Fire at New Rajdhahi Supermarket

Traders see bleak days ahead

Traders at New Rajdhahi Supermarket in the capital's Tikatuli area, whose shops were gutted in Wednesday's fire, are facing tough times as they will not be able to resume business anytime soon.

"The blaze caused significant damage... the wirings, walls and furniture -- all the goods were burnt to ashes," Hafizur Rahman, a traders' leader, told this newspaper yesterday. At least 35 shops out of 75 on the first floor were

completely gutted and some 15 to 16 were partially damaged, he informed. He said it will take at least a month to fix those. The fire began at a mattress store on the first floor of the two-storey market around 5:15pm. Twenty-five fire engines

were deployed to douse the fire, extinguished around 6:45pm, said Director General of the Fire Service and Civil Defence Brig Gen Sajjad Hossain. After the Rajdhani Supermarket was established in

1995, this new one was set up on a land next to the old market. It houses around 170 stores, most of which sell furniture, clothes, jewellery, electronic products, crockeries and mobile accessories, among others, said Hafizur.

Visiting the area yesterday, it was seen that police have cordoned off the market; only the affected traders were allowed to get in. Many of them were seen lamenting while some tried to salvage whatever they could find amid charred remains.

Allowing Kidney Donors Beyond Relatives

HC verdict on petition Dec 5

The High Court on December 5 will deliver its verdict on a writ petition filed seeking its directives so that voluntary donors beyond certain relatives can donate kidneys. The HC bench of Justice Moyeenul

Islam Chowdhury and Justice Khandaker Diliruzzaman set the date after concluding the final hearing on the petition yesterday. One Fatema Zohra filed the petition

with the HC in 2017, challenging the constitutionality of sections 2 (ga), 3 and 6 of the Organ Transplantation Act 1999 [amended in 2018]. These sections mainly focused on the definition of the related persons. Fatema donated a kidney to her ailing

daughter Fahmida, but, the kidney got damaged after a year. Then she managed a donor for her daughter, but the donor could not donate the kidney due to the bar in the law.

Later, Fatema submitted the petition to the HC, seeking necessary order on the

asking the government to explain why the abovementioned sections of the act should not be declared unconstitutional.

Barrister Rashna Imam argued for the petitioner while Deputy Attorney General Saifuddin Khaled represented the state and Advocate ZI Khan Panna appeared for Ain O Salish Kendra (ASK) as an intervener in On November 7 this year, an expert

committee submitted a report to the HC as per its August 28 order, saying that there is no need to allow voluntary donors beyond certain relatives as it may give rise to several problems, including organ trafficking.

It said the inclusion of a provision allowing voluntary kidney donors may give the rich an opportunity to exploit the poor by offering them benefits or subjecting them to physical and mental torture. The seven-member committee headed by

Md Rafiqul Islam, president of Bangladesh Renal Association and pro-vice chancellor of Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujib Medical University, handed over the report to the Supreme Court registrar general's office on October 29 for placing it to the HC as per its earlier order.

Gonoshasthaya Kendra founder Dr Zafrullah Chowdhury, who voluntarily On August 24, 2017, the HC issued a rule attended the hearing, told the HC on November 7 that the law needs to be amended so that any healthy person other than the relatives can donate organs.

He also said there must be a provision in the law so that the poor are not victimised and the donors are compensated appropriately.

If not controlled and managed effectively, the burden of population might jeopardise the country's overall progress, they said.

The Daily Star and Options Consultancy Services Ltd jointly organised the roundtable on "Realising Population Goals: Translating Strategies to Actions" at The Daily Star Centre. Controlling population is a big issue for

Bangladesh because its landmass is limited, said Hossain Zillur Rahman, chairman of Power and Participation Research Centre. He said the country has brought down the

total fertility rate (TFR) to 2.3 from 6.3 since independence. However, at the current rate, the population growth will hit 200 million by 2031. The government has to speed up

We want discipline, not to impose fines'

DMP Commissioner on Road Transport Act

Police has no intentions of realising fines if there is discipline on the roads, Dhaka Metropolitan Police commissioner Shafiqul Islam said yesterday. "Traffic division realises Tk 6 to 7 crore monthly for violation of traffic rules (in Dhaka). It is a minimal amount and the government has no need of such amount of money," he said.

The commissioner was speaking at the inaugural of fortnightly traffic awareness programmes at Rajarbagh Police Lines in the capital.

"After taking charge, I told traffic officials that there is no need to set a monthly] target of realising fines," the police chief said.

Highlighting suffering of victims of road accidents, the commissioner said, "Can you imagine a man dies on the road due to your or our fault, and leaves his little children in a life of uncertainty? There will be no breadwinner who can support the family."

Two lawyers to be added as per family's wish, says law minister

Law Minister Anisul Huq yesterday said two lawyers will be included in the prosecution team for conducting the Buet student Abrar Fahad murder case, as per his family's wish.

"The trial of Abrar Fahad murder will be held at the Speedy Trial Tribunal for finishing its proceedings at the earliest. I have earlier said the government will take necessary steps so that the trial of this case is held at the tribunal and we are going ahead as per the plan," he said.

The law minister said this while talking to reporters after a meeting at his Gulshan office with Abrar's father Md Barkatullah.

He said Abrar's family had proposed names of some lawyers for the prosecution team for conducting the murder case, and among them, two lawyers will be included in the prosecution.

"They are satisfied with the current pace at which the case proceedings are running. All necessary steps will be taken so that the trial proceedings of the case are finished lawfully and without any error," Anisul Huq said.

Earlier on November 13, Minister Anisul told reporters at his secretariat office that his office has kept a prosecution team ready for moving the murder case quickly.

Abrar Fahad, a second-year student of electrical and electronic engineering department of Buet, died after he was brutally beaten allegedly by some Chhatra League men at Sher-e-Bangla hall of the university on early hours of October 7.

Speakers demand its inclusion in medical, nursing curricula

With an increased need for special care for thousands of terminal patients, the government should integrate a palliative care (PC) course into the medical and nursing education curriculum, speakers at a discussion said on Wednesday night.

Highlighting the grim scenario of palliative care in the country and legal restrictions to get strong painkillers like morphine for patients, they

also urged the government to ease the restrictions.

Ayat Education, a charitable organisation, arranged the conversation titled "Dignifying Life Thru Palliative Care" at a city hotel. Palliative care is interdisciplinary specialised medical and nursing care

for people with prolonged illness for non-communicable diseases like

cancer, which focuses on providing relief from the symptoms, including pain, and physical and mental stress. Evidence supports the efficacy of palliative care approach in

improvement of a patient's quality of life. At the 67th World Health Assembly in 2014, member states of World Health Organization (WHO) agreed to strengthen palliative care as a

However, this patient-focused approach is still under-addressed globally, especially in low-and middle-income countries, according to a number of studies.
