HC orders shutting of 25 factories

The High Court yesterday directed the Department of Environment (DoE) to shut 25 factories and two private hospitals on the bank of the Buriganga River in Dhaka as they are operating without environment clearance certificates.

DoE was given 15 days to execute the order.

At the same time, the court asked the managing director of Dhaka Water Supply and Sewerage Authority (Wasa) to explain in 15 days why legal action should not be taken against him for making a false statement about sewerage lines connected to the river.

The bench of Justice Gobinda Chandra Tagore and Justice Mohammad Ullah issued the order and the show cause notice while hearing a writ petition.

Human Rights and Peace for Bangladesh (HRPB), a rights group, filed the petition on May 4, 2010, seeking immediate steps to prevent water pollution in the Buriganga.

The petitioner's lawyer, Advocate Manzill Murshid, told The Daily Star yesterday that the HC earlier had sought reports from DoE, Bangladesh Inland Water Transport Authority (BIWTA), and Wasa MD about the structures on the river bank, which do not have environment clearance certificates and legal sewerage and Wasa lines.

Following the earlier order, DoE recently submitted a report to the HC, saying there are 27 factories and private SEE PAGE 11 COL 5

Preventing Graft ACC wants close ties with CAG

Anti-Corruption Commission Chairman Iqbal Mahmood yesterday stressed the need for collaboration strong between the ACC and the Comptroller and Auditor General (CAG) office to ensure accountability in public sectors to combat corruption.

The ACC boss said if the existing law did not allow the office of CAG to share information, it could do so using "informal channels".

Iqbal came up with the remarks at the "South Asia accountability roundtable: promoting accountability and integrity in government spending" organised by the World Bank Group at a city hotel.

The ACC boss said, officials CAG conduct post audit and unearth any graft case, they can officially apprise or refer the case to the ACC, whereupon the ACC can take immediate action to investigate and prevent any

Gotabaya Rajapaksa, who spearheaded the brutal crushing of Tamil Tigers a decade ago, stormed to power yesterday but promised to be a president for all Sri Lanka's races and religions after a divisive election.

Seven months after

Islamist extremist attacks that killed 269 people, Rajapaksa was elected on Saturday on the back of a nationalist campaign promising security and to crush religious extremism in the Buddhist-majority

However, Rajapaksa's triumph will alarm Sri Lanka's Tamil and Muslim minorities as well as activists, journalists and possibly some in the international community following the 2005-15 presidency of his older brother Mahinda Rajapaksa.

Gotabaya Rajapaksa, 70, yesterday thanked all voters in an election that heightened ethnic and religious tensions in a country that only a decade ago emerged from a brutal civil war that cost 100,000 lives.

"I am conscious that I am also the president of those who used the vote against me," he said as he was formally

Madrasa student number rising

Bangla-medium student number drops to 8-year low

The number of Primary Education Completion Examination (PECE) candidates is on the decline for last five years while equivalent Ebtedayee Education Completion Examination candidates is on the rise.

According to Directorate of Primary Education (DPE) data, the number of PECE examinees has dropped by 13.47 percent since 2015 while Ebtedayee candidates increased by 14.42 percent in the same period. Asked about the rise and fall of the numbers. Akram-Al-Hossain.

secretary at the Ministry of Primary and Mass Education, said "steep drop in population" was the reason for which the number of PECE candidates was on the decline.

He, however, could not answer how the number of Ebtedayee candidates were on the rise if the population had a steep drop.
