Families left in ruins

Badiuzzaman became landless nearly 15 years ago, when all his 20 bighas of arable land in Bogura's Dhunat upazila eroded into mighty Jamuna.

The devastation forced him to work as a day labourer to bear family expenses, including education of his three sons. After his first child dropped out and another was physically challenged, Badiuzzaman pinned his hopes on his youngest son, Shafiqul Islam Uzzal.

"I had picked up every odd job to bear his educational expenses, with the hope that he would someday take the family's responsibility. But my son became a killer and murdered innocent people."

Uzzal not only shattered his dreams, but put the entire family in disarray. He was one of the five youths who carried out the country's deadliest militant attack at Holey Artisan Café in Gulshan on July 1, 2016, an incident that shook the nation to its core.

"I had picked up every odd job to bear his educational expenses, with the hope that he would someday take the family's responsibility. But my son became a killer and murdered innocent people. He destroyed everything," said a desolate Badiuzzaman (65)

"I feel ashamed to talk to my neighbours because of him," he said, adding that his family is on the verge of ruins.

Like Badiuzzaman, family members of at least eight out of 21 suspected militants involved in the café attack shared similar ordeals they have been enduring after their loved ones turned out to be dreaded

Some of them are now struggling to make ends meet after losing their breadwinners, while some are seeing a bleak future as their "last resort of hope" are either in jail or got killed during anti-militancy drives by law enforcers after the attack.

However, they all have one unpleasant experience in common: social isolation.

Monirul Islam, chief of Counter Terrorism and Transnational Crime unit of Dhaka Metropolitan Police, said the militants not only destroyed themselves but also made their family members victims.

"The family members of the militants were humiliated in their communities... Relatives of the many of them have turned away. In some cases, people cut business ties with their families," he told The Daily The CTTC chief said they have started

working closely with those family members, as they found them innocent during investigation.

The families also helped police sincerely,

After the death of her husband, 55-yearold Rokeya Akhter from Bogura solaced herself when her only son Rakibul Hasan Regan got GPA-5 in SSC in 2013. Against all odds, she was financing his education. Regan also got GPA-5 in HSC exam.

Rokeya hoped her son would be a doctor and bring happiness to her family. But all her efforts failed when Regan was pulled into militancy and left home in July 2015, just a year before the deadly terror attack.

'My world crumbled before my eyes after Regan was arrested in the case.

Speakers demand separate lane

Speakers at a roundtable yesterday demanded separate lane for rickshaws instead of the government move to ban the human-powered vehicle on Dhaka streets.

They alleged that mayors of the two city corporations have already banned rickshaws on three important roads without creating alternative work for a large number of destitute rickshaw-pullers.

Rights activists, university teachers, architects and representatives of rickshawpullers were speaking at the roundtable on "Public transport and rickshaw in Dhaka city: reality, problems and way forward",

held at Jatiya Press Club. Bangladesh Institute of Labor Studies BILS), a labour rights platform, organised the discussion following a recent High Court (HC) directive on the authorities concerned to sketch a master plan to reduce traffic congestion in the capital.

professor of economics at Dhaka University, said rickshaws would not create traffic congestion if the government introduces a separate lane and regulates it through a proper guideline.

Until the government can arrange alternative work for thousands of rickshawpullers -- as their family members depend on their income, rickshaws should not be banned, he said.

Akash stressed on introducing a strict parking law for all types of vehicles, arranging workshop for drivers and providing identity cards to rickshaw-pullers to mitigate traffic congestion.

Rezaul Karim, a professor of social work department at Jagannath University, said rickshaws are needed in Dhaka as this sector employs a large number of people and are an inexpensive mode of transport for city dwellers.

Shaheed Dr Milon Day will be observed across the country today, commemorating the 29th martyrdom anniversary of Dr Shamsul Alam Khan Milon, who was joint secretary general of Bangladesh Medical Association (BMA).

Milon, a teacher of Dhaka Medical College, was killed by thugs of the then authoritarian ruler HM Ershad near TSC of Dhaka University, at the height of the anti-autocracy movement on this day in

The sacrifice of Dr Milon transformed the movement into a mass uprising that prompted the fall of the regime, paving way for restoration of democracy.

On the eve of the day, President M Abdul Hamid and Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina issued separate messages recalling the sacrifice of Dr Milon.

Political parties, sociocultural organisations and professional groups have chalked out programmes to mark the day.

The programmes include offering special prayers, discussions, and placing wreaths at the grave of Dr Milon on DMC campus and at Milon Smrity Chattar near TSC.

SEXUAL HARASSMENT AT WORKPLACE

Hard to eradicate but can be prevented, speakers say

Labour rights activists at a roundtable yesterday called for a social movement against sexual harassment and assault on women, and urged men to be at its frontline. They also said women should be aware

of their rights and urged the government to formulate strict law for prevention of all forms of sexual harassment at workplace and educational institutions. Bangladesh Labour Foundation (BLF),

a non-government organisation working on labour rights, organised the discussion on the necessity of law to prevent sexual harassment. The event was held at The Daily Star Centre in the capital. Speaking at the event, BLF Chairman

Abdus Salam Khan said sexual harassment is rampant around the world, and Bangladesh is no exception. "It is hard to eradicate violence against

women from a patriarchal society like ours, but it can be prevented. To do so, women have to be aware while men should change their mindset," he said.

"Colonial attitude like master-servant

relationship still remains in our society,

which has to change immediately, added Salam, a noted labour rights Urging the government to formulate a strict act in this regard, he said sexual

harassment at workplace cannot be

prevented if the authority does not come forward. Lawmaker Shirin Akhter said women face harassment at every stage of their lives -- from home to streets to workplace

which needs to stop. Formulation of the law will not be enough unless it is implemented properly. Besides, a social movement is also needed

to resist the widespread harassment, and men should be in the frontline of the movement, she added. Mostafizur Rahman, joint inspector

general of the Department of Inspection for Factories and Establishments; ZM Kamrul Anam, secretary general of BLF; Kelly Fay Rodríguez, deputy country director of Solidarity Center Bangladesh; and Farhtheeba Khan, a team leader of SNV Netherlands in Bangladesh, also spoke at the programme, among others.

UberPOOL launches in Dhaka

Uber, the world's largest on-demand ridesharing company, yesterday launched a new service -- UberPOOL-- in Dhaka to mark three years of its

operation in Bangladesh. UberPOOL is a new ridesharing option that allows riders to share, or "pool" ride with others headed in the same direction, and split the cost of the trip.

Ratul Ghosh, head of east India and Bangladesh at Uber, made the announcement at a press briefing in a city hotel.

He said trip fare on UberPOOL can be up to 40 percent lower than the UberX fare for the same distance. "It means cheaper rides for passengers, longer, more-rewarding trips for drivers, and less congestion for cities over time," he said.

Once a rider made request through the app, he or she will get matched with the most compatible co-riders and driver nearby and the best spot for pickup in under two minutes.

When the ride details are finalised, the app gives the person walking directions and the ETA (expected time of arrival) for pick up so the rider knows when and where to meet the driver.

As one nears the end of the trip, the Uber app will choose a drop off spot, notify, and provide walking directions to the final destination.

Supply drinkable water to four Patiya villages: HC to govt

In a rare move, the High Court yesterday ordered the government to arrange supply of potable and household water for four villages -- Charkanai, Hulaine, Panchuria and Habilashdweep -- in Patiya upazila of

Around 30,000 residents of these four villages are not getting safe water, as around 350 tube-wells in the areas have allegedly gone out of order due to withdrawal of ground water by eight

Yesterday, the HC said the authorities concerned of the government will continue supply of potable and household water to the villagers of Charkanai, Hulaine, Panchuria and Habilashdweep villages until the government decides whether the villages will be declared waterstressed area.
