What remains of the 'jheel' in Motijheel

services -- benefitting hundreds of people who take the route.

If you go to Motijheel and look for the proverbial "jheel" the financial hub of the capital is named after, you will be disappointed.

But after putting in some effort and asking around, you will find a waterbody behind Bangladesh Water Development Board where ferrying service is still in operation.

The waterbody (at present resembling a pond) stretches over an area of about one acre, and has two boat services -benefitting hundreds of people who take the route.

This "pond" is the last remaining vestige of the fabled jheel in the area which supposedly linked Buriganga and Shitalakhya rivers to Sengunbagicha, Arambagh and

Many used to commute to Motijheel using boats, they claimed.

Gopibagh canal was turned into a road in the 1990s and most parts of the jheel were filled up around that time, says Jahangir Alam, a resident of

Buildings and roads were constructed on it (parts of the jheel), said a former Wasa

As tragic as the death of the many waterbodies in the city is, many still use the pond that remains as a shortcut and save 10-15 minutes to go to Motijheel from Kamalapur, Gopibagh, Tikatuli and other adjoining areas. Fare is Tk 2 during peak hours, and Tk 5 after 9pm and in weekends.

Enamul Haque, an official of Bangladesh Water Development Board, who was in a hurry to cross the pond on a Monday morning, said that in the morning even five minutes are crucial to office-goers. Logically, a huge number of them use within a short time.

The route is so popular among office-goers that queues form at both ends of the waterbody during peak hours

every workday, he said. Ripon Ali, a first-year student of Kamalapur Sher-e-Bangla

Railway School and College, said every day he goes to school on foot and takes this shortcut

"It takes only a couple of minutes to cross the waterbody. I can reach my school in 10-15 minutes," said Ripon, a resident of Tikatuli

"It would cost Tk 30-40 if I take a rickshaw to school," said

Kholilur Rahman, a resident of Gopibagh, said there was a huge waterbody named "Matimia'r Jheel" in the area and several thousand boats would come to the gudaraghat (where people embark and disembark) every day from different areas like Demra, Nandipara, Isapur, Trimohoni

and Razarbagh.

at that time, he said. "We had taken relief materials on boats from here to Demra, Madartek and Bashabo during the 1998 flood," he added.

Encroachers started filling up the waterbody in the 1990s,

which sped up in the early 2000s, said locals.

At present, some individuals are claiming ownership of the pond -- putting up signs -- though it is government khas land, they alleged.

Heju Miah, a boatman at the ghat, said there are two boats on the small waterbody. Ferrying service starts very early in the morning and continues till 11pm.

Ekĥlamul Islam, a resident of Gopibagh, said though it is still a vital waterbody in the area, it remains neglected by the authorities concerned.

The water of the pond looks polluted and a big part of it has been occupied, he said.

Authorities should take immediate measures to with Hatijheel -- as it is the last remaining waterbody in the heart of Motijheel, he urged.

A family broken apart

Keraniganj accident leaves father, son dead; injured mother still unaware

Along with his wife and son, on a motorbike, Asadul Haque Ipu (40) was going to see his ailing mother yesterday in Keraniganj. Their journey was brutally cut short. A head-on collision with a truck left Asadul and his son, Sohan (7), dead.

Asadul's wife Reshma Akhter (32) was undergoing treatment at Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH).

"We were going to Keraniganj to see my mother-in-law from Koratitola, as her condition was deteriorating. Our younger son was sitting in the middle of the motorbike," said Reshma, who still was not aware of what had happened to her husband and son

Just after reaching Ruhitpur Bazar in

Keraniganj at 2pm, a menacingly speeding truck hit the motorbike from the front, said Reshma, adding that they all fell off the bike.

They were rushed to the DMCH around 3pm where on-duty doctors declared Asadul and Sohan dead, said Inspector Bacchu Mia, in-charge of DMCH Police

Kohidur Rahman, Reshma's uncle, said Asadul was a machine mechanic at a private company in Dhaka. He and Reshma vere parents of three sons, he said.

"Considering her condition, we still haven't informed her that her husband and son are no more," Kohidur said.

Officer-in-Charge of Keraniganj Police Station Saker Mohammad Jubayer said they seized the truck from the spot but the driver and helper had managed to flee.

Remittance inflow went up by 20pc in 4 months

Expatriate Bangladeshis sent \$6,154.22 million in remittance in the first four months of the current fiscal 2019-20, which is 20.48 percent higher than the amount of corresponding period of the preceding year, according to Bangladesh Bank data.

The country received \$5,108 million in remittance during July-October period in 2018-19 fiscal year.

"The flow of remittance into the country shows an upward trend in the fiscal 2019-20 as the government has taken measures, including two percent cash incentive, to streamline the legal channel for encouraging non-resident Bangladeshis to send money to the country," the central bank's spokesperson M Serajul Islam told the news agency.

He said the recent flow of remittance indicates that it is gradually increasing and this trend is likely to continue in the upcoming months.

According to their data, the country received \$1,597.69 million in July; \$1,444.75 million in August; \$1,472.16 million in September and \$1,639.62 million in

Speaking as chief guest, the minister said BNP leaders M Morshed Khan and Lt Gen (Retd) Mahbubur Rahman have already left the party due to its politics of vandalism.

As a result, the party's strength is diminishing, the minister added. He said BNP should learn to welcome constructive criticism. The party criticises each and every move the government initiates. It should also acknowledge the

government's good works and development activities. Dr Mahmud, also Awami League publicity and publication secretary, said although the world lauds the progress made by Bangladesh, BNP turns a blind eye in

this regard. In his speech, he also highlighted the country's economic growth.

About the education system, the minister said it is time to ensure quality of technical education. Instead of opening new universities, number of technical educational institutes should be increased, he added.

Hasan said for a lack of skilled manpower, foreigners are taking a huge amount of money from Bangladesh to their home countries every year. "That's why it's important to develop skilled manpower," he added.

Deputy Minister for Education and AL Organising Secretary Barrister Mohibul Hasan Chowdhury Nowfel and IDEB General Secretary Md Shamsur Rahman, among others, spoke at the meeting with IDEB President AKMA Hamid in the chair.

Earlier, Dr Mahmud and Nowfel jointly inaugurated a rally on IDEB premises.
