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They sought to strike terror into students

Charges pressed against 25 Buet students in Abrar killing case

The accused in Buet student Abrar Fahad murder case had turned so rowdy that they would torture general students to create terror on the campus.

They wanted the common students to remain scared of them, DMP Additional Commissioner Monirul Islam said as police yesterday pressed charges against 25 Buet students, mostly Chhatra League men, in the case.

He also said the accused tormented the students in the name of ragging and that Abrar killing was the result of their longstanding efforts to create the reign of terror.

Monirul said the accused were used to leading lives of “non-students” and they abused their political identity to evade any actions against them.



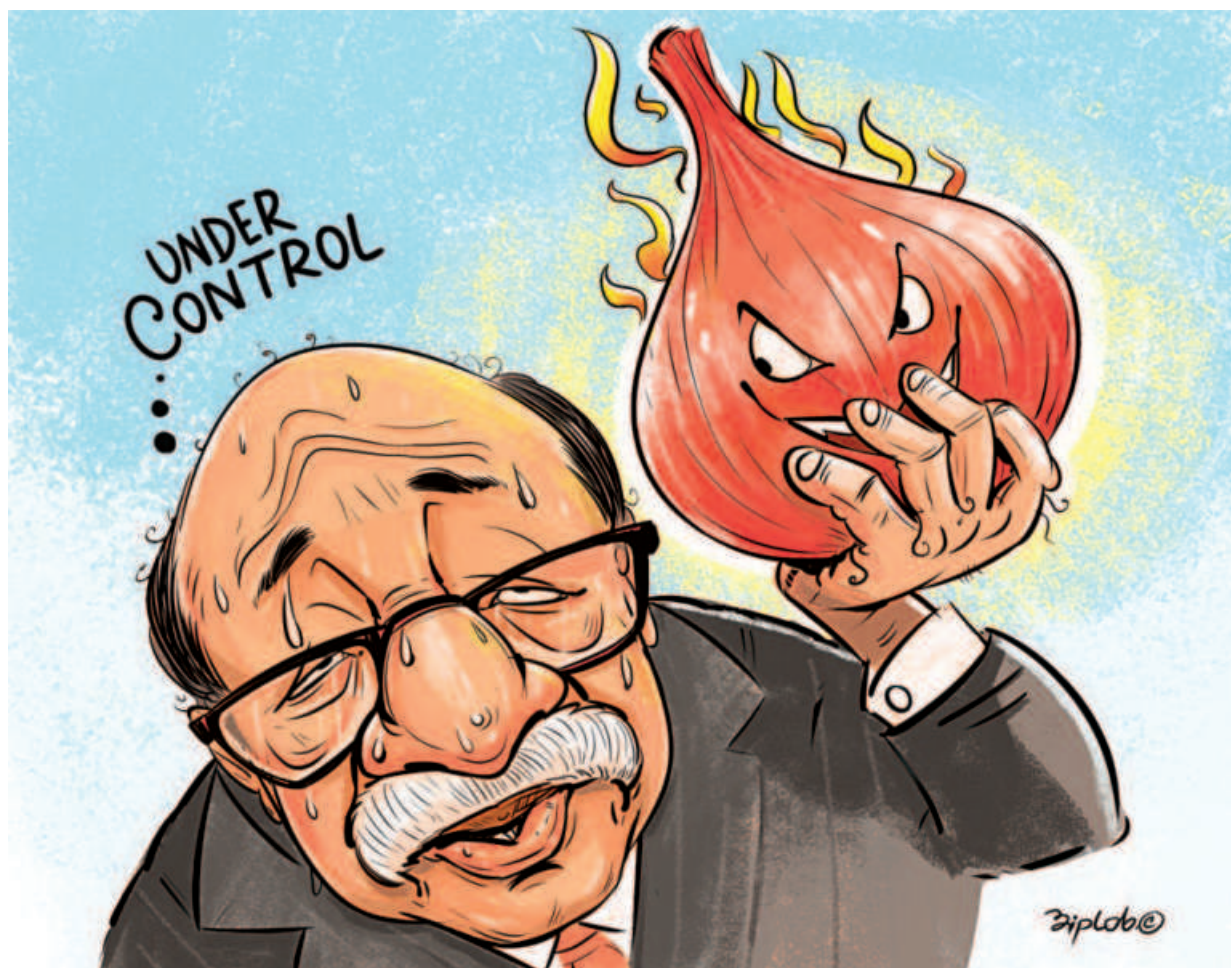
Inspector of Detective Branch of police MD Wahiduzaman, also the investigation officer of the case, submitted the charge sheet to Chief Metropolitan Magistrate Court in Dhaka yesterday, 37 days after Abrar was tortured for hours leading to his death at Buet's Sher-e- Bangla Hall.

Abrar, a 2nd year student of electrical and electric engineering at Bangladesh University of Engineering and Technology, was a resident of the dormitory.

Law enforcers suspect the BCL men attacked Abrar because of one of his recent Facebook posts, which seemed critical of some recent deals with India.

The incident triggered a firestorm of protests on campuses across the country. Many took to social media to demand justice for Abrar.

Nazma Akter groaned in pain as she asked these questions in intervals, with her bandaged legs placed on a pillow in the National Institute of Traumatology and Orthopaedic Rehabilitation (Nitor) in the capital.

Her questions went unheard among the moans and whimpers at the hospital's ward, which filled with patients who suffered major injuries in early Tuesday's rail accident in Brahmanbaria's Kasba.

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RAILWAY DEVELOPMENT

Spending poor on human resources

Despite a concerning manpower shortage in the railway sector, the government has made little effort to address the situation and has instead focused on massive infrastructural development projects.

The government allocated a whopping Tk 54,816 crore since 2014-15 to the Ministry of Railways to implement 36 development and technical projects to improve the rail services, but experts fear that without sufficient manpower the services will not improve.

According to data from Bangladesh Railways (BR), to run the 356 passenger trains, or around 30 trains per day, the railway has allotted some 1,757 loco master (train driver) posts of different categories.

But it has only employed 1,118 people for the purpose, making it understaffed to cover the 2955.53 kilometre network and connect 44 districts of the country.

Contacted, Railways Minister Md Nurul Islam Sujan told The Daily Star that there were some recruitment complications, but the ministry had made solving these a top-priority.

He also said that they were focusing on increasing the capacity of their manpower, which would take some time.

“We provide training to increase the capacity of our manpower. But, it seems the existing training facilities and curriculum are not modern and up-to-date. We have to revise all those,” Nurul said.

Surprisingly, the current curriculum is outdated by decades, which may
