Nadal's 6-3, 7-6 (9/7) win over Shapovalov in front of an adoring home crowd at the Caja Magica gave Spain an unassailable 2-0 lead after Roberto Bautista Agut earlier battled past Felix Auger-Aliassime 7-6 (7/3), 6-3.

"I'm incredibly happy to end the year like this," said Nadal afterwards.

The 33-year-old had been an unstoppable force in Spain's pulsating semi-final against Britain on Saturday and never looked like letting this chance slip, with King Felipe VI and Real Madrid's Sergio Ramos watching on, along with Barcelona defender Gerard Pique.

Pique's marketing company Kosmos have been at the heart of the raft of changes to this 119-year-old competition but Nadal's brilliance has been familiar, even if this will surely go down as one of the finest seasons of the 19-time Grand Slam champion's sparkling career.

He added a fourth Davis Cup final success -- three more than Roger Federer -- to the ones he claimed in 2004, 2009 and 2011, while capping a remarkable 12

months that has included winning the French and US Opens, and ending the year as world number one.

The Spanish team will also pocket a cheque worth \$2.1 million.

Nadal won eight out of eight rubbers played this week and at times on Saturday, as when he stormed to singles and doubles victories against Britain, it was tempting to view Spain's progress as something of a solo effort.

But, unlike Canada, Spain have used all five of their squad, with Bautista Agut, Pablo Carreno Busta and Feliciano Lopez all playing at least one singles match, and Lopez and Marcel Granollers joining forces in the doubles.

There has also been the undeniable advantage of the home crowd and although Spain's success has delivered a huge boost to the event in its inaugural year, some will argue it might have been fairer to find a new venue in 2020.

Hosting and mixed attendances are among several issues for Pique and the International Tennis Federation to solve in the coming months but on the court, some gripping ties have ensured the new Davis Cup has got off to an encouraging start.

Bautista Agut's win over Auger-Aliassime was particularly poignant, given the world number nine was returning after withdrawing from the team on Thursday.

Bangladeshi archers eliminated

All the Bangladeshi archers including Ruman Sana were eliminated from respective individual events of the 21st Asian Archery Championships in Bangkok, Thailand yesterday.

Sana, who directly qualified for Tokyo Olympics after winning a bronze medal in World Archery Championship in Thailand earlier this year, suffered a 6-2 sets defeat against Thailand's Pathairat Tanapat in the third round of men's individual recurve, where Tamimul Islam and Hakib Ahmed Rubel also lost in the second round.

In women's individual recurve event, Nasrin Akter lost by 6-2 sets against Ankita Bhakat; Beauty Roy lost by 7-3 sets to Ohashi Tomoka; Iti Khatun lost by 6-0 sets to An Qixuan while Mehnaz Akter lost by 6-5 sets to Mazlan Nuramalia. All four archers were eliminated from the second round.

In men's compound event, Sohel Rana and Ashim Kumar Das lost to Abhishek Verma (145-140) and Bhardwaj Mohan Ramswaroop (147-143) while Shaymoli Roy and Susmita Banik lost to Kiran Muskan (143-143) and Lin Ming-Ching (143-137) in women's recurve event.

In recurve mixed event, Bangladesh lost by 5-1 sets to North Korea while Bangladesh compound mixed team suffered a 155-154 points defeat to South Korea in the quarterfinals.

The elimination of all the archers is a worrying sign for Bangladesh ahead of next week's South Asian Games where Bangladesh is hoping to win a few gold medals in archery events.

Quality foreigners dominate BPL transfer window

top-flight Country's football, over the last witnessed decade, physically imposing

African footballers who often lacked quality, but the scenario is rapidly changing in the Bangladesh Premier League since the last season with the presence of quality foreign players in all the clubs.

Though the giants used to hire comparatively skilled African footballers, the mid-and-lowertable sides used to rely on physically imposing African players without thinking of their quality, with low payment being one of the major reasons to sign them in previous years.

However, the scenario is changing rapidly, especially after the game's local governing body made it a must to include at least one player in each

side under Asian quota. The recent seven-week transfer window closed on November 20 where some 66 foreign players from 24 countries were signed up by the participating 13 clubs. Of those foreign recruits, 36 are new singings who came to Bangladesh for the first time.

Like the previous editions, African years, better quality foreign players players still dominated the transfer market, with 29 players from the continent -- Nigeria (13), Gambia (5), Cameroon (3), Mali (2), Guinea (2), Egypt (2), Rwanda (1) and Sierra Leone (1). However, there is a big contingent of 20 Asian players --Uzbekistan (7), Kyrgyzstan (5), Japan (3), Tajikistan (3), Lebanon (1), East Timor (1) this time around.

Apart from Asia and Africa, there are also players from Montenegro, Bulgaria, Brazil, Argentina, USA, Colombia, Haiti, Costa Rica, Ivory Coast and Australia.

Maruful Haque, one of the top coaches of the country, believes modern technology and an open transfer market staff to choose quality players.

"The clubs can nowadays search for quality players in the open market and easily get video footages of 20 quality footballers within an hour through agents. That's why players from other continents, with good academic background, are being preferred over African players and," Chattogram Abahani coach Marful said.

are coming into the Bangladesh Premier League and they have been contributing to change the standard of Bangladesh football because they are technically and tactically superior to the physical ones. The local players are also learning from them, especially their technique," Maruful added.

Sheikh Russel coach Saiful Bari Titu believes the Bangladesh Premier League is getting more competitive due to the presence of quality foreign players.

"The last league was one of the most competitive one I have seen and I think the upcoming season will be even more competitive as every team is trying to bring quality foreign players," said Titu, who believes the are helping club officials and coaching mandatory norm of having Asian players raised the bar of the league.

"Clubs have tried to rope in national players from Asian nations, especially from Uzbekistan, Tajikistan and Kyrgyzstan who are better than Bangladeshi players. Besides, clubs have also shown tendency to rope in European and South American players because they are easy to deal with compared to African players,"

a weak Ligue 1 but has failed to inspire them to the heights in the Champions League, the main reason for the Qatarifinanced club indulging in such a massive outlay in the first place. He is generally respected by the fans but not loved.

Indeed there was some jeering when he was substituted during Friday's win over Lille, his first game in six weeks following a hamstring injury. Part of the antipathy was his exerted and ultimately

failed efforts to secure a transfer back to Barcelona during the summer. Marquinhos, however, is in no doubt about the

commitment that his fellow Brazilian brings to the Parisian

"Ney has always been thorough," says the 25-year-old central defender.

"He is someone who doesn't do things by halves. It shows on the field. When he takes the ball he wants to be decisive.

"Once he's on the pitch, even after all that happened during the transfer window and the other stories, he's back on the pitch to win, to score, to make a difference.

"He's not hiding. He proves that he is totally committed alongside us."

Neymar's return on Friday was his first appearance for PSG since October 5, having suffered a hamstring injury playing for Brazil against Nigeria a week later.

"There are other things to say as well. He worked well during the week, he did everything right," says Marquinhos. "I think we should put more emphasis on the good

things he does rather than the negative things. "As a friend, he always does good things but we don't talk about them."

Bale in focus as Real face PSG

When Zinedine Zidane dropped Gareth Bale Champions League game against Saint-Germain

last year, Bale believed it was the beginning of the end at Real Madrid.

Two seasons on he remains but Madrid face PSG again at the Santiago Bernabeu on Tuesday, with the Welshman's future still in doubt and his standing among the fans

perhaps never lower. Madrid's two last 16 legs against PSG in the Champions League in 2018, towards the end of Zidane's

first spell as coach and en route to their third consecutive European triumph, marked a turning-point between Bale and his coach. By leaving him out, Zidane's

message was clear: he did not trust Bale in the biggest matches. The pair hardly spoke for the rest of the season, even as Bale scored twice as a substitute in the final against Liverpool.

Bale was set upon leaving that summer, only for Zidane to go instead, and while Bale stayed, Zidane came back and their relationship has

been frosty ever since.

But in the last few weeks, as

Bale's behaviour has wavered and

the criticism increased, Zidane has become his staunchest defender. When Bale joined up with Wales

despite missing six Real Madrid games through injury, Zidane said it was bad timing. And when Bale celebrated

behind a flag that put his club lower down his list of priorities than his country and playing golf, Zidane urged the fans to remember his achievements.

"There's a lot of noise, too much. He wants to be with us and do well and he's done that. Talk, talk, talk, it's not necessary. He's a big part of the group and we are together."

Basketball coach refrained from his job

Bangladesh women's basketball team's coach Sabuj Miah has been refrained from working with the team until Basketball Bangladesh Federation (BBF) looks into allegations against him of slapping a female national player within the next two

The Bangladesh Olympic Association (BOA) took the decision yesterday after talking to both parties following the allegation brought by the father of that player.

"We called on both parties and talked to them separately. There might be some ifs and buts and we asked the federation to investigate the matter within two days and submit a report to BOA by November 27. Till that time, coach Sabuj Mia will refrain from his job with women's national team," said BOA director general Fakruddin Haider adding that BOA has a zero-tolerance stance on such issues.

Sabuj Miah appeared at the BOA headquarters with eight other national female players, but BOA committee did not hear anything from those players.
