

Chinese worker killed during brawl in Payra Power Plant dorm

A Chinese worker at Payra Power Plant in Patuakhali allegedly stabbed a fellow worker dead on Saturday night.

The deceased is Feng Lue Jun, 36, of Hunan province in China, said police, adding that they detained his roommate Sang Ziyang in connection with the killing.

Both of them were workers of Bangladesh-China Power Company Limited, police said.

Pinjur Rahman, sub-divisional engineer of the company, told The Daily Star that while having dinner, the Chinese men locked into an altercation over food. At one point, Sang Ziyang stabbed Feng Lue with a knife.

Hearing the victim scream, other workers at the dormitory went to the room and took him to Kalapara Upazila Health Complex where he died at 9:30pm, said Pinjur.

Refayat Hossain, medical officer at the hospital, said he died of excessive bleeding.

Workers in the factory caught Sang Ziyang and handed him over to police, said Md Monirul Islam, officer-in-charge of Kalapara Police Station.

The OC said they sent the body to Patuakhali General Hospital morgue for an autopsy.

Acid thrown on housewife in Faridpur

A woman allegedly had acid thrown on her by a youth in Faridpur's Jagannathdi village under Madhukhali upazila on Saturday evening.

The victim is now under treatment in Dhaka Medical College Hospital.

Police arrested Sujan Kumar Hawladar, 28, after a case over the incident was filed with Madhukhali police station yesterday.

The victim is Saraswati Malo, 23, wife of Chaitano Malo.

Krishna Malo, brother-in-law of Saraswati, said, "Sujan has been harassing Saraswati for two years. We informed Sujan's family about it," he said, adding they had asked the family to take steps to deal with the situation.

"Sujan threw acid on Saraswati, while she was cooking in her house around 6:35pm on Saturday. After that, she was taken to Faridpur Medical College Hospital with burn injuries to her face, neck, head and hands. She was referred to Dhaka Medical College Hospital," Krishna said.

Mahfujur Rahman, assistant superintendent of the hospital, said, "She sustained burn injuries... For this reason, we shifted her to Dhaka. It was a chemical burn, but it is not possible for us to tell it is an acid burn without examination."

Mizanur Rahman, officer-in-charge of the station, said, "After the case was filed, we arrested Sujan from Faridpur on Sunday noon. We shall produce him before a court on Monday."

He said they primarily suspect that it was an acid attack.

Onion prices

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the bulb ahead of schedule to maximize profit, reports our correspondent in Pabna, one of the largest onion producing districts in the country.

"I've grown onions in 12 bighas of land this year. Since the price is high, I've harvested from a portion of the land and sold them to the wholesalers for Tk 5,000 per maund," said Abdul Alim, a farmer of Dhalauria village in Pabna's Santia upazila.

Munna Pramanik, an onion trader at Santia Wholesale market, said, "Each mound of onion was sold at Tk 8,000 to Tk 9,000 last week... The price dropped after the arrival of new onions."

The scenario is similar in Jashore where onions are cultivated on about 1,500 hectares of land.

Mehedi Hasan, a farmer of Jashore's Chowgachha upazila, said they were reaping immature onions since the market price was high.

Emdad Hossain, an official of the District Agriculture Extension Department in Jessor, said they had suggested the farmers not to pick the immature onion as the bulbs were supposed to get matured in early December.

In Rajshahi, onion prices dropped to Tk 150 from Tk 250 a day earlier following a joint operation led by the district administration, reports our correspondent there.

Onion prices began to rise across the country about two months ago when the Indian government imposed a ban on onion export.

But the prices started to rise sharply since last week.

Earlier this month, each kg of locally grown onion was sold at Tk 100-120 in the capital's kitchen markets.

But the price jumped to Tk 160 on Tuesday morning and then kept rising.

The prices rose by Tk 30 to 40 every day since Wednesday.

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get the unregistered vehicles registered or off the roads.

Then there are the "unfit" vehicles. Under the act, there is a six-month jail sentence or a fine of Tk 25,000 or both for driving unfit vehicles on roads.

Every year the BRTA issues around 6 lakh annual fitness clearances to vehicles.

According to a BRTA report, about 4 lakh registered vehicles were on the road without fitness certificates last month.

But the BRTA has only 109 vehicle inspectors against a demand for around 1,000, officials said.

There is only one Vehicle Inspection Centre (VIC) at its office in the capital's Mirpur. The VIC can check some elements of a vehicle digitally while the inspectors check many vehicles manually, which according to experts, can compromise safety.

Besides examining fitness, registering, and issuing licence, the BRTA has many other tasks. But it has only 708 employees against a sanctioned 823 posts.

Officials say even the number of sanctioned posts is too small to deal with ever increasing number of vehicles.

As per the act, no vehicle is allowed to park or load and offload goods or

pick up and drop off passengers at any place not designated for the purposes. Violators would be fined Tk 5,000.

However, only a handful of commercial buildings has parking spaces. For the buses, there are no designated parking space or terminal in the capital. Therefore, many vehicles remain parked on roads, causing congestion.

The new act applies to drivers, pedestrians, and all road users. Failing to obey the law may land the violator in jail for a month. They may also be fined Tk 10,000 or be imprisoned or both.

The traffic signalling system in Dhaka, however, is chaotic.

City authorities have tried different methods to control traffic chaos over the decades.

The manually controlled traffic lights had been turned automatic at the capital's intersections. The system had been upgraded with electronic countdown timers and solar panels.

traffic violations," he said.

He added that no serious punishment will be meted out at the initial stage.

"It is not like the act will be implemented right now as it is," he said.

If any inconsistency is found while enforcing the law, amendments will be made, he said.

BRTA TO LAUNCH DRIVE TODAY

The BRTA would launch mobile courts today, said its chairman Kamrul Ahsan.

The home ministry yesterday issued a gazette incorporating the Road Transport Act-2018 into the schedule of the Mobile Court Act-2009, clearing the way for conducting mobile court operations, Kamrul told The Daily Star.

After the gazette, mobile courts run by district administration will also be able to enforce the Road Transport Act.

The suspects thought if they could kill a large number of foreigners, they would be under local and international spotlight, alongside drawing attention of global terrorist groups, according to the charge sheet.

The eight accused are: Jahangir Alam

alias Rajib Gandhi, alleged recruiter of the café attackers; Rashed alias Rash, one of the alleged planners; Sohel Mahfuz, reported grenade supplier; suspected arms suppliers Mizanur Rahman alias Boro Mizan and Hadisur Rahman Sagar, and Rakibul Islam, so-called religious trainer, and Shahruful Islam Khaled and Mamunur Rashid Ripon.

On November 26 the same year, the tribunal framed charges against the eight.

7 killed as gas blast rips apart Ctg house

Purna Chandra Mutsuddi, deputy assistant director (DAD) at Chattogram Fire Service and Civil Defence Headquarters, said, "During primary inspection, it was found that the blast was caused by a leak in the gas pipeline riser."

"Gas leaked through the riser, and the two-room house got filled with gas at night. In the morning, it exploded when someone lit a fire," the official told The Daily Star.

Arpita Debnath, a ninth grader, and her aunt Sandhya Rani Das, who live in the two-room house, were injured in the blast.

"My aunt woke up in the morning. She might have lit a fire to offer prayers, resulting in the explosion.... Something hit me and I became unconscious."

Arpita's parents were away when the incident took place.

Fire service officials said that on impact, sidewalls of the building's ground floor gave way.

The area is densely populated and has old buildings... According to the masterplan, the road in the area should be 40-feet wide. But we have

were hit by flying debris after the explosion.

Manjur Hossen, owner of a small shop opposite the building, said, "I was inside my shop. I heard a loud bang and suddenly chunks of bricks fell on my shop."

"Labourer Nurul, who was standing in front of my shop, was hit by flying debris."

BREACH OF BUILDING CODE

Officials of Chattogram Development Authority (CDA) and Chattogram City Corporation (CCC) visited the spot.

Shahinul Islam, chairman of CDA's Building Authorisation Committee, said, "The building was built violating the CDA building code... The gas riser was installed inside the house, which is also a violation of the code."

"Even a septic tank was built right under the house where the accident occurred... The owner of the building built the boundary wall, grabbing part of the road."

Fire fighters and explosives experts said the blast occurred due to a leak in gas pipe riser, but Karnaphuli Gas Distribution Company Ltd (KGDC) refuted it.

The four-member committee, formed by the gas company, submitted its report yesterday after probing the incident.

KGDC General Manager (Engineering) Sarwar Hossain, who headed the committee,

found it 20-feet wide as most of the land owners built buildings grabbing parts of the road," he added.

5-MEMBER COMMITTEE

Chattogram district administration formed a five-member probe committee headed by Additional District Magistrate AZM Shariful Hassan.

Elius Hossain, deputy commissioner in Chattogram, told The Daily Star, "The committee has been asked to submit its report in seven working days."

"The families of the deceased were given Tk 20,000 each. The district administration and the Chattogram City Corporation will jointly bear the treatment costs of the injured."

DIFFERENT VERSIONS

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KGDC General Manager (Engineering) Sarwar Hossain, who headed the committee,

said, "We examined the pipe line and the gas riser. We didn't find any leak during inspection.... the gas riser and the pipeline were intact....

"Usually gas explosion causes fire but we did not see any sign of fire in the house."

"We submitted our report mentioning that there was no leak in the gas pipeline," he told The Daily Star.

However, Md Tofazzal Hossain, inspector of the Department of Explosives, told reporters, "We found that the riser and the gas pipeline were very old. Gas leaked from there and turned the entire house into a gas chamber."
