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Ichhamati now a trickle

The fabled river on course to die a slow death thanks to encroachment, waste-dumping

The Ichhamati, the once vibrant river that features prominently in several Bangla literary works, has turned into a narrow channel filled with garbage, thanks to rampant encroachment and indiscriminate dumping of

At some places in Pabna town, the river looks like a dying canal with the riverbed silting up, while at some other points, garbage chokes the water flow. Originated in the Padma in Pabna's Shibrampur, the

Ichhamati runs an 84km course across the district before meeting the Jamuna in Bera upazila. Today, the river is hardly visible in Banglabazar area, near the point of its origin, because of roads, commercial

and residential buildings, and business establishments. Reckless encroachment even forced the river to change its original course, said Kabir Mahamud, the deputy commissioner of Pabna.

According to the government's Cadastral Survey (CS) records, published in 1922, the 9km section of the river that flows through Pabna municipality had 88.58 acres of riverbed. But the area dropped to only 54.53 acres as shown in the most recent Bangladesh Survey (BS) record map in 2013, said Md Mostak Ahmed, the district settlement officer, who has recently been transferred to Dhaka.

In the CS map of Pabna's Ramchandrapur mouza, the

CYCLONE BULBUL 4,500 trees in Sundarbans damaged

Forest department says wildlife largely unharmed

Cyclone Bulbul damaged 4,589 trees in the Sundarbans, mostly in the western part of the mangrove forest under Khulna and Satkhria districts, according to the Bangladesh Forest Department.

The storm did not leave behind any wildlife casualty, according to the department's assessment report.

Trees on both sides of the rivers Arpangasia and Shibsa were the worst affected, said the report.

The affected trees, which include both naturallygrown mangroves and planted trees such as babla, mahogany and raintree, were worth about Tk 62.85

lakh, said the report. The forest department has decided to not remove any of the damaged trees, SEE PAGE 10 COL 1

Cash crunch stalls ACC modernisation

The Anti-Corruption Commission could not start a project to use modern technology at its offices due to fund shortage in nearly

In 2017, the ACC took a four-year plan to set up a digital archive and digital forensic lab and bring all of its offices under a single The project titled Strengthening Capacity

of Anti-Corruption Commission is aimed at improving the ACC's capacity to combat

It also planned to set up a crime database management software and develop an online database of criminals.

"Initially, the expenditure was estimated to be Tk 1 crore. The government approved the amount. But we later realised that it will take at least Tk 10 crore to implement the project," said an ACC official, requesting

"Having a system will be of no use if

officials don't know how to use it. The officials need to be sent abroad for training," he said, adding that the expenditure of training was also not estimated at first.

The ACC appointed a consultant for the project but very little has been done so far.

The need for a digital forensic lab came to the fore after a phone conversation between suspended ACC director Khandaker Enamul Basir and deputy inspector general Mizanur Rahman got leaked recently.

To verify the audio clip that contained evidence of bribery by the officials, the ACC had to send the file to National Telecommunication Monitoring Centre. Moreover, there is no formal way

of communication among different departments of the ACC across the country. "Introducing e-governance and a digital system is a timely demand," he added.

When a complaint is received, it is sent to an evaluation committee. If the committee members find the allegation credible, they SEE PAGE 10 COL 4

Rohingya Genocide Myanmar

defiant amid legal woes

Myanmar has struck back after a surge of global legal pressure over its alleged crimes against the Rohingya, branding an investigation by the International Criminal Court (ICC) "not in accordance with international law".

On Thursday the ICC approved a full probe into Myanmar's 2017 bloody military crackdown against the minority Muslim

The decision came after rights groups filed a separate lawsuit in Argentina -- in which former democracy icon Aung San Suu Kyi was personally named -- and a further submission of a genocide case at the UN's top court.

Two years ago some 740,000 Rohingya fled over the border into sprawling camps in Bangladesh in violence UN investigators branded as genocide.

Myanmar has repeatedly defended the crackdown as necessary to stamp out militants and has long refused to recognise the authority of the ICC - a position it reiterated Friday.

The investigation over Myanmar by the ICC is not in accordance with international law," said government spokesman Zaw Htay at a press conference Friday.

They beat me up with rods, sticks

Says RU student after BCL men broke his arm

University was confined to a dormitory room and beaten with iron rods and sticks allegedly by two Bangladesh Chhatra League activists yesterday.

The victim -- Shohrab Mia, a third-year student of Department of Finance and Banking -- was admitted to Rajshahi Medical College Hospital (RMCH).

RMCH doctors said Shohrab needed 15 stitches on his head, his left arm broke in two places, and he had injuries in his legs. Shohrab, at the hospital,

told The Daily Star, "Asif Luck of Islamic Studies department and Humayun Kabir Nahid of Bangla department took me to room-254 of our dormitory [Shaheed Shamsuzzoha Hall and started beating

"I cried loudly and requested them not to beat me, but not only did they keep on beating but also threatened me of dire consequences if I had made any sound."

According to witnesses, Shohrab screaming and bleeding, the accused left him and went out of campus. Students then rushed him to a clinic on campus and later moved him to RMCH as his condition was critical.

Police recovered the hanging body of a 5th-year medical student in Faridpur Sadar upazila yesterday, around 48 hours after he had gone missing from his dormitory

The dead -- Nayan Chandra Nath, 25, son of late Dilip Chandra Nath of Daganbhuiyan in Feni, was an examinee of professional medical exam at Faridpur Medical College, said police.

The college authorities filed a general diary with Faridpur Sadar Police Station on Thursday afternoon after he had gone missing, said Sub Inspector (SI) Bilal Hossain of the police station.

His body was found hanging from the ceiling of a saw mill at Posra village in the upazila. Informed by the locals, police recovered the body around 7:00am, SEE PAGE 10 COL 1

Half million for half dollar coin

This coin was worth half a dollar when it was made in 1838. It has now sold for \$504,000 at auction.

The 1838-O Capped Bust Half Dollar was auctioned on Friday in Baltimore by auction house Stack's Bowers Galleries, which described it as "a truly legendary coin ... that will forever be revered, studied and dreamed about."

It isn't just old, it's extremely rare. Only 20 were ever created, and the Smithsonian Institution believes only 11 still exist. Stack's Bowers says it could be as few as nine.

The specific coin auctioned is called the Cox Specimen, which last changed hands in the 1980s, according to the auction house. It features a woman wearing a band that reads "Liberty" on one face, and the national symbol of the bald eagle on the other.
