Everyone deserves to have 'liveable' housing

Prof Nazrul says at Gyantapas lecture

While undertaking plans and policies regarding urbanisation, the government should look at poor, low and lower-middle income groups so that they are having "liveable" housing, urban expert Prof Nazrul Islam said yesterday.

About one lakh people live in a 90 acres of land in Dhaka's Karail slum. There, a single family of five to eight members live in one room, he said, while delivering a lecture at Dhaka University's Professor Muzaffar Ahmed Chowdhury Auditorium.

"We don't want this. We want at least a two-room house," he added. His solo lecture, on the topic

"Urbanization in Bangladesh: Past, Present & Future" was part of Gyantapas Abdur Razzaq Distinguished Lecture series, organised by the Gyantapas Abdur Razzaq Foundation.

In his over one-hour lecture, Prof Nazrul, former chairman of the University Grants Commission of Bangladesh, said poor, low income and lower-middle income groups constitute 70 percent or more of the urban population.

They are more concerned about liveable housing, he said.

Referring to the United Nations definition, he said a liveable house will consist of minimum two rooms, and it will SEE PAGE 4 COL 2

'Unite against dishonesty'

Says President Hamid at Brac University convocation

President Abdul Hamid yesterday urged all to forge a greater unity against all types of syndicates of dishonest persons and organisations.

"Transport owners and workers have unity. Dishonest traders, profiteers and hoarders are united too, but we [general people] lack such harmony," he said, reports BSS.

The president said this while addressing the 13th convocation of Brac University at Army Stadium.

Referring to the recent spate of price spiral of essentials including onion, salt and rice, he condemned the situation that caused sufferings to people. "We have to face the situation together to stand against it," said the president.

If the price is not within one's limit then he or she has to avoid using onion,

businessmen will be forced to sell it at a lower price," said Hamid, reports UNB.

The head of state also called upon countrymen to remain alert against rumors over stocks of essentials. "The media needs to campaign properly against it," he said. He urged all to not pay heed to

propaganda in this regard. Turing to the education sector, President Hamid said education without quality is meaningless.

"One of the biggest challenges for Bangladesh is to ensure quality education. It must be ensured so that higher education does not become just certificate-based," he stressed.

At the same time, the president said, it is also necessary to ensure the quality of educational institutions and their

Seven special tribunals for trial of human traffickingrelated cases will be formed soon, said Chief Justice Syed Mahmud Hossain yesterday.

After formation of the tribunals, to be set up in seven divisions of the country, proper steps would be taken for speedy disposal of those cases, especially the child trafficking ones, he said.

The CJ was addressing an annual cross-border conference titled "Collaboration and Networking Meeting to Combat Trafficking of Children in Bangladesh" at the capital's Cirdap auditorium, says a press release.

At present, 4,784 human trafficking cases across the country are under trial, he said.

Attending the event as chief guest, the chief justice appreciated and wished success of those involved in preventing child trafficking.

Event marking 30 years of UN convention on child rights held in capital

With more and more open spaces being grabbed, children are living in the confines of their homes spending more time with electronic gadgets and in front of TVs, which is seriously impeding their physical and mental development.

Therefore, the authorities concerned should not only preserve or reclaim the remaining open spaces across the country, but also create more playgrounds for children to play and breathe in, said speakers at a programme yesterday.

They also stressed on taking children's opinion while taking any decision regarding them.

Unicef Bangladesh organised the event at a city hotel, marking 30 years of UN Convention on the Rights of the Child -- a human rights treaty

focusing on civil, political, economic, social, health and cultural rights of children. The programme was aimed at engaging children with policymakers

in a dialogue. School and college students from country's eight divisions participated in it and addressed the issues they face. At the event, speakers also highlighted the rights of children with

disabilities and underprivileged children. Noted economist Dr Hossain Zillur Rahman said children need open

space. But such spaces are occupied by grabbers. He called upon policymakers to expand school feeding programmes across the country to ensure children's nutrition,

Lawmaker Shamsul Haque Tuku, president of the Parliamentary Caucus on Child Rights, said, "Sports has numerous positive impacts on education and health, and it contributes towards building a healthy nation."

"Our prime minister also prioritises such activities. That's why she has said all government schools will have playgrounds," he added.

Deputy Speaker of the Jatiya Sangsad Fazle Rabbi Miah said parents should listen to children and help them take decision.

"Today's children are tomorrow's future; we should listen to them," said

83pc women face abuse from public transport staff: study

Road safety group recommends formation of genderresponsible guideline for the sector

Stating that 83 percent women face abuse from public transport staff on the streets, Road Safety Foundation yesterday called for formulating a gender-responsible guideline for the transport

The non-government organisation working for road safety also recommended providing training to drivers and helpers of public transport on gender and road safety issues.

The foundation organised the roundtable titled "Safety of Women in Public Transport" at Bangladesh Press Institute auditorium in the capital, attended by road safety experts and rights activists, among others. In his keynote speech, Saidur Rahman, executive

director of the foundation, citing a research, said 83 percent women received abusive comments from public transport staff on roads. "But such physical and mental harassment

on women are often ignored, and women fail to understand from where and how they can get respite," he said.

In absence of specific law to stop sexual harassment in public transports, victims allegedly do not get remedy even from police, rather they have to face unpleasant questions, he said.

In February, the foundation carried out a survey on 1,100 women who use public transport in Dhaka and came up with the numbers, Saidur said.

Jobeda Khatun, assistant professor of Dhaka University's Clinical Psychology department, said many women become depressed due to abuse they

face while using public transport.

"Journey on public transport is a traumatic experience for many women," she said. She recommended providing training and

necessary mental counselling to transport workers

as many of them are in poor mental health. Kamran Ul Baset, the head of Road Safety and Driving School at Brac, said the transport sector is highly male-dominated and more women have to

be inducted to the sector to change the scenario. He said institutional training and more research are required for transport workers, and not only government but also other stakeholders of the

sector should come forward in this regard. He also observed that the government should take initiatives right now to make the metro rail

woman-friendly. Supreme Court lawyer Jyotirmoy Barua, also the foundation's vice chairman, said although different problems of the transport sector are being discussed widely, problems faced by women in the

He also said transport workers need to be brought to mainstream of the society and need to be given proper respect and facilities, instead of only blaming them.

sector are rarely discussed.

Jana Goswami, advocacy director of the Bangladesh Mahila Parishad, said transport system of Dhaka is not women-friendly, and even the routes and timing of women-only buses are not woman-friendly.

The foundation also recommended installing CCTV and vehicle tracking systems in all public

BNP slams PM for not raising Teesta issue with Mamata



"The prime minister met West Bengal Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee as she went to India. The country's people had expectations that she would return home after resolving the Teesta watersharing problem. But the meeting was limited to only exchanging saris," said **BNP Senior Joint Secretary** General Ruhul Kabir Rizvi.

Speaking at a press conference at the party's Nayapaltan central office, he further said, "Nothing was found [from the meeting] let alone the fair share of water from the Teesta River."
