The daughter of folk to serenade DIFF today

Born in the heart of Fakir Lalon Shai's akhrabari (shrine) at Kundubari, Kumarkhali in Kushtia, renowned folk singer Chandana Majumdar received pure taleem (training) of the mystic bard's songs from her father, Nirmal Chandra Majumdar, a fourth-generation disciple of Lalon.

The singer is set to perform today at the Dhaka International Folk Fest 2019. In a recent conversation with *The Daily Star*, Chandana, a teacher at Chhayanaut's Folk Music Department, talked about the essence of Bangladeshi folk music and her plans for the performance at the prestigious platform.

"Folk songs composed by the Bangladeshi bards remind us of the melody of this soil. They attract us spontaneously," says Chandana, "As I cannot forget my mother, I cannot forget my soil, the simplicity of people and my search for the soul."

Folk music represents these things." "When I started realising the philosophical essence of *Shaijee's* (Lalon's) songs, they were deeply embedded in my heart. They constitute the core of our cultural heritage," said the singer, who will also sing the songs of Radharaman Dutta, Rajjab Ali Dewan, Shah Abdul Karim, along with a few Murshidi numbers at the festival.

Chandana has recently toured Canada, talking her magical folk performances thousands of miles away from her homeland. "My joys know no bound when I represent Bangladeshi folk music heritage abroad," said the artiste, who grew up in the realm of melody and rhythm, experiencing *Shadhusanga* (congregation of mystic bards) in her musical family. Bards like Khoda Box Shai, Moksed Ali Shai, Karim Shai, Jhoru Shai and others would regularly come and perform there.

According to her, number of unsung instrumentalists have been keeping our folk melodies alive through *Bangla dhol, dhak, dotara, banshi, ektara, tabla, bayan, khamak and khol*, among others. Many folk songs and instrumental practices are on the verge of extinction. Proper archival of the songs, research on the genre and patronage of folk instrumentalists are the demands of the time. "One person or a single organisation cannot do this alone. Our collective efforts and cooperation are required for this job", concluded Chandana Majumdar.

Singing for peace

A chat with Hina Nasrullah

Hina Nasrullah is a promising Sufi singer from Lahore. She started as a *naat-khwan*, someone who recites hymns in praise of the Prophet. Since childhood, she performed on Pakistani television in programmes such as *Aangan Aangan Taaray, Music Room*, and others. She is an Urdu Literature graduate from Punjab University in Lahore. In her performances, she is usually accompanied by her brother, Hasan Nasrullah, and talented music students from her hometown. Hina captivated the audience with tracks based on the *Kalam* (melodic verses) of sufi poets, Bulleh Shah, Sultan Bahu and Shah Hossain, among others, at the Dhaka International Folk Fest, yesterday. She also performed covers of songs by renowned singer Nusrat Fateh Ali Khan. Ahead of her performance, *The Daily Star* caught up with Hina to find out more about her music.

How does it feel to be in Bangladesh for the Dhaka International Folk Fest?
I came across a video of Shafiqat Amanat Ali Khan's performance at the Dhaka International Folk Fest last year. I have been wanting to come here since then. I think the audience at the fest is absolutely incredible, and I am looking forward to a memorable night.

Who are some of your greatest inspirations in music?
I come from a musical family, and their support has always been an inspiration for me. My brother, Hasan, plays an integral role in my success as an artiste. Other than that, I have grown up listening to Nusrat Fateh Ali Khan, and reading the works of poet and scholar, Allama Iqbal. I am inspired by both of them.

What do you hope to communicate to the audience through your music?
Sufism promotes the message of love, beauty, harmony, tolerance and worship - which are the core values of my music as well. I want my audience to stay happy and healthy, and I hope to bring peace in their lives through my music.

What are your comments on fusions of Sufi music with other genres?
As a Sufi singer myself, I have carried out extensive research on the genre, because making the music accessible to people and presenting it in simple terms is important to me. I believe that fusion artistes and bands are helping Sufi music to reach a much wider audience, which is excellent.

Have you listened to any folk artistes from Bangladesh?
Of course! In fact, I have been listening to the participating Bangladeshi folk artistes ever since the teasers for the Dhaka International Folk Fest came out. Their music is beautiful.

Fazlur Rahman Babu to star in 'Payrar Chithi'

'BotTala Ranga Mela 2019' kicks off today

The eleven-day international theatre festival, *BotTala Ranga Mela 2019*, organised by BotTala—a performance space, begins today. This is the third edition of the festival, which will take place at the premises of Liberation War Museum, Agargaon.

The opening programme will be inaugurated by renowned theatre personality Ataur Rahman, and Secretary of the Ministry of Cultural Affairs, Dr Md Abu Hena Mostafa Kamal, NDC, will be present the chief guest. Playwrights Sadhana Ahmed, Ruma Modak and Shubhashish Sinha will attend the opening ceremony as special guests.

Noted playwright, director and actor Mamunur Rashid will be conferred with the lifetime achievement award on the concluding ceremony of the festival, on November 26. A total of 10 troupes from five countries are

performing in this year's festival, including Bangladesh. The other countries are India, Iran, Nepal and Spain. Two troupes from Bangladesh, including the host troupe BotTala and eight others from abroad will stage their plays every day at 7:30 pm during the festival.

BotTala Ranga Mela 2019 will present the plays, *Crutch-er Colonel* (Bangladesh), *Amar Mukher Anchalkhani* (India), *Dilemmas With My Flamenco Tailcoat* (Spain), *Mysterious Gift* (Iran), *4.48 Psychosis* (Nepal), *Biswa Mangal* (India), *Macbeth* (Bangladesh), *Shluk* (India), *Blackhole* (India), *Acharya Profulla Chandra* (India) and *Khona* (Bangladesh).

The event will also feature screenings of documentaries, discussions, songs, dances and recitations.

Like the previous years, eight theatre activists from eight divisions, who have been working diligently to promote theatre in the country, will be awarded at the festival.
