OPEN-MARKET SALE OF ONIONS

A first-time experience for many Ctg residents

It is not that open-market sales (OMS) of essentials at lower than market prices are unforeseen in the port city. Trucks of Trading Corporation of Bangladesh (TCB) often sell rice, lentils and other daily groceries at various points of the city. However, there has been a marked difference in their latest stint of sales than previous times.

Sanjida Akter, a master's student of Government Hazi Muhammad Mohsin College, is not used to shopping for groceries. Her father, a schoolteacher, usually buys daily essentials from kitchen markets, while her mother sometimes takes it upon her to do so. Sanijda never thought she would stand in queue on a street to buy essentials sold out of a truck, but then again, not many limited-income families like hers had thought they would have to bear the brunt of astronomical

prices of onions.

Sanjida was seen standing in a queue to buy onion from the truck of TCB in front of Parade Corner on Chattogram College Road vesterday.

"I came to my college to attend classes and was returning home when I saw the truck of TCB selling onions at Tk 45 per kg," said Sanjida, adding, "I instantly decided to stand in the queue."

"My family needs 3.5 to 4kg onion per month, but when the price crossed Tk 200, my father could not afford it, and my mother has to face challenges to cook food everyday managing the deficit," she said. "I never thought of buying daily essentials standing in a queue on the road, but I had to do it today.

Like Sanjida, a group of students from Chattogram College

and Hazi Muhammad Mohsin College were seen in the queue to buy onion at the lucrative price.

Tripti Barua, a fourth-year honour's student of Chattogram College, said seeing her friends in the queue, she also stood in line to buy onions.

"At first, it felt awkward to stand in a queue, but when I saw many of my friends standing in line, I thought to myself I had no reason to be shy," she said.

Salesman Selim said every customer was being given one kg onion at Tk 45. This correspondent visited different kitchen markets in the port city yesterday, and found a kg of onion was being sold for Tk 180 to Tk 200.

32 lakh tonnes of goods stranded at Ctg port

Unloading of imported bulk cargo from the outer anchorage of Chattogram port and different private jetties (ghats) across the country, as well as transport of previously-unloaded goods by lighter vessels through inland water routes remained suspended since early hours of yesterday, due to a wildcat work abstention enforced by a section of water transport workers. The strike, however, was called off last night.

Yesterday, around 1,343 cargo vessels from across the country, including 57 large mother vessels at the outer anchorage of Chattogram port remained stranded with some 32 lakh tonnes of imported goods.

The goods include coal, stone, industrial raw materials like cement clinker, slag, fertiliser and different commodities.

Import goods brought by large vessels are usually unloaded to lighter ones at the outer anchorage of Chattogram port, and then transported to 37 private ghats and several other jetties, owned by industrial plants across

According to Chattogram Port Authority (CPA), unloading of around 13.63 lakh tonnes of imported cargo from 57 mother vessels, anchored at the premier sea port's outer anchorage, remained stopped since midnight, immediately after lighter vessel workers stopped operating the vessels in support of the strike.

Transport and unloading of another 12.89 lakh tonnes of imported goods loaded at 986 lighter vessels, which are now staying at 37 different ghats at destinations including Majhirghat at Chattogram, Narayanganj, Mirpur, Khulna, Noapara, Baghabari, Barishal, Patuakhali and other areas came to a halt since midnight due to non-operation of the vessels, according to the data collected from Water Transport Cell (WTC), a private organisation that controls a big fraction of these lighter vessels.

Apart from these, around 5.40 lakh tonnes of industrial raw materials remained stuck at around 300 lighter vessels, owned and operated by 11 industrial groups like Meghna, City, S Alam, Premier cement and others. Expressing concern over the stagnation of goods, Chattogram

A local Awami League leader of Narayanganj's Siddhirganj yesterday arranged a "doa mahfil" and feast on a high school premises, halting the final exams scheduled for the day.

seventh and ninth grades were also scheduled, according to a copy of the final exam schedule of the school obtained by this newspaper.

Guardians expressed grievance as the school authorities cancelled the scheduled examinations without any prior notice.

Father of a ninth-grader said, "There was no need to cancel the final examination. Open places, community centres and fields were available to hold such kinds of events. They could have chosen any other place. It is unexpected."

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1 killed, 11 injured in Madaripur road crash

A man was killed and 11 were injured in a road accident on Dhaka-Khulna Highway at Doulatpur area under Shibchar upazila in Madaripur yesterday.

The deceased was Abdul Rouf Matabbar, 50, of Bhadrasan area under the same upazila. He was a former member of Bhadrasan union parishad.

Quoting locals, Abul Kalam Azad, officer in-charge of Shibchar Police Station said, "The accident took place when the driver of a Dhaka-bound bus of Sarbik Paribahan lost control over the vehicle and hit a motorbike around 11:30am. The motorbike passenger Abdul Rouf Matabbar and his son were severely injured and the bus fell into a roadside ditch. Ten bus passengers were also injured."

Locals rushed Rouf and his son to Faridpur Medical College Hospital, were an on-duty doctor declared the elderly man's death around 1:45 pm.

The other injured were taken to Shibchar upazila health complex, said the OC. Police seized the bus but the driver fled.
