing cheques of financial

assistance among some sick, financially insolvent and injured journalists as well as the families of journalists killed in road accidents. The cheques were handed over at a simple ceremony at the Prime Minister's

Office. The money came from Bangladesh Journalist Welfare Trust. Hasina said movements started suddenly against several VCs and the protesters were branding them as corrupt.

Mentioning that the protesters must prove the allegations raised at Jahangirnagar University, she said, "If anyone fails to prove, the accuser will have to face the same punishment [what might have been awarded to the accused as is mentioned in the law.

The PM said she has already directed the authorities concerned to keep the records and footage of speeches and words of everyone who are bringing allegations.

India skipper Rohit Sharma put on an awe-inspiring display of hitting as the hosts cantered to an emphatic eight-wicket win over Bangladesh in the second T20I at the Saurashtra Cricket Association Stadium in Rajkot yesterday. The win levelled the three-match T20I series 1-1, with the decider to be played in Nagpur on Sunday.

In pursuit of a subpar 153 for six from Bangladesh in perfect batting conditions, Sharma -- playing his 100th T20I -- put the bowlers to the sword with a demolition job that ended only in the 13th over when he was caught off leg-spinner Aminul Islam for 85 off 43 balls. By then, six sixes

### Academic activities SINGER severely hampered

Academic activities at some public universities have been thrown into disarray due to unrest over different issues, including allegations of vice-chancellors' involvement in irregularities and corruption.

With no immediate solution in sight, thousands of students of these universities are facing disruptions in their academic life.

Take the case of Jahangirnagar University.

Many students and teachers have been agitating on the campus since September 18, demanding the resignation of VC Prof Farzana Islam over her alleged involvement in corruption and mismanagement of a Tk 1,445-crore campus development project.

Academic activities have been disrupted from the day the agitation began. The authorities on Tuesday shut down the university for an indefinite period and ordered the students to vacate the dormitories. Most of the students have already left the dorms.

Prof Farzana denies her involvement in any graft or
