The world will miss its chance to avert climate disaster without an immediate and all-butimpossible fall in fossil fuel emissions, the UN said yesterday in its annual assessment on greenhouse gases.

The United Nations **Environment Programme** said that global emissions need to fall by 7.6 percent each year until 2030 to limit global temperature rises to 1.5C.

### Top EC officials directly involved

Ctg EC staffer tells court in confessional statement

Some high-ranking Election Commission officials in Dhaka and Chattogram took money using their office staffers as middlemen and forged national ID cards for the Rohingyas.

The EC officials' direct involvement came to light after an office assistant made a confessional statement before a court mentioning the names of the officials, Chattogram court and police sources said.

Investigators are now waiting for the green light from higher authorities to arrest the officials.

According to the confessional statement of Chattogram Regional EC office's Office Assistant Md Najim, 40, the then Panchliash zone Election Officer Md Abdul Latif Sheikh and a top official of Dhaka NID wing were directly involved in the NID forgery.

They used to share the money, Najim told metropolitan magistrate Khairul Amin on November 21.

Latif is now the senior election officer at the Pabna EC

With Najim, five EC staffers, two data-entry operators and three office assistants, have given confessional statements in the much talked about NID scam case filed with Kotwali Police Station on September 17.

The Counter Terrorism (CT) unit of Chattogram Metropolitan Police (CMP) is investigating the case. So far, SEE PAGE 9 COL 1

STAFF CORRESPONDENT The Customs Intelligence Investigation and

Directorate (CIID) yesterday quizzed 32 more onion importers and initially found that importers did not hoard the bulb that reached its highest ever price in recent days.

With them, the CIID has so far grilled 43 importers, who brought more than 1,000 tonnes of onions between August and November this year, "gather information" on sales and stock of the cooking ingredient.

On Monday, the CIID questioned 11 other onion importers.

The CIID's initiative came in the wake of surging onion prices that hit as high as Tk 250 per kilogram last week, owing to a shortage of supply.

## BNP men block road, vandalise vehicles in city

Activists of a pro-BNP organisation and police personnel clashed after the activists, while agitating for Khaleda Zia's release, blocked a road in the capital's High Court area

yesterday. The protesters damaged several vehicles in the area, said police, adding that they also had not taken permission for the demonstration.

The incident happened two days after BNP Secretary General Mirza Fakhrul Islam Alamgir said they would no

longer seek any permission to hold any programmes. "We will arrange programmes as per our wish," he said at a rally in front of the party's Nayapaltan headquarters

on Sunday. Around 1:00pm yesterday, around 200 BNP men, led by the party's Vice Chairman Abdullah Al Noman and under the banner of Jatiyatabadi Muktijoddha Projonmo Dal, took position on the road and started chanting slogans

demanding the release of the party chairperson. The protest caused a huge traffic congestion in the area

and police asked the demonstrators to leave. As the BNP men defied the police call, the law enforcers baton-charged them and lobbed tear gas canisters to

disperse them. The agitators retaliated by throwing brickbats at the policemen, said witnesses. At one point, the protesters left. Sazzadur Rahman, deputy commissioner (Ramna Division) of the Dhaka Metropolitan Police, said the BNP men were staging the protest without taking any police permission.

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
