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ILLEGAL WEALTH ACC to go after more

Hints the graft watchdog boss

Amid the ongoing crackdown on those involved in graft, Anti-Corruption Commission (ACC) Chairman Iqbal Mahmood yesterday hinted at taking action against more people who earned money through illegal means.

"We've already made a list of 159 who have amassed wealth illegally ... the list is getting longer as the commission is receiving complaints every day," he told reporters at his office in the ACC's headquarters in the capital's Segunbagicha.

The commission will not show any mercy to any corrupt in line with its "zero tolerance policy" against corruption, he said.

The ACC has already sent a list of 105 people to the Bangladesh Financial Intelligence Unit (BFIU) and requested their banking information, he added.

On September 30, the anti-graft body began inquiries into illegal wealth amassed by many following drives by Rab against those involved in illegal gambling businesses and extortion.

Negligence of 3 led to B'baria train accident

Says railways minister citing probe reports

Negligence of the driver, his assistant and the guard of Turna Nishita Express was responsible for the train accident in Brahmanbaria, Railways Minister Nurul Islam Sujan said yesterday.

"The accident occurred as the train driver, his assistant and guard of Turna Nishita Express did not operate the train following the signals properly," he said at a press briefing at the capital's Rail Bhaban.

The briefing was organised to inform the media about the findings of the probe committees, formed after the November 12 accident that left 17 passengers dead and many others injured.

For the railway ministry, briefing the media on probe findings is a rare incident. The minister said the three staffers

have been suspended and further punitive actions would be taken after completing the necessary administrative process. The highest departmental punishment

for such a "major offence" is termination from job.

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Jacking up rice prices won't be tolerated

Warns food minister saying rice stock sufficient; government starts procurement of Aman paddy

The government yesterday sounded a note of warning against unscrupulous traders and said rice price manipulation would not be tolerated as the country had no shortage of the staple. "It will not be acceptable at any cost if

anyone tries to manipulate rice prices ... there is no reason to hike the price illegally," Food Minister Sadhan Chandra Majumder told reporters after a meeting

with rice mill owners and traders at the Secretariat. Meanwhile, the food office yesterday started procuring Aman paddy from farmers in some areas where the harvest began.

The government has decided to procure 6 lakh tonnes of paddy this Aman season, the highest for the season in the last 24 years, according to

ministry data. The minister said the paddy price did not increase, so there was no logic in increasing prices of rice, reports BSS. "Farmers would rather have benefited had the paddy price been higher,

but unfortunately it did not happen," he said. He also said a control room had already been opened under the food ministry and vigilance teams were monitoring the rice market at the field level.

Asked, Majumder said the ongoing nation-wide transport strike would not impact rice prices for the next 8-10 days as each market across the country has sufficient rice stock.

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Fire destroys shops in city market

A fire burnt down over a dozen shops in New Rajdhahi Supermarket in the capital's Tikatuli yesterday.

The fire began at a mattress store on the first floor of the two-storey market around 5:15pm, officials said.

Twenty-five fire engines were deployed to douse the fire.

Director General of the Fire Service and Civil Defence Brig Gen Sajjad Hossain said 14-15 shops were burnt down and 2-3 other shops were partially damaged. The fire was extinguished around 6:45pm.

However, several shopowners and witnesses claimed that around 50-60 shops on the first floor had been gutted.

A committee will be formed to find the cause of the fire and how much damage had been done, the

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Onion flown in from Karachi

Biman waives cargo handling charges for onion import

Biman Bangladesh Airlines yesterday waived its cargo handling charges for onion imports, hours before the first consignment of Pakistani onions landed at Dhaka airport.

Eighty-two tonnes of onion were flown in from Karachi by an Azerbaijani air freighter at 7:15pm, Group Captain Mehboob Khan, director at Hazrat Shahjalal International Airport, told The Daily Star.

Another consignment of the essential cooking ingredient from Egypt was expected to arrive at the airport around 1:00am today.

These onions will be sold in the open market through the Trading Corporation of Bangladesh (TCB). Meanwhile, the civil aviation and tourism ministry at a

meeting decided to waive the cargo handling charges for any airlines that will import onion. Chaired by Secretary M Mohibul Haque, the meeting

was held at the ministry. Talking to The Daily Star, Biman Managing Director Mokabbir Hossain said, "We made the decision [to waive

the charges] in public interest." Biman charges Tk 18 per kg for any perishable goods, imported by any airlines, for its cargo handling services,

he mentioned. The waiver of charges for onion imports will help keep its prices stable, said a press release of the civil aviation ministry. The ministry will provide all sorts of support to onion

importers in this regard, it added.

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Major polluters far off climate targets

Says UN; new analysis shows climate impacts to cost world \$7.9 trillion by 2050

The world's major fossil fuel producers are set to bust global environmental goals with excessive coal, oil and gas extraction in the next decade, the United Nations and research groups said yesterday.

The 10 nations in focus, including superpowers China and the United States, plan to produce fuels by 2030 at levels between 50-120% over Paris Agreement targets, the study showed.

Under that 2015 global pact, nations committed to a long-term goal of limiting the average temperature increase to within 1.5-2 degrees Celsius above pre-industrial levels. But by 2030, the 10 countries' planned production

would lead to 39 gigatonnes (Gt) of carbon dioxide emissions, 53% higher than what is needed to reduce temperature rises to 2C and 21 Gt, or 120%, more than is needed for 1.5C, the report said.

Australia, Indonesia, Canada, Germany, Norway and Britain. "The world's energy supply remains dominated by coal,

oil and gas, driving emission levels that are inconsistent with climate goals," said United Nations Environment
