Their bail has been cancelled

following the HC verdict. On July 4, 2007, an anti-graft tribunal sentenced Nasir to 13 years for committing two corruption offences and his son Helal to three years for abetting his father.

The Special Court-2 set up at the MP Hostel in the parliament complex also fined Nasir Tk 50 lakh and said in default, he would have to spend another two years in prison.

Nasir was handed 10 years' rigorous imprisonment for illegally accumulating wealth and three years' simple jail for concealing information of wealth worth Tk 6,72,68,000 in the report he had submitted to the ACC.

Helal was jailed for three years and fined Tk one lakh for trying to withdraw and transfer about Tk 5.64 crore from their family joint accounts to the accounts of his wife and mother-in-law to help his father conceal property information, the ACC lawyer said.

The special court also directed the government to confiscate their wealth worth Tk 27,94,91,000 which is disproportionate to the known sources of income of Nasir and his

On March 6, 2007, ACC Deputy Director Sharmin Ferdous filed a graft case against Nasir with Gulshan Police Station for amassing properties

According to the charge sheet, Nasir, his wife late Dalia Naznin Nasir, their daughter and son have wealth worth Tk 29.22 crore. But they showed properties worth about Tk 22.50 crore in the wealth statement, hiding information of properties worth Tk 6.72 crore.

US Secretary of State Mike Pompeo reminded Sri Lanka about the need to ensure accountability for alleged war crimes during the conflict.

"We call on President Rajapaksa to uphold Sri Lanka's commitments to security sector reform, accountability, respect for human rights and nonrecurrence of violence," Pompeo said in a statement released late Monday.

The previous Rajapaksa government resisted international calls to investigate allegations of war crimes when troops stormed Tamil rebel bastions.

During the election campaign, Rajapaksa reiterated his position that he will not allow an international probe into charges Sri Lankan troops killed at least 40,000 Tamil civilians in the closing stages of the 37-year separatist war.

Following a technical committee meeting yesterday, BCB chief selector Minhajul Abedin informed that they have taken the decision considering the serious nature of the offence.

Shahadat was arrested in 2015 for assaulting his domestic help. The cricketer was then handed a lifetime suspension byt the BCB, but the board lifted the ban the following year after Shahadat displayed contrition and apologised.

This time too the cricketer said that he has realised his mistakes and will appeal for a reduction of the punishment over the next few days.

"I have made a mistake and I realise

investment dialogue. Speaking at a press conference at his secretariat office in the capital, Munshi said the commerce ministry had booked a number of cargo flights of different airlines to import 50,000 tonnes of onion. The move is aimed at stabilising the skyrocketing prices of the bulb.

The flights would arrive until November 25 and nearly 500 trucks of the state-owned Trading Corporation of Bangladesh (TCB) would sell the onions across the country, he said.

He did not specifically say how many onions would arrive in the first consignment.

Munshi, however, said bulk import of onion was not necessary as the prices had already started declining due to the arrival of newly-harvested onions in local markets.

He said onions were sold between Tk 110 and Tk 120 per kg at wholesale markets in different districts, including Dhaka, after the newly-harvested ones arrived.

Similarly, onion prices declined in the retail markets. Per kg of the bulb was selling between Tk 130 and Tk 170. A few days ago, it was between

The minister is hopeful that the prices would fall further after the start of the sale of the imported onions.

Asked, Munshi blamed the Indian ban on onion export, a shortfall in supply, and a section of unscrupulous traders' tendency to earn extra profit, for the "sudden and abnormal" price

"In mid-September, we thought the Indian ban was temporary and that's why we delayed importing onions. We faced the shortage as India had prolonged the ban," he said.

Onion prices also soared in India and Myanmar. As a result, Bangladesh is importing onions from Egypt and Turkey, he said. Usually, Bangladesh imports eight
