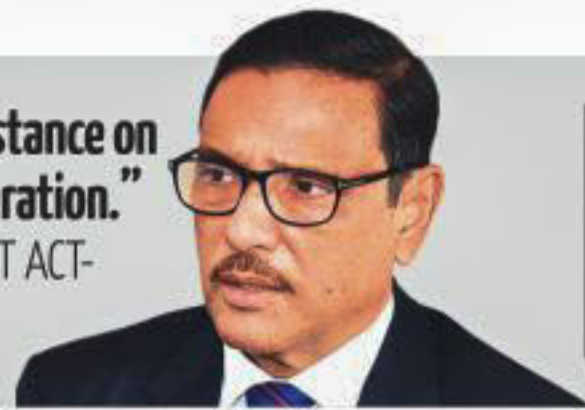

# ACC finds scam in recruitment

*Exams, rules manipulated to appoint 28 pilots; ACC files case against three high-ups, another ex-official of the national carrier*

Twenty-eight out of 32 pilot cadets had failed the tests but Biman recruited them anyway.

Biman officials gave them "grace marks" and then manipulated viva exams to give them the jobs, according to a first information report the Anti-Corruption Commission filed against four incumbent and former Biman officials.

Even before the tests, the then Biman authorities relaxed the minimum educational qualification and age limits to allow less qualified candidates to apply, it said, adding that one of the recruits is the nephew of Biman's former managing director Abul Munim Mosaddique Ahmed who was forced to quit.

SM Helal, former president of Bangladesh Airlines Pilots Association (BAPA), said, "In aviation, ensuring quality of prospective candidates is a must ... the then administration compromised the quality which is tantamount to compromising passenger safety."

"Due to compromise in quality, an aircraft and its passengers might be put at risk," Helal added.

Some of the recruits have already completed training and some were being trained, a top Biman official said.

Yesterday, ACC Assistant Director Saiful Islam filed the case with the ACC integrated district office against Mosaddique, former acting managing director Capt Farhat Hasan Jamil, incumbent principal of Bangladesh Airlines Training Centre Partha Kumar Pandit, and Manager (recruitment) Fakhru Hossain Chowdhury.

The Daily Star obtained a copy of the FIR.

Saiful, who is also the enquiry officer of the case, found that the written and multiple-choice question (MCQ) tests, each of 100 marks, had 10 and 20 "grace marks". A candidate needed 60 and 50 to pass.

Of the 103 that sat for the exams on December 22, last year, 72 "passed" and Biman recruited 32 of them through viva exams.

## EC SECRETARIAT

### Commissioner, secretary launch tirades against each other

Election Commissioner Mahbub Talukder locked horns with commission Secretary Md Alamgir yesterday over running the EC secretariat and alleged irregularities in the appointment of employees.

Speaking at a press briefing, Mahbub alleged that a kind of "arbitrariness" was going on in running the secretariat which is not supported by the constitution, Representation of the People Order-1972, Election Commission Secretariat Act-2009 and the related rules.

He said the secretariat did not inform the four commissioners about the recent employee recruitment tests and the expenditures for those.

The commissioner said he wrote to the secretariat asking it why any action was not taken against 135 jobseekers who were

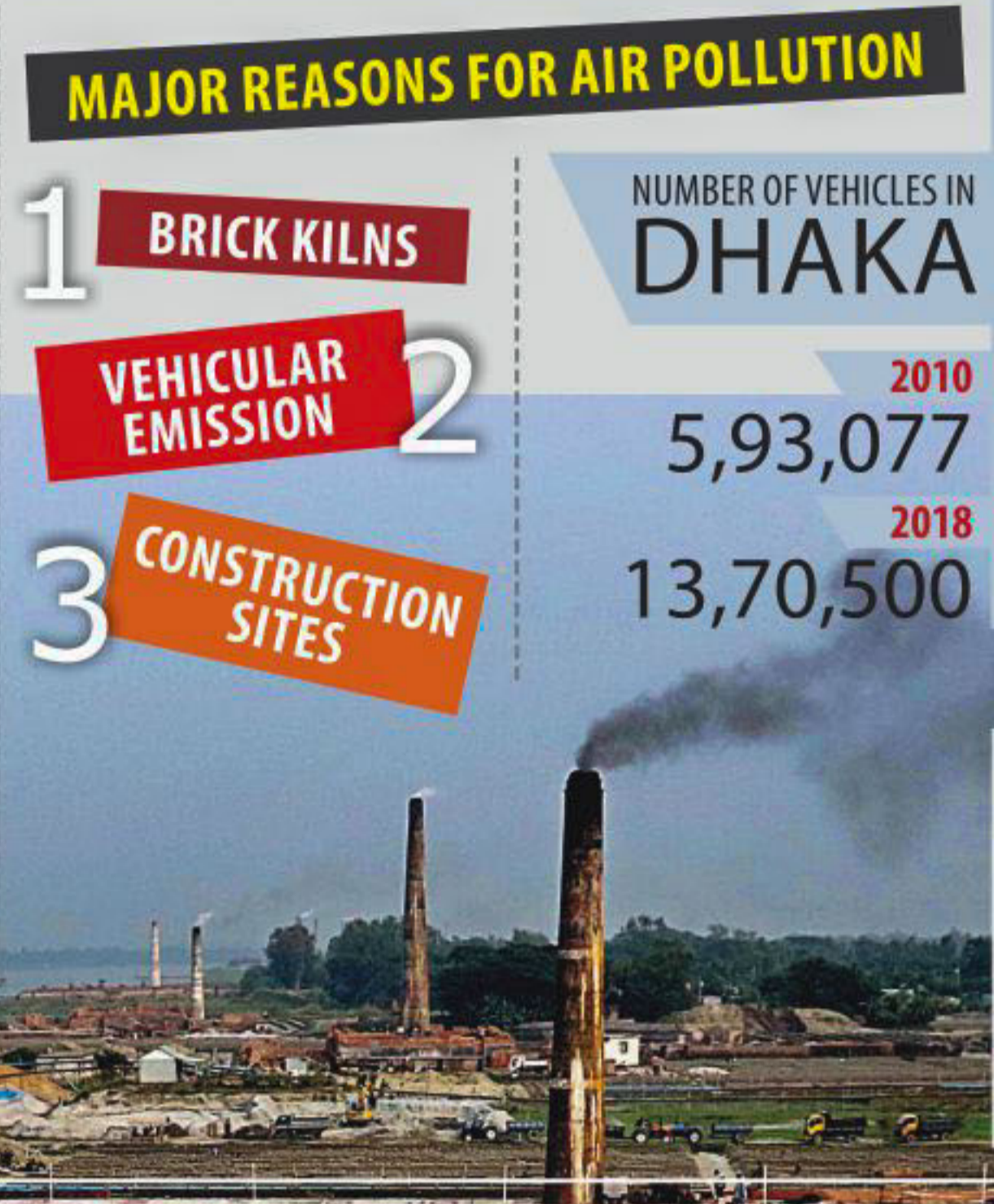

## It's an issue of discomfort

Says Quader about trespass by people from India

Trespassing of people into Bangladesh from India might be an issue of discomfort for Bangladesh, said Awami League General Secretary Obaidul Quader yesterday amid concerns over India's National Register of Citizenship (NRC).

"It may be a reason for a little bit discomfort for the time being ... we will solve the problem through discussion as we did in the past," Quader, also road transport and bridges minister, told a press briefing at his secretariat office.

He said there was no tension between India and Bangladesh over the issue as Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi and

# Tracking new terror network

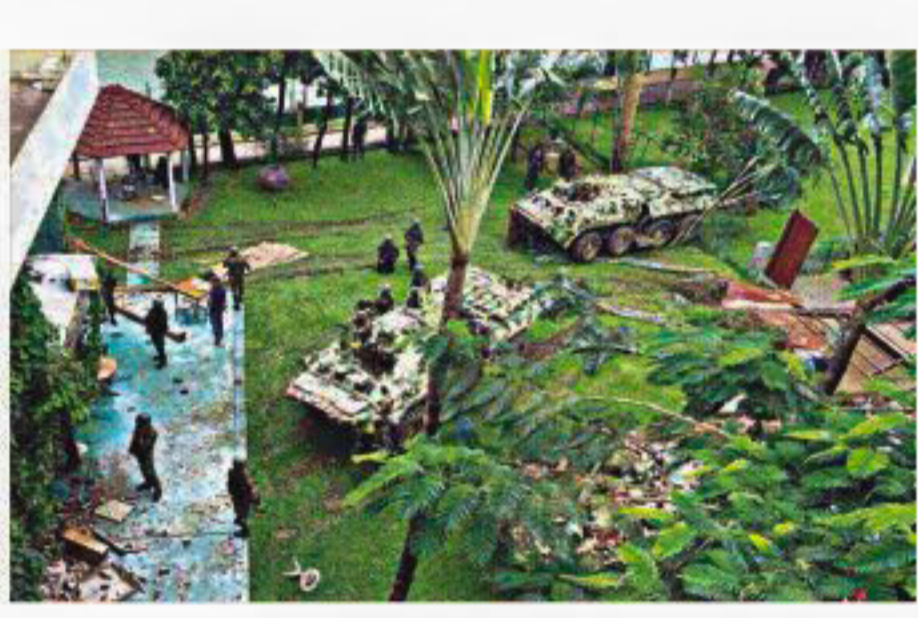

The Gulshan café attack investigation helped law enforcers get crucial leads on a new web of radicals and subsequently launch a series of successful operations ripping apart the network of militancy in Bangladesh.

The preemptive drives caused a huge dent in the strength of IS-inspired "Neo JMB", which had perpetrated the July 1, 2016 attack at the Holy Artisan Bakery in Gulshan.

A major success came 26 days after the incident, as law enforcers launched operation "Storm 26" at a den in the city's Kalyanpur in which nine militants of the group were killed and one was arrested.

Documents seized from the den and information gathered subsequently helped law enforcers prevent three attacks planned by "Neo JMB", which was little known to law enforcers, say DMP's Counter Terrorism and Transnational Crime (CTTC) unit



officials.

"It was the operation through which we fought back against militancy, and it was a turning point for us," CTTC unit chief Monirul Islam had said earlier about the Kalyanpur raid.

Then came another big success as the mastermind of the café attack, Bangladesh-born Canadian citizen Tamim Ahmed Chowdhury, along with his two close accomplices were killed in a drive at a den in Narayanganj on August 27, 2016.

## Dhaka gasping for fresh air

Govt takes urgent measures to fight air pollution as the city's air quality worst in the world

The hazy skies of Dhaka city in the beginning of winter may seem like harbingers of the cold season. But what appears to be only mist or fog, is actually smog and dust.

The capital had the worst air quality in the world yesterday, according to Air Visual, an air quality measuring application.

The alarming situation prompted the government to chalk out immediate measures to give city-dwellers some relief.

At an emergency inter-ministerial meeting, it was decided that steps would be taken to stop burning garbage at waste dump sites and shut down all illegal brick kilns around the capital. It also directed the Dhaka north and south city corporations to sprinkle water on the city roads to reduce dust in the air.

"The level of air pollution is alarming. Just a few days ago, air quality of Dhaka was the third or fourth worst in the world. But now it tops the ranking," said Md Shahab

Uddin, minister for environment, forest and climate change, who presided over the meeting held at the conference room of the ministry.

The meeting also decided that directives would be issued to cover all construction materials. From now on, the government would mention this instruction in all their construction-related tenders, the minister said.

The government is also going to issue a gazette notification to ensure 100 per cent use of ecofriendly green bricks -- an ecofriendly alternative -- for all government construction projects.

The smog from brick kilns, smoke from unfit vehicles and dust generated from public and private constructions sites, including those of the mega projects taken by the government, were the main sources of air pollution, the minister said.

Brick kilns were identified as the single largest source of air pollution in Dhaka

## CLIMATE CRISIS

### Greenhouse gas levels hit new high in 2018: UN

Greenhouse gas levels in the atmosphere, the main driver of climate change, hit a record high last year, the UN said yesterday, calling for action to safeguard "the future welfare of mankind".

"There is no sign of a slowdown, let alone a decline, in greenhouse gas concentration in the atmosphere despite all the commitments under the Paris Agreement on Climate Change," the head of the World Meteorological Organization (WMO) Petteri Taalas said in a statement.

The WMO's main annual Greenhouse Gas Bulletin listed the atmospheric concentration of CO2 in 2018 at 407.8
